## Junior To Leave Soon On 4-H Trip To Belgium

Eula Mae Marvey, junior at MacCollege from Conway, Kans., is planning to leave Kansas on June 10 to start the first leg of her journey to Belgium.

Eula Mae will spend the summer in Belgium as part of the 4-H Club International Farm Youth Exchange program. Each summer the program provides for the exchange of farm youth between the United States and other countries. Eula Mae and 12 other Kansas youth will board the train, "The Spirit of St. Louis" on June 10 and travel to Washington, D. C. The group will be in Washington for a week of orientation before leaving for their respective countries.

Eula Mae has already received some orientation for her trip. She has received five big letters from Washington telling her what type of clothes to take and a list of 500 expressions of the country she is to visit. She must learn them in French.

The Kansas Iveys, as they are called, have met three times at Kansas State College for orientation programs. They have discussed such subjects as farm organizations, our foreign policy, the typical American, and big business. These orientation programs were planned by the Iveys of last summer.

Eula Mae discovered that she is to take pop corn, cake mixes and such American things over to Belgium. With her. She also will have to take measuring cups and spoons since they have no standard

of measures there. On June 20 Eula Mae will travel to Quebec, Canada, where she will board the Ross Star for Belgium. When she arrives in Belgium she will be met by the Agricultural Attache of Brussels.

While in Belgium she is to live with four different families. She will help these families in harvesting and other farm work and she will also help in the house work. Eula Mae states that the Belgians eat five meals a day and usually the students going over there do not gain less than twenty pounds.

There are only two protestant churches there so Eula Mae will be attending the Catholic church while in Belgium.

Iveys receive no pay for their work abroad.

This program is financed partly by the county which raised \$700 and partly by the 4-H Foundation which furnished \$700. In return for being sent abroad the Iveys give talks here in the United States after their return.

Eula Mae has been very active during her years here at MacCollege. She is president of the Junior Class, was Homecoming Queen this year, and president of the Pep Club. Eula Mae has been active in debate, and cheerleading. For two years, she was an active 4-H Club member. During this time she won an airplane trip to Jacksonville, West Va., as a promotional leader and was reserve champion in the state style review.

During his four years at Mac, he has majored in Rural Life. He is engaged to Eula Mae Murry, junior, who will be spending the summer in Belgium.

Also teaching this summer will be Dr. Kenneth C. Reichel, professor of sociology and psychology and Mrs. Audrey San Roman, associate professor of piano and organ.

Only a few of the girls tried to save their belongings. But one young miss seemed perfectly content although clad only in her pajamas. She had thoughtfully pinned her fraternity and sorority pins on the pajama tops.

Recently received was a letter from the Brethren Placement Service in Elgin, Ill., stating that the General Brotherhood Board has authorized and formed a new service in the area of placement, including the placing of a full-time man on the job.

This will include the present Placement and Relocation column in the Gospel Messenger and also act as a referral agency to help locate and place interested persons in available jobs.

The system has been improved in that there is now follow-up and greater help in securing jobs than previously when ads were run in the Gospel Messenger for three weeks and then dropped.

The letter was sent to pastors and college paper editors in the hope that those needing work or workers would contact the service program. It was stated.
