Dr. D. W. Bittinger and Dean James M. Berkebile left last Sunday for St. Louis, Mo. Dr. Bittinger attended the annual meeting of the American Association of Colleges which began Tuesday to discuss college problems.

The Brethren Church colleges had a special meeting Monday, which both Dean Berkebile and Dr. Bittinger attended. Dean Berkebile gave a report on scholarships and student aid for the church college meeting, and he was back on campus Tuesday. Dr. Bittinger did not arrive back until Thursday.

Dr. Bittinger gave the invocation before the second general session of the Association of American Colleges. He was one of more than 800 representatives of state and privately endowed colleges and universities attending the three-day meeting.

The theme of the meeting was "Liberal Education: Scholarship and Teaching."

Principal speakers on the program included His Excellency Arnold D. P. Heany, Ambassador of Canada; the Honorable Herold C. Hunt, undersecretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare; and William McPeak, vice president of the Ford Foundation.

Organist Guild Honors Carl Weinrich At Reception

Following the Weinrich concert Thursday evening, the Lindsborg chapter of the organ guild held a reception in the church parlors for Carl Weinrich. The members of the organ guild, who come from Lindsborg, McPherson, and College music faculty members attended the reception.

Dr. and Mrs. D. W. Bittinger represented McPherson College in the reception line.

Carl Weinrich is considered both a scholar and a virtuoso on the organ. He has given concerts in both United States and Europe and recently recorded in Sweden.

His program includes a variety of numbers from 16th century European numbers to contemporary numbers.

Since 1943, Weinrich has been university organist and choirmaster at Princeton University. In 1956 he was invited by Harvard University to give eight recitals as Lamb Visiting lecturer - the first time this lecturership had been awarded to a performer.

For many years he was one of the artists on the Arts Program of the Association of American Colleges. Music critics have given acclaim to the perfection and to the imaginative and dramatic quality of Weinrich's playing.

Carl Weinrich is ranked by Time Magazine with Marcel Dupre and Albert Schweitzer as one of the three greatest living players of Bach's organ music. He has recorded and given many recitals of the great music of the pre-Bach period.

Weinrich was born in Paterson, N. J., in 1904. He graduated from New York University with a major in English literature and was awarded a scholarship at the Curtis Institute, where he studied under Lynnwood Farnam.

After Farnam's death in 1930, Weinrich was appointed to succeed him at the Church of the Holy Communion in New York. Here Weinrich continued the series of recitals which had made the church a center for music lovers in the metropolitan district.

In 1964, Weinrich transferred his address to Princeton, where he became head of the Organ Department of the Westminster Choir College and where he remained until 1940.

During this period he made many concert tours and began the series of recordings of the music of Bach and his forerunners which brought the acclaim of record critics everywhere.

In addition to his other appointments, he has taught organ at Wellesley College, Vassar College, the University of Michigan, and Columbia University.

The main staging problem is the huge wash tub needed for "In the Suds."

"The Pot Boiler" is a melodrama which is a satire of play production and writing. If anyone would really want to know the basis of what constitutes a play, the director states this is a good opportunity to learn.

Thomas Pinikles Sud, portrayed by Duane Fike, is a hardened playwright beginning rehearsals on his new play. Wouldby is a would-be playwright who comes to rehearsal to learn the finer points of playwrighting. The part is played by Dale Shenfeld.

Mr. Ivory, the financier, comes on the scene to announce that he is broke. Larry Sanders plays the part. Something must be done for his niece, Miss Ivory, or Marlene Moats, the heroine. Carl Harris plays the part of Mr. Ruler, the hero.

"In the Suds" is a farce which has been translated from the original French. The whole play is in rhyme which lends to the comedy and makes it easy for the cast to memorize.

It is a story of a henpecked husband named Jacques, who is portrayed by Gary Carlson, who is nagged by his wife Jeanette, played by Kathy Burkholder, and his

A Service of Communion, derived from the Liturgy of the Church of South India as it was celebrated at the Second Assembly of the World Council Churches at Evanston, Ill., in the summer of 1954, provided the basis for the communion service held in the McPherson Church of the Brethren Jan. 8.

The service began with the call to worship followed by a prayer of confession. Appropriate scripture was read and then Rev. Harry K. Zeller, Jr. presented a short meditation on the legacy which has come down through the ages.

Following the period of meditation, there was a responsive reading of prayers and thanksgivings. Then communion of the bread and cup was observed. Following the communion, a departing prayer was read in unison.

The elements of the communion were ministered by the men who served as the canvassers in the recent Building Fund Drive.

Block System Added To Education Department

Beginning in the fall semester of 1956, McPherson College plans to go to a block system of student teaching in the Department of Education.

The block system of student teaching means that all of the student teaching required of each student will be done all at once. Instead of spending approximately one hour a day in student teaching, each student will spend the entire day in the school class room during the student teaching period.

The block system includes one full semester of education and psychology courses for all prospective teachers. Each student is enrolled for 15 hours of education at that time.

Such courses as adolescent psychology and guidance will be included in the block, and it would be wise for students to refrain from enrolling in them the second semester of this year or until their particular area of the block system of student teaching. Other courses needed in the major field or other general requirements should be taken until then.

Rev. A. Blair Helman, pastor of the Wichita Church of the Brethren and trustee of McPherson College, was recently appointed to the position of president of Manchester College, North Manchester, Indiana.

Rev. Helman attended McPherson College from 1944 to 1946 and was at that time a student minister at the Newton Church of the Brethren. After graduating he became pastor of the Ottawa Church and while at Ottawa he did some teaching at Ottawa University and also attended the University of Kansas.

He is a history major and will get his P.H.D. this summer having completed all his work except his dissertation.

Rev. Helman is chairman of the Southwest Kansas District Board, and chairman of the executive board of the Board of the Western Region Board and also on the executive board. In 1954-55 he was chairman of the Regional Council and also chairman of the executive board in 1955-56. He was the chairman of the State Field Committee.

He will take over his new position the first of August. Manchester is the largest of the Brethren Colleges serving over a district of over 50,000 members.

Debaters Contest

College Stillwater, Okla.; Phillips University, Enid, Okla.; Garden City Junior College, Garden City, Mo.; and McPherson College, McPherson, Kans.

The McPherson team which won all four rounds was Don Faules and Don Ullom. Other McPherson debaters were: Norris Harms and Dwight Oltman; Al Gibbons and Jim DeVine; Billy Joe Hildreth and John Schrag; Lyall Sherrad and Gary Pamber; Richard Bittinger and Larry Hayes; and Erma Lea Brewer and Glenna Hawbaker.

Frank Guy Hayes, director of the tournament, would like to thank all the faculty and students who helped with judging and timing so that the tournament could run smoothly.

Each student will be spent in taking full time education courses to help in the understanding and development of the pupil and instruction methods.

The following nine weeks will be spent entirely in student teaching in the school class room.

The last four weeks will again be spent in studying courses to understand the pupil and instruction methods.

The blocks of teaching will take the full time of both the student and the college instructors in the Department of Education for the semester.

It will be necessary to provide work by special arrangement to a number of students who have worked out part of their professional work and cannot fit into the block the first year of its innovation because it would involve loss of time or considerable overlapping of course work.

Wherever it is necessary to modify a program to meet a need during this changeover, the adjustment will try to be made in the Department of Education rather than in the other fields of study.
