Miss Brown stated that she has enjoyed her work here very much. She has appreciated her students, and she feels that she has received more from the students than they have from her. She will always remember the happy fellowship of all the students and faculty.

She has noticed a great change in the college and the music department. When Miss Brown began her teaching, there was only two teachers in the Music Department.
Miss Brown has had extensive study with noted instructors. She studied at the Royal Conservatory in Leipzig, Germany, under the direction of Robert Ferdinandus and Franklin Van Egger. At Pratt-High School of Music in London, Miss Brown studied with Frank Manheiser, and with Olga Samiroff from Grullivard School of Music. She took a short master course under Gantz, Robert E. Schmitt and Lhevinn Delius Frantz. At Bethany College, she studied under Oscar Lofgran.

Treasurer Retires

Mr. J. Howard Fries, who has served McPherson College for 36 years, will retire as treasurer of the college on July 1, 1952. Mr. Fries will continue as farm agent for the college farms for another year.

Mr. Fries graduated from Maccollege in 1925, which was then an Academy. He returned to the College as principal of the commercial department and college accountant.

From 1927 until 1937 he served as Business Manager. In 1937, he also took on the responsibility of treasurer in addition to the position of Business Manager. In 1947, Mr. R. Gordon Yoder replaced Mr. Fries as Business Manager, and since that time Mr. Fries has been Treasurer.

Mr. Fries has noticed many changes in this college, as well as the other church colleges in the state of Kansas in the past 35 years. He also stated that he has seen some very interesting experiences and developments in the private colleges. Mr. Fries holds the longest unbroken record of service of anyone serving at Maccollege.

R. Gordon Yoder will succeed Mr. Fries as Treasurer.

Mohler Retires From Faculty

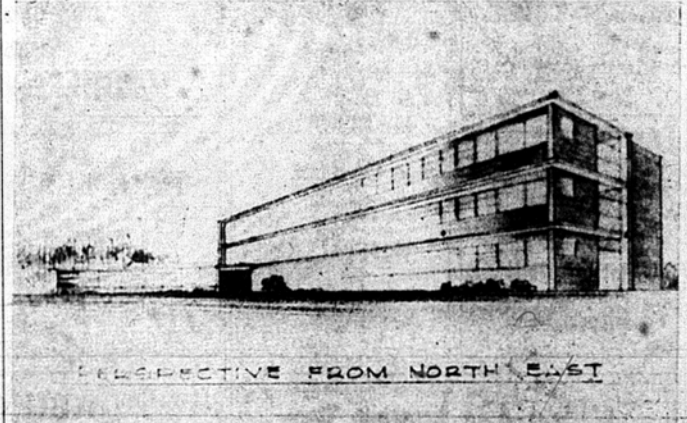
Dr. R. E. Mohler, who has been with McPherson College for 39 years, is retiring as head of the Biology Department. Dr. Mohler has been with this institution since 1913, and during this time he has had four leave of absences. He taught at Mt. Morris College one year, also, but his contract with this college was for 40 years.

Dr. Mohler began his teaching career at Maccollege by teaching both Agriculture and Biology. He was also an athletic coach for three years.

Dr. Mohler has noticed changes in college and community as have the other retiring faculty members. The enrollment, when he first came, was composed of about 4 high school students. Some interesting facts are: there were only 17 Freshmen his first year, there was no college paper or annual, and there was chapel five times a week.

There were only four buildings on the college campus. Sharp Hall and the Library were here, but changes have been made on both. The old physical education build-

This Happened in America

Recently we celebrated Mother's Day. Immediately preceding it we observed Family Week. Some of us sent letters to our mothers or wired her a flower. Others of us forgot it. Mothers, being what they are, overlooked it and did not hold it against us.

For ten years the nation has selected each year the Mother of the Year. This has been done by two groups; first, the general overall American Mother of the Year has been selected by the Golden Rule Foundation. This selection is made without discrimination, religiously, or in any other way. A second group, the Catholics, likewise made a selection. They call their selection the Catholic Mother of the Year.

Many of us were greatly thrilled by the selections this year. The American Mother of the Year, selected from the many millions of mothers in America, was Mrs. Toy Len Goon, of Portland, Maine. Mrs. Toy is 57 years old. She is the mother of eight children. She was born in Canton, China, and came to America 30 years ago. With her two daughters she operates a laundry in her home town in Maine. She is a widow and has sent her children ahead in the free land of America to render service to their country. We can be happy that this selection was made.

The Catholic selection, this year, was Mrs. Maceea Thomas. Mrs. Thomas is 48 years old and is the mother of ten children. She is the first Negro woman to be selected for this honor. Her children, likewise, are developing into strong American citizens and her influence will be felt widely through them in the days ahead. Her husband is living and is a former president of the Catholic Laymen's Union, of New York.

The best rebuttal we can give to the contention of the Russian people and the Asiatic people that democracy does not work in this country and that we are prejudiced, biased, and discrimination nation is to make selections like this, and to publish these pictures

Regarding Dr. Mohler's plans for the future, he stated that his time will be spent on a volunteer basis to both the college and the church.

While the Mohler family is keeping McPherson as their home, they plan to travel—next winter they will go to Florida. Dr. Mohler plans to help in a few classes at the college the first semester next year. He also will be managing a number of farms.

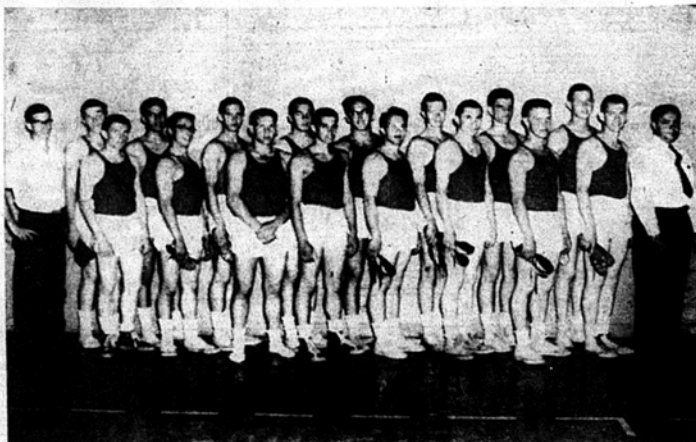
