Seniors To Receive Diplomas May 27

Maccollege To Offer Workshops, Summer Session

McPherson College is offering two workshops this summer. Those courses offered will be Growth of Culture and Problems in Arts and Crafts. One hour credit apiece will be given for these courses, and the fee will be \$15 apiece whether taken for credit or not.

Registration for the workshops will be from 8 to 9 a.m. Tuesday, May 29. The workshops will convene at 9 o'clock on Tuesday, May 29, and close on Saturday, June 2, at noon. Only one workshop is available to any student since they run simultaneously.

On Friday and Saturday morning, June 1 and 2, there will be enrollment for the summer session with classes convening at 7:40 a.m. June 4. There will be a holiday recess on July 4, and the summer session will close at noon on August 1.

Classes will meet 5 days a week. Tuition in regular courses per semester hour will be \$15, and room will be \$3 a week.

Courses which will be offered will be as follows: 7:40 - 8:40 - Elementary School Science, Introduction to Education, Educational Psychology, Astronomy, Social Science for Children. At the 8:45 - 9:45 hour Biology, Conducting, Principles of Guidance, Educational Sociology and Intermediate Zoology.

Speech Theory will be offered. Courses offered during the 9:50-10:50 hour will be Speech, Instruction Methods, Materials and Observation in the Elementary School, Life Instruction, Teachings of Jesus, Criminology, Trans-Mississippi West, and Music History and Appreciation.

From 10:55-11:55 - Twentieth Century Europe, Elementary School Music, Life and Letters of Paul, Nontypical Child and Reading.

Individual Leadership will be offered. Any other course for which five students arrange to enroll may be offered.

Organ, Piano, Voice, and Problems in Education will be offered by appointment. Consultation with individual instructors should be made previous to enrollment.

A maximum of nine hours can be taken during the regular session.

Meals will be available at the College Inn. Kline Hall will be open to women during the workshops and the summer session. The library will be air-conditioned.

All candidates for graduation at the conclusion of the summer session should have notified the Registrar of these intentions before May 1, 1956. Otherwise, diplomas may not be obtained until June 1, 1957.

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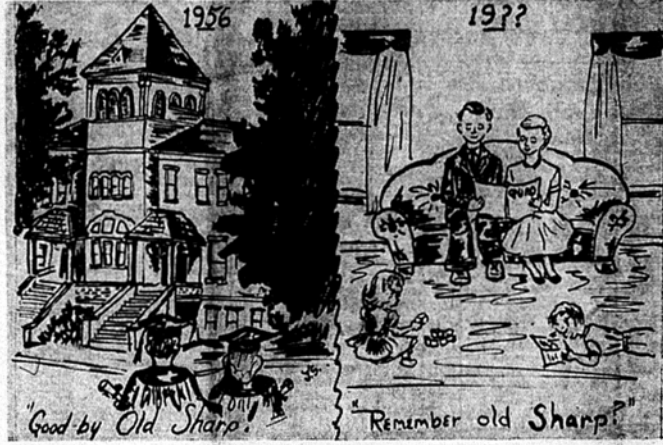
Last year Don received one of the two junior scholarship awards for high scholastic standing; he received the same award at the end of his sophomore year.

To Attend Seminar... Dr. Olson Receives Fellowship To W.U.

The University of Wisconsin has recently granted an Economics-in-Action Fellowship to Dr. O. A. Olson, professor of economics, of McPherson College. This will enable him to participate in a four-week summer program provided for a small group of college economics teachers.

The program runs from June 26 to July 29. Economics-in-Action sessions are of three types: informal classroom discussions on the university campus, in the plants and offices of various business and industrial concerns, and in evening seminars at hotels and other central meeting places.

The purpose of the program is to enable participants to get acquainted with the operations of industry by means of first-hand observation, and by explanations of business executives. Among the instructors in Economics-in-Action program will be economists from business, government, and universities.

The Foundation for Economic Education, Inc., whose headquarters are at Irvington-on-Hudson, New York, has invited Dr. O. A. Olson of McPherson College to participate in an economics seminar at the Foundation headquarters during the period June 11-22.

Dr. Olson will be a member of a group of sixteen economics professors selected from all parts of the United States who will assemble at Irvington-on-Hudson for this seminar during the middle of June. Discussion at the seminar will deal with economic problems related to the system of free-enterprise.

The retreaters will sleep out Saturday night. Everyone should bring a sleeping bag or several blankets. Food for the meals during the retreat will be furnished from the class treasuries.

A half-hour worship service will be planned for Sunday morning. Dr. Raymond Flory will be the speaker.

The retreaters will leave the park to return to the Maccollege campus after dinner Sunday.

Thompson, who will be given an honorary degree, will speak on "A New Birth of Freedom." Dr. Maurice A. Hess will present Thompson for the honorary degree.

Rev. A. Blair Helman, who will also receive an honorary degree, will be presented by Dr. Burton Metzler. Rev. Helman was recently appointed president of Manchester College and will assume that position this summer.

Kansas Wesleyan's Larry Houdek is the defending champion in both the low and high hurdles. Wesleyan's Toby Toburen is the defending broad jump champion, but three others are slated to be strong contenders. McDaniel of Baker has jumped 21 feet, 8 inches this season, and Widrig and Ragland have both leaped over 21 feet.

Don Penner of Bethel will return to defend his shot title and will also be a strong contender in the discus. Ronald Anderson will be the discus man to watch. Ron threw the plate 157 feet, 2 1/2 inches last week against C. of E. for a new McPherson College record.

Willie Gaines of Emporia will be trying for another victory in both the 100 and the 200 yard dashes. He has been timed at 9.7 in the 100 and 22.2 in the 200 so far this season. Willie won both events in the triangular meet here May 7.

Paul Smith of Wesleyan is the defending 400 champion, but the favorite in that distance this year is Bob F. Knight, an Ottawa freshman, who has been clocked at 50.2.

Bob L. Knight of Ottawa will be favored in the 880, but Meyer of Baker has run the distance in two minutes flat. Knight has run it in 2:02.0.

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Sports News By George!

Looks like the sporting world will keep an eye on this boy Dave Sime. He has set a new world record for the 220 yard low hurdles and threatened the world mark in the 100 yard dash. Last Friday he set a new world record in the 220 yard dash, flashing over the course in 20.1.

The old record had been 20.2, set in 1949 by Mel Patton of Southern California.

One of the amazing things about this lad is that he is both durable and versatile. He runs the 100, the 220, the low hurdles, and throws the shot and discus. He is one-man track team for Duke University.

It isn't often that a forest fire comes close enough to a major highway to allow the driving public to see it. But that's what happened a few miles north of Colorado Springs last Saturday. Somebody dropped a cigarette, and 45 mile per hour winds fanned the spark into an inferno that didn't quit until over 2,000 acres of beautiful timberland lay in ashes.

The entire sky seemed covered with smoke. The flames were visible only as a dull glow against the smoky overcast. Occasionally a large pipe, superheated by the searing flames, exploded in a pillar of bright red flame that towered 200 feet in the air.

A forest fire is a very impressive sight to the casual observer.

Reforestation is a slow process, made infinitely slower by a forest fire. The intense heat burns up most of the soil's nitrogen, and all of the near-surface organic matter. It is a futile task to try to replace the lost growth elements artificially in a burned area that large. Nature must work her slow wonders alone.

In 30 years, the area should have a few juniper bushes growing on it. In 40 years, a few aspen will start to take root at the edges of the burn. Later, the pine will replace the aspen; and eventually, all 2000 acres will be covered with a fine stand of lodgepole pine. But not in your lifetime, nor mine.

It's something to think about when you are building a fire without precautions or in a restricted area, or smoking carelessly in the woods.

Golfers Take Fourth In League

The McPherson College golf team took fourth place in the annual conference meet on Ottawa University's windswept, watery course. Unfortunately, only four teams participated.

Baker University won the tournament, playing the 54 holes with 1,034 strokes. Kansas Wesleyan was second with 1,195; Bethany third with 1,254, and McPherson scored 1,274.

Eric Erickson of Baker was the match medalist with 247 and Bob Jones, also of Baker, was second with 252. These two men won the two-man title.

Lee Danyluk took fifth place in the final standings with a 274. Robert Schmidt scored 302, J. W. Van Blaricum shot 342, and Bob Wise finished with 356.

The Bulldogs were leading Bethany until the last nine, when a treacherous water hazard defeated them. This marks the end of one of the best golf seasons McPherson has had.
