There will be two performances on Sunday, April 6. In the morning, the choir will be at Rockingham, Mo., and Sunday evening they will sing at Washington Creek, Kansas, returning to Macollege after the performance. Members from the Lone Star and the McLoth Churches will be at Washington Creek.

The numbers presented by the choir will be divided into four groups. The first group consists of "Go, Song of Mine," the Theme-song of the Choir; "Jesus Calls Us," a Hymn-Anthem, accompanied by Miss LaFaulgn Hubbard; and "Let Thy Holy Presence."

In the second group of numbers there are four selections: "How Excellent is Thy Name"; "Dark Water" A Negro Spiritual; another spiritual, "Listen To The Lamb," an Easter number. "All in the April Evening."

A Ukrainian Christmas Carol, "Carol of the Bells"; "In the Gypsy's Life," from the "Bohemian Girl"; accompanied by Miss, Hubbard; "Earl, One Morning," an English Folk-Song; "The Orchestra Song," an Austrian Song; and a humorous Jugo-Slav Folk-Song, "The Peasant and His Oxen" will comprise the third group of numbers.

The final group of numbers is composed of four religious numbers. The first one is a Hymn-Anthem, "Immortal Love, Forever Full," followed by "Jesus, Our Lord, We Adore Thee," "Hail, Our Redeemer," and closing the program with "The Lord's Prayer."

## Southern Island Sets The Stage For Chapel

He stated that the island was once owned by very wealthy "whites" and as a result of the Civil War the island was abandoned. A ship full of Negro slaves from Africa was left there to shift for themselves. These Negroes were afraid of the big houses and built their own little shantytowns.

During his first few days' visit on the island, Dr. Bittinger attended their church service. Following the preaching several people arose to sing. Their singing was filled with hope of a better life to come in a better land.

Two of the songs were sung in chapel by the Macollege Men's Quartet. They were "Old Black Joe" and "I'm A Trampin'."

Dr. Bittinger spent a month in the deep south observing Negro education while he was a student at the University of Pennsylvania. During this time he visited St. Helena as well as many other places of interest.

The men's quartet is composed of Keith Allison, Don Wagner, Don West, and Curt Leicht.

# GOD'S Living Letters

The bravest man ever to live on earth—who was he? Many nominations for this distinction have been made. High on the list should be placed the name of Father Damien, the Belgian priest who gave his life as missionary to lepers on Molokai, one of the Hawaiian Islands.

Leprosy is an ancient and terrible scourge. The Egyptians called it "death before death." It has appeared in all centuries and on all continents. I have seen its victims in China, the Philippines and India. It literally eats away one part of the body after another and produces excruciating pain.

Leprosy was first noticed in the Hawaiian Islands in 1853. It spread rapidly and, in a desperate effort to check its ravages, the policy of segregating the lepers was adopted. The island of Molokai was selected for the leper colony.

In 1873 Father Damien arrived. He came with the knowledge that he was accepting a life sentence to service among these afflicted people. Leprosy is a contagious disease. He would never be allowed to dwell elsewhere, and at that time he was only thirty-three years of age.

Conditions were indescribably awful. The lepers numbered eight hundred and were in varying stages of decomposition. Some had lost a hand; some a foot, some had a deep pocket in the face in place of a nose. Sanitary conditions were deplorable. The stench rose to high heaven. Food was inadequate. Hopelessness and despair prevailed.

For twelve years Father Damien lived among these people as a minister of mercy. Then at an early Mass he spoke of "We lepers." He continued his work of compassion until his death in 1889, at the age of forty-nine. In the long annals of bravery, where would you find a more courageous soul than this man of God?
