Most 'umble Homage To China

According to a recent release by the Associated Collegiate Press, it has been learned that the Chinese Central government has appropriated \$3,500,000 to reopen the famous Chiao-tung University. Dr. J. U. Ly, president of the university, has left Shanghai for Chungking to take charge. The university had remained in Shanghai until the Japanese coastal occupations of last December.

In 1938 America was hearing of the valiant efforts put forth by the Chinese students and professors that their education might be continued in spite of the Japanese onslaught, which played havoc with their buildings, equipment,—and their ranks. We saw pictures and read of the caves of interior China which were being used as dormitories and classrooms for the determined Chinese college students.

When, in spite of persecution, starvation, and death, such news as the reopening of this famous university and also the opening of two other colleges in Hopoh Province China, reaches the ears of college students throughout the nation, a ray of hope and encouragement for our remarkable ally of the Orient and for education throughout the world can be discerned.

For five years we watched China take her beating, many of us unconsciously thinking all the while that "those Japanese can't be so tough." Now we know better; the Chinese are simply tougher.

When asked about her pet peeves, Miss Neher revealed with a broad, friendly smile, that girls failing to go to bed were probably her most outstanding peeve.

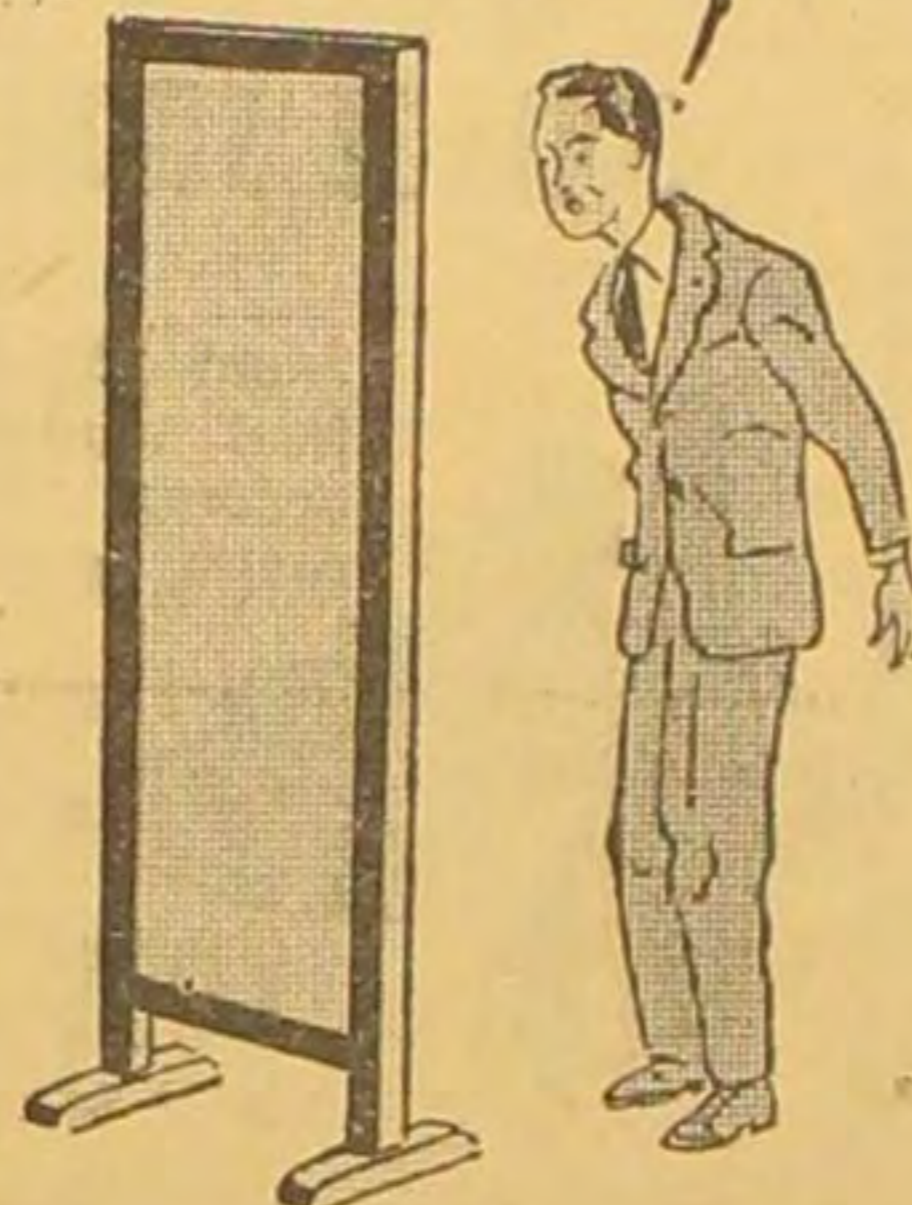

Baker Leads In Kansas Conference

McPherson Topped Bethel; Wesleyan-Ottawa Tie

Looking over the conference games of last week we note that "Sailor Boy" Hodges trotted four touchdowns across for Baker University to help defeat the College of Emporia to the tune of 33-0. The Wildcats rolled up 266 yards from scrimmage in their five touchdown spree and tried only one pass which was completed for four yards. The Presby's made 86 yards rushing and completed 6 of 13 passes for 62 yards. They never threatened Baker's goal.

The Wesleyan-Ottawa game ended in a scoreless tie after two fourth-period field goal attempts went for naught. Wesleyan threatened twice but their running and passing attack bogged down. No other scoring threats were made in the game.

McPherson topped Bethel in a 7-0 game and made two other threats. Bethel pushed McPherson to the 1 yard line but did not have the power to score.

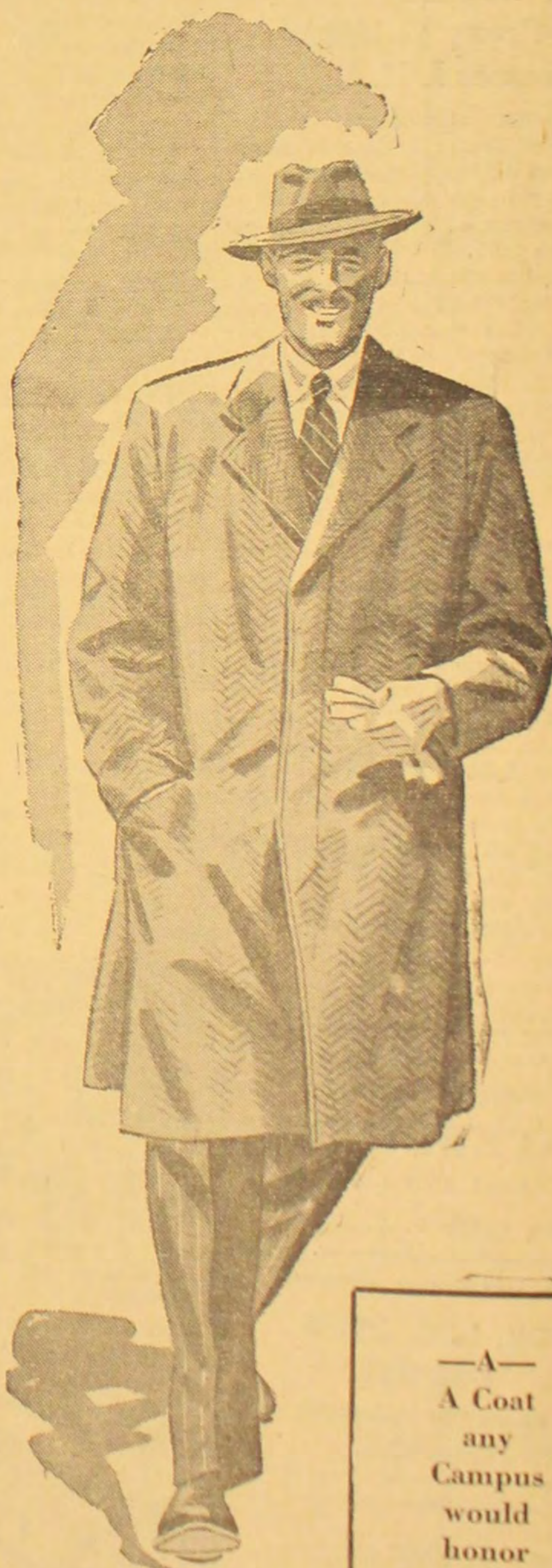
