Five states are represented in the high scores of the Freshman English Placement Test recently released by the English Department.

Ruth Strickler, Ramona, Kan., leads the list with a score of 135, closely followed by Shirley Wine, Pierre, S. D., at 137.

There is a tie for third place at 133 between Ann Powell, Kingsley, Iowa, and Lydia Whitman, Scott City, Kans. Fifth place at 121 goes to Marlo Oltman, Enders, Neb. Richard Eder of McPherson High School placed sixth at 130.

A seventh place tie at 129 is shared by Donald Fancher, Rocky Ford, Colo., and Phyllis Kingery, Corning, Iowa. Marinell Johnson of McPherson High has a clear title to ninth place at 128.

A four-way tie for tenth place at 127 includes Shirley Alexander, Kansas City, Kan.; Bill Goering, McPherson, High School; LaFaugh Hubbard, Hugoton, Kan.; and Faye Ellen Trostle, Johnson, Kan.

Five of this group of thirteen are children of former Macollege students.

The tests are used as a basis for placement in freshman English sections and for corrective work in English.

Mrs. Hoffa, formerly Arba Jean Evans, was the daughter of Franklin and Roberta (Brown) Evans, '28.

The accident was a head-on collision between the Hoffa convertible and a milk truck. Mr. and Mrs. Hoffa and Gary, brother of Mrs. Hoffa, were on their way to the home of Nelda Baldwin when the accident occurred. Mrs. Hoffa was planning to be in the wedding of Miss Baldwin.

Mrs. Hoffa's brother, Gary Evans, who was a passenger in the car, was killed instantly. Jean died in a hospital a few hours after the accident.

Ernie, also a former student at Mac, is recuperating in the Deaconess Hospital, Marshalltown, Iowa. Ernie suffered a smashed hip and legs, two broken ribs and other injuries.

Mrs. Hoffa's funeral was held in the Ivester, Iowa, Church of the Brethren. Mr. Evan's funeral was held in Lexington, Neb.

Paul Sollenberger Returns To Mac As Music Prof.

Paul V. Sollenberger, Macollege graduate, has just arrived on the campus as new Assistant Professor of Music Education.

Prof. Sollenberger has been teaching in the Andrews High School at Andrews, Ind. He formerly taught in the city school system at Fort Wayne, Ind., for three years. While living in Fort Wayne, he was director of two choirs in the Church of the Brethren.

He will be residing at 1205½ E. Kansas with his wife, Dorothy Dawson Sollenberger, and their 17-month old son, Jay Paul. Mrs. Sollenberger is employed as piano instructor at the Macollege studio.

Prof. Sollenberger received his A. B. degree in 1947 while teaching band and orchestra at Macollege. He had attended Manchester College in North Manchester, Ind. for two years.

In 1943 Prof. Sollenberger was stationed at a CPS Unit in Dayton, Ohio. He worked in the mental hospital as a ward attendant and unit director. During his three years there he took courses in night school at Dayton University.

Prof. Sollenberger studied violin at the Sherwood School of Music in Chicago, Ill. He also took two summers of graduate study at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill.

Prof. Sollenberger's hobby is painting houses during the summer. He likes outdoor work. He says, "Classes in the winter are so confining that I enjoy working out-of-doors in the summer."

Prof. Sollenberger was acting as Dean of the Layman's Fellowship Camp at Camp Mack when he received word from President Desmond W. Bittinger inviting him to become Assistant Professor of Music Education at Macollege.

He is to take the place of Mrs. Audrey San Romani, who at present is unable to resume her teaching because of illness.
