One of the large contributions to the Dell family has been that of time in helping to clear away the ruined home. Prof. Guy Hayes headed up the clean-up operation. Students assisted in this work, being careful to sift through everything to check for anything which might be of value before hauling the wreckage away.

One item of concern was the lock box key which was needed in order to reach the insurance papers filed away in the bank. Thoughts had been that it might be necessary to bore around the box lock to gain entrance until Phil Pulliam discovered the charred key in the clean-up operation.

## Mac To Feature Summer School, Workshops, Trip

Summer school with courses in many departments of the college will be offered on college hill from June 4-August 3, as well as workshops in Natural Science and Speech, which will meet from May 31-June 4 for one-hour of credit each.

Courses to be taught are in the departments of sociology, philosophy, and religion, education, literature, physical education, music, and history.

A field trip to Mexico is scheduled for the dates of Aug. 3-24. The trip will be directed by Prof. Raymond Flory of the department of History. This offering is a reading and laboratory course in Mexican History which is largely constituted of travel and residence in Mexico. Three hours credit may be gained by taking the course.

Permission to enroll, and information on details of arrangements and costs must be obtained from the director, Professor Flory. Enrollment in this course is limited and will be based on the order in which requests are received. June 4 will be the final date for enrollment.

Prof. Wesley DeCoursey will be director of the Natural Science Workshop in which both biological and physical aspects of our environment will receive attention, and emphasis will be on phases of the science which will be applicable for the elementary teacher.

Dr. R. E. Mohler, Curator of the Museum, and Professor Emeritus of Biology, will be one of the instructors for the session.

Una Yoder, instructor of speech and dramatics, will direct a speech workshop which will seek to develop skills which will aid teachers in their presentations before both students and public groups.

Cost of the workshops will be \$2 each, since both are one-hour courses, and costs for the other summer sessions will also be \$15 per semester hour.

Nine hours is the maximum load for any summer student, and only one workshop will be available to anyone since they run simultaneously.

Miss Della Lehman, head of the English department, will give a reading entitled, "Star Symposium." Miss Doris Coppock, sponsor of WAA, will play a trombone solo, "Star Dust."

Officers for next year will be announced at the banquet. Election was held Monday night.

Mary Elizabeth Swinger, vice-president of WAA, is over-all chairman for the banquet. Other committees working on the banquet include Betty Holderread, Pat Schechter, Nancy Erisman, Marilyn Spohn, on the program committee, and Clara Zunkel, Charlene Reynolds, and Rita Evans, on the publicity committee.

The decorations committee consists of Jeanne Shively, Anita McSpadden, Joyce Miller, Bev Hall, and Betty Holloway.

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## Band Prepares For Concert

The McPherson College Band will give its spring concert at the Community Auditorium on Friday evening, May 6, at 8 p. m.

The band of 47 members under the direction of Prof. Donald R. Frederick, professor of voice and director of choral organizations here at Maccollege, will present a varied program of music.

After an opening march by Henry Fillmore, the band will play the "Light Cavalry Overture" of Von Suppe. The tone poem, "Finlandia" by Sibelius, will follow. "Two Woodland Sketches" by MacDowell and Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C Minor" will complete the first group of selections in the more classic vein.

Compositions of the more contemporary styling will also be presented by the band. "Mood Pastorals" by Harold Walters and "Praeludium" by Walters, and Ferde Grofe's "On the Trail" will add a rich and colorful flavor to the program. In addition, the band will play a couple of rhythm arrangements by Harold Walters and a new novelty of LeRoy Anderson's called "The Typewriter."

As special feature items, a saxophone quartet will play a number of David Bennett's entitled, "Saxophone Symphonette."

Martha Switzer will play a marimba solo with band accompaniment, and the brass choir of the band will perform a new piece composed by a senior student, Leon Albert.

The program will last about an hour.

While no admission charge will be made, opportunity will be given for contributions to the instrumental fund of the college. Aside from the cost of the musical repertoire and the need for additional school-owned instruments, there is real concern on the part of many that new uniforms should be purchased for the band.

## Profs Assist In Pre-Enrollment

Students have been making out their schedules for next year and talking with their advisors to complete their pre-enrollment.

Freshman advisors have been posted on the north bulletin board in Sharp Hall. Sophomores are instructed to choose their major and the professor of that field will serve as their advisor.

Two-year schedules were planned at the beginning of first semester this year for all juniors.

One purpose of pre-enrollment is to enable the faculty to plan ahead for their classes. It also gives an estimate on the number of books which will be required.

Even though these still operate it is good to know that over them and beyond them extends the common, upward thrust of desire on the part of all those of a community to help anyone who has suffered disaster within the community.

It was excellent to see the young people and the people of the church and community cleaning up the debris left by the fire. There will be still other things we can do to be helpful. Let us stand ready.

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## Go Ahead! They Say

Recently a review of this year's match-box appeared in the Spectator. An article concerning marriage also appeared in the K-State school paper which reads:

"A recent K-State survey shows that one of every five men on the campus is married (800 of 3,948), and it has been estimated that as many as 10 per cent of the women students also are married.

"In the K-State School of Veterinary Medicine more than half the students are married—136 out of 250. And the 136 couples have among them 115 children. Forty of the 57 graduating seniors this year are family men.

"How are the couples financed? The GI bill helps 463 of the 800, but most of these families supplement the GI payments by part-time work. Where there is no GI income, one or both almost always have part-time jobs, and parents frequently contribute.

"Two of every three wives work to help supplement the family income. Some take college work. "Couples are happier if both are in college," concluded Mrs. Jean Marchand after conducting a master's degree study at K-State in 1951 on what effect the married woman's attendance at school had on her own and her husband's activities.

"In a recent survey 25 K-State couples were asked what their advice would be to students contemplating marriage before graduation. Their unvarying reply was: 'Go ahead—if you can swing it financially. We've never been sorry.'"

## Bird Watchers Organize

Miss Virginia Harris, McPherson College librarian, and Mrs. Harold Beam, the wife of a Macollege trustee, have been appointed leaders of a bird study class sponsored by the adult education program of the Church of the Brethren.

The group of 24 has also asked Dr. R. E. Mohler, curator of the College Museum, to assist in leading the study.

At the first meeting books were distributed to the group. These will help the beginning bird watchers identify the different birds.

On April 27 the group had its second meeting. They met in the McPherson College Museum. Miss Harris gave a talk concerning the identification of birds.

Dr. Mohler also spoke and used some of the mounted birds in the museum for illustration purposes. He also gave a list of a number of books which would be helpful to use in the study.

In the group present at the College Museum were several Boy Scouts from a local group.

On Tuesday morning, April 26, the class met in the city park to identify some of the birds. At 5:30 in the morning the birds were very active, and this meeting gave the group a chance to see a number of the native birds of the McPherson region.

This class is chiefly interested in learning about the native birds of this area and state.

Several members of the class have already had some study in the field of bird watching in a class in nature study given by McPherson College.

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## Russian Editors To Observe U. S. Higher Education

NEW YORK, April 14—Twelve American colleges and universities, midwestern farms and factories, art museums, housing developments, public libraries, and a university music festival are on the itinerary of the eleven Soviet student editors who arrived in New York City April 19.

The editors of Soviet student and youth publications will also visit a western cattle ranch, a Broadway show, the Colonial Restoration of Williamsburg, Va., a Rotary lunch, a New Mexican Indian reservation, Wall Street, Sears, Roebuck and Hollywood.

Details of the thirty-day program have been worked out by the Institute of International Education in cooperation with the academic institutions which the Soviets will visit. Faculty and student government groups on these dozen campuses have rearranged campus schedules to take advantage of the Russian visit. Over 80 colleges and universities have extended invitations to the editors. The Institute was asked by the Department of State to arrange the editors' tour.

The editors, who are coming to the United States to acquaint themselves with American student life, will visit twelve colleges and universities from New York to California. Designed to show a cross-section of American higher education and student life, the itinerary includes visits to large private and public institutions—among them a land-grant college, a private college under religious direction, Negro college, and a small private college.

The schools, in the order of the trip, are: Hunter College, Fordham and Columbia Universities in New York City; Tuskegee Institute in Alabama; the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque; the University of California at Berkeley and Stanford University in California; Michigan State College at East Lansing and the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor; the University of Chicago; Oberlin College in Ohio; and Howard University in Washington, D.C.

In addition to their campus stops, the Soviet editors will glimpse a wide range of business, labor and community activities. They will eat lunch with the Albuquerque Rotary Club and attend a World Affairs Council luncheon in San Francisco. There will be time out for shopping

in New York, Chicago, and San Francisco. They will visit the American Tobacco Company plant in Richmond, Virginia, and Willow Run ("Ford") in Detroit. They will meet labor representatives in San Francisco and Detroit. At a New Mexican Indian reservation they will be introduced to the governor of the Domingos. They will tour newspaper plants in New York City, Richmond, and Smalltown Ohio, and public and private housing developments in New York and Chicago. They will visit a western cattle ranch and small Michigan and Ohio farms.

The United Nations headquarters, the New York Stock Exchange, a Sears Roebuck distribution center, a candlelight tour of Williamsburg's Colonial Capitol—these are the highlights of a tour which will show the diversity of the American scene. A long look at scenic wonders will be provided by the cross-country train ride from San Francisco to Chicago via Vista Dome.

The Soviet editors will see Radio City Music Hall in New York and a cinema in San Francisco. They have orchestra seats for "Pajama Game," popular Broadway musical. Their visit at the University of Michigan is timed for that school's music festival. The editors will hear a Prokofiev piano concerto played by Grant Johnson and the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra.

In New York the editors will visit the public library and art museums and they will see other art collections in Chicago and San Francisco.

Miss Della Lehman, professor of English at Macollege, gave a luncheon speech to the P.E.O. at Atchinson on April 11. Her speech, "Teacher on Wheels", was an account of her bicycle tour through Europe.

Eugen's chief interests are to further his education in sociology and to teach in a university.

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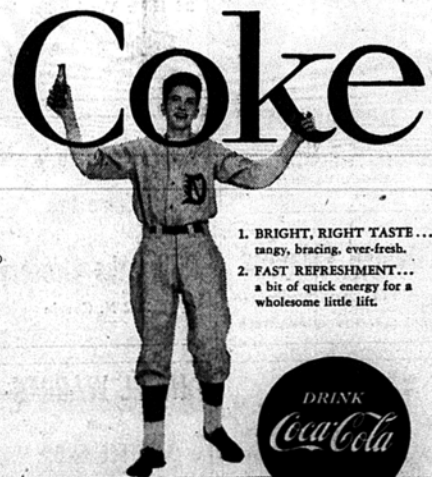
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
