Wilbur Bastin, a senior from Kansas City, Mo., served his alternative service term from September 1953, until September, 1955. For the first year and one half he was in New Windsor, Md. The last six months he worked at the Cedars in McPherson.

In New Windsor, Wilbur was in charge of the print shop. They printed all the promotion material for Heifer Project, Refugee Resettlement, Student Exchange, Material Aid, plus literature for Church World Service, and Lutheran World Relief.

The I-W unit in New Windsor had many extra-curricular activities. As a group they visited surrounding churches and gave programs. Some of the other places visited were New York and Washington, D. C.

The group filled thirteen food boxes at Christmas time and distributed them to needy Negro families in Baltimore. Also the group sponsored a heifer to be sent to Europe.

When Wilbur visited the various churches, he would see the folders and other information which his office had printed, and then when the response came in, he would indirectly see that he was doing some good in his own small way.

Wilbur felt that these last two years were two of the best years of his life. He felt that he had the highest type of fellowship with those who had high standards for their own life.

His work at the Cedars was mostly maintenance work. Here he had the feeling that his work was appreciated very much. The home gives the people the feeling that they really belong somewhere and are not completely forgotten.

Wilbur's wife, Ruth, was with him the last two years. For her BVS work, she was a secretary in the business office in New Windsor. At the Cedars she was a nurse.

Jobs Are Open In Washington

A new examination is now open for Student Trainee positions in the fields of physics, metallurgy, chemistry, cartography, engineering, mathematics, meteorology and oceanography, the U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced.

The jobs are in the Potomac River Naval Command and in various other Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and the nearby area, and pay from \$2,890 to \$3,415 a year.

College students who have completed (or will complete within nine months) filing application) either one, two, or three years of study leading to a bachelor's degree with major study in one of the optional fields listed above may apply.

The program consists of periods of on-the-job training at a federal agency alternating with attendance at a cooperating college or university. In some fields, trainees may be employed only during the summer months and attend college during the entire school year. Waitlist tests will be given.

Further information and application forms may be obtained at many post offices throughout the country, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Scientific and Technical Personnel of the Potomac River Naval Command, Building 72, Naval Research Laboratory, Washington, D. C., and will be accepted until April 18, 1956.

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Mexico Offers Money To American Students

Nov. 1, 1955, is the closing date for application for graduate fellowships for study in Mexico during 1956, it was announced today by Kenneth Holland, President of the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York City. One month remains in which to apply for the fellowships which are offered to American students by the Mexican Government.

The awards, which are given through the Mexico-United States Commission on Cultural Cooperation, are for the academic year beginning March 1, 1956.

Eligibility requirements for the Mexican Government awards are U. S. citizenship, knowledge of Spanish, a good academic record, a valid project or purpose, and good health. Preference will be given to graduate students, but undergraduates (juniors and seniors) are also eligible for awards.

Fields of study especially recommended for graduate candidates are architecture, Indian and physical anthropology, ethnology, archaeology, museography, art (painting—for advanced students), biological sciences, Mexican history. Candidates with an M.D. degree may receive special training at the National Institute of Cardiology and the Institute of Tropical Medicine, Mexico City.

Applicants may write for information to the U. S. Student Department of the Institute of International Education, the agency which administers the Mexican Government awards.

DeCoursey Tests Soils; Also Analyzes Intoximeters

The private laboratory of Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, head of the Chemistry Department, houses many interesting things. To one not well versed in the field of chemistry, one look into the lab does not reveal very much. But after a few minutes of explanation

much of the formerly uninteresting equipment takes on a new light.
 One part that takes up quite a bit of space is the soil testing equipment. Dr. DeCoursey works with McPherson County Agent, Elgin R. Button, in running soil analysis tests.

Sante To Explain Civil Service Jobs

Mr. Jack Sante, United States Civil Service Commission Representative, will be on the McPherson College campus on Oct. 27.

Mr. Sante will appear in the United States History and United States Government classes and will discuss a variety of positions available to college students who pass the Federal Service Entrance Examination.

Mr. Sante will also hold an open meeting for all interested students in room 302 of Harnly Hall at 1:15 p.m.

An announced objective of the United States Civil Service Commission, according to Mr. Philip Young, chairman, is "to bring into the federal service each year the best of the nation's young college graduates and to provide for them the kind of working conditions under which they can build useful and satisfying careers."

This year, an estimated 7,000 trainee type positions in the federal government will be filled by college graduates.

The visit to Maccollege will be one in a series of visits by commission representatives to major colleges and universities throughout the country.

The entrance-level salary for most of the positions is \$306 per month or \$3,670 per year. The positions generally include a training period and provide for periodic promotions in keeping with employee development and performance.

Copies of the announcement of the federal service entrance examination and information on filing procedures may be obtained from the history office.

Individual interviews with Mr. Sante may also be arranged throughout the day when he is not scheduled for group meetings. He will be in Dean James M. Berkebile's office for conferences.

Now in the third year of soil testing, nearly one thousand samples have been tested. From the results of these tests, the County Agent can advise the farmer what sort of fertilizer would be most practical for the crop to be planted in this field.

The soil is tested for the amount of potash, phosphates, and organic matter present. None of the soil samples from this area have shown a lack of potash, therefore, any farmer who uses a complete fertilizer is putting some unnecessary compounds into the soil.

Also the soil is tested for the acidity to determine how much, if any, lime, is needed to make the soil nearly chemical neutral.

The farmers bring the soil sample to the County Agent. The soil is first mixed well then ground into a fine powder. From this powder Dr. DeCoursey runs the analysis of the soil.

Dr. DeCoursey has brought different types of soils back to McPherson from various parts of the country. He has noticed from the tests of these soils that the amount of fertilizer needed and the length of time that the land has been farmed go hand in hand.

The lab work is not entirely devoted to work with soils, however. Dr. DeCoursey also analyzes intoxicimeters for McPherson and Rice counties and the cities of McPherson and Lyons when necessary.

Other odds and ends are also brought into the lab from time to time such as water samples, milk samples, and boiler rust samples.

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Bulldogs Meet Coyotes At KWU Tomorrow Night

McPherson College Bulldogs tackle Kansas Wesleyan University in a conference battle at KWU tomorrow night at 7:30 p. m.

Probable starting line-up for McPherson will be quarterback Ed Wolf, fullback Merle Rolfs, and halfbacks Galen Stucky and Ron Sams. Center will be Louis Roberts.

Ends will probably be Vernon Pefefish and Bill Smith; guards, Bob Barker and Bob Wise; and tackles, Don Moeller and Steve Bersuch.

The KWU Coyotes have fifteen returning lettermen, including all-conference quarterback, Bob Hastings, who set a new school passing record last year and had a brilliant season at Quarters. His generalship led the Coyotes to their best year since the World War II.

A lateral from Elm to Ortiz was good for nine yards, then Emporia made two first downs in a row, reaching the Bulldogs 24. Washington went over three plays later to score. An attempt for the extra point failed.
