Ladies Quartet Departs On Initial Tour Of The Year



Ladies' Quartet will be the first music deputation group to go on official tour for the college in this school year. They will be on tour from Oct. 24 until Oct. 31 in Minnesota. Glenn Swinger will accompany the girls and act as spokesman for the college.

Places the group will visit are: Worthington, Minneapolis, Barnum, Guthrie, Cando, Pleasant Valley, Milk River Valley, Grandview, Minn., Surrey and Carington.

Co-student directors for the group are: Evelyn Williams, junior from Worthington, Minn., and LaFaughn Hubbard, senior from Hugoton, Kans.

Members of the group are LaFaughn Hubbard, 1st soprano, Kathy Albin, 2nd soprano from Grundy Center, Ia., Evelyn Williams, 1st alto, and Donna Berry of Ottumwa, Ia., 2nd alto. "Grateful, O Lord," "Lord, Open Thou Our Eyes," "Holy God," "I'm Gwine to Sing in the Heavenly Choir," "Trees," "The World is Waiting for the Sunrise," and "September Song" arranged by Leon Albert are some of the songs in their repertoire.

The quartet made their first appearance away from the college this year when they sang at the Garden City District Meeting, Oct. 9; afterwards Dean James

M. Berkebile showed colored slides of the college. The group arrived home at 3 o'clock Sunday morning.

The group has been placing extra practice periods in their schedule the past few weeks in order to memorize the sixteen songs they will have in the repertoire as they sing in the land of the legendary Paul Bunyan.

Evelyn was a member of last year's Ladies' Quartet and LaFaughn has sung with the college trio for the past two years.

Ladies' Trio featuring the voices of Jo Eva Reinecker, 1st soprano from Quinter, Kans., Marlene Jamison, 2nd soprano from Quinter, and Alma Godfellow, 1st alto from Lyons, Kans., as well as accompanist for the group, Birdene Jamison of Quinter are scheduled for a tour through Nebraska during the week of Oct. 31 to Nov. 7.

Brett prefers to stay at home to improve educational facilities, and he is supported in his struggle against illiteracy by Geneva, a

young Southern girl with an eager mind not yet hardened by the evils of the world.

The wedding plans of Miss Alyce and her Northern playwright do not come close to the elaborate weddings of the day of Alyce's father Senator Langdon. He is a crochety old fellow with as many aches as he has pills and vice versa.

Cousin Roy is the family's politician and manages to change his mind completely in one day.

Honey, the young girl servant, has a struggle proving to herself that honesty with one's soul is better than money in one's pocket, if you didn't earn it.

This modern play, "Deep Are The Roots" brings a variety of action onto the stage. The characters depicted are not of the average nor typical type, neither is a solution offered for the question which the play presents.

On Tuesday, Feb. 24, 1942, at 2:30 p. m., the New Fahnestock Hall was dedicated. Dr. W. W. Peters presided over the service.

This Hall was built for \$50,000. Of this amount \$13,000 was paid out for student help. McPherson dealers were patronized to the fullest extent possible during the construction of this Hall.

There are 32 rooms for students, which are all occupied, a comfortable lounge and a three room apartment for the head residents located on part of second floor.
