

Victory Over Swedes Gives Mac 5-2 Conference Record

Six MacCollege seniors played their last football game for the Bulldogs when they downed their arch rivals, the Bethany Swedes, 20-7 at the College Stadium last weekend.

This score marked the end of the season for both teams, leaving McPherson a 5-2 conference record and Bethany a 1-6 conference record. This places McPherson in third place in the conference.

The first tally of the game, which was made by Bethany, was nullified because of a backfield in motion penalty.

Shortly after, Merle Rolfs intercepted a Swede pass and ran it back 40 yards for the first score. Rolfs also kicked the extra point.

Second Quarter Scoreless Neither team scored in the second quarter, although the Bulldogs reached the Swede 5 yard line once to lose the ball on downs after an incomplete pass into the end zone.

In the third period, neither team made much headway for some time until Mac started a drive which took them to the Swede 3-yard line where Rolfs plunged over for the score. He also attempted the conversion, but it was blocked.

Swede Threat The Swedes presented a threat when they intercepted a pass and returned it to their own 3. They made two first downs in a row to reach the McPherson 40, but were stopped when Richard Keim intercepted a pass.

After several plays, Widrig ran 32 yards on a reverse play for the third Mac touchdown. His extra point attempt was good.

Swede TD The only Swede TD of the game was made on a 90-yard kickoff run-back by Bob Blair behind good blocking. An unsuccessful dive was made for Blair on the 15-yard line by Widrig. Richard Rome kicked the extra point.

Twelve McPherson backs carried the ball for a total of 227 net yards, while seven Bethany backs carried for a total of 132 net yards rushing.

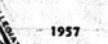

Arlene Merkey Writes Of European Experiences

(Editor's Note: Arlene Merkey, a '56 Mac graduate, is now doing BVS work in Europe.)
Dear Friends,

I have been wanting to take time and write a letter to you for some time but it seems that the time goes as fast in Europe as it did in college and it is hard to find time to do everything that I would like to do.

I have thought of you many times and especially since school has begun again. I hope that you will have another good school year and I am sure there are many new members in the Mac family.

I surely missed not getting ready for school, moving back to the dorm, all the activities, etc., but I have had many thrills of new experiences and am truly happy that I made it to Europe.

Our unit training at New Windsor was very nice and helpful in many ways. I was the only one from McPherson College in my unit but I let them know what a good school we had and I won't be surprised if two or three persons decide to attend McPherson College in the next year or so.

I was surprised that many churches in the East do not know much about the BVS program. We visited a few churches and told about the program. I'm sure many of them were very surprised to know that we have such an extensive youth program.

I'm really proud of the way McPherson College upholds BVS and gives opportunity for the young people of our church to participate in such work of the church. I'm sure that I will never regret doing such work myself.

There were six from our unit assigned for Europe and we all came over on the New Amsterdam together. Europe is quite different from the U. S. but as we learn more German each day we get better acquainted with the people and find them to be more like us.

German is difficult to learn, but I have hopes of learning it well enough that I will be able to really talk to people. Since we arrived here in the Brethren House in Kassel, we have been working in the mornings and spending the afternoons learning German.

They have placed us each in a German home. We go to our homes each evening at 5 and come back at 8 a.m. My family is really wonderful to me. Of course, we each think our own family is the best.

I have three sisters younger than I and a mother and a father. They have a very small apartment, and I am truly amazed to think they would crowd up even more and make room for me.

My father is an engineer and has a pretty good job. He speaks English and is very good to help me learn German. It is really wonderful to have a family over here and feel like you are at home even though your American home is far away.

There is much reconstruction

going on and they have done a very good job in rebuilding the city of Kassel. We visited the city government and were shown the plan for the new city. They will have a beautiful modern city when they are finished building.

The other week we were permitted to attend a heifer distribution which was held south of Frankfurt. It was quite an experience and one that I will not soon forget. It was thrilling to see the response from the refugees who received a heifer and the gratitude in their eyes.

On the way back we went through Hochheim Main and I stopped long enough to look up Ann and Eugene. It was wonderful to see her again and she looks fine. Eugene and Christa were not at home, but I met Ann's mother.

Elsie Lucore and I write back and forth but I have not seen her since I have arrived in Germany. She is working very hard and I know is doing a wonderful job. She may be able to come to Kassel before she starts school. May God bless you all in your work.

old material has been removed. The Oxford Companion to American Literature by James D. Hart has been added to by new entries and changes in old entries. This is the third edition.

Webster's Geographical Dictionary covers not only modern times but also Biblical times, ancient Greece and Rome, medieval Europe, and World Wars I and II.

The Westminster Historical Atlas to the Bible contains new information on the Dead Sea Scrolls and other archaeological discoveries, new photographs and drawings, and a new index of modern place names.

Faculty Discuss Good Teachers

Supt. Ross Potwin, of the McPherson City schools, spoke yesterday morning at the Maccollege faculty meeting.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the use of practice teaching students in McPherson schools, and how McPherson College is measuring up to the desired standards in teacher training.

English Requirements Raised For Class A

Beginning English teachers in Class A schools in Kansas will need to meet new requirements Sept. 1, 1957, the State Department of Public Instruction has announced.

However, these requirements are not retroactive to teachers in service unless they change position.

A course in advanced composition and a course in American literature are among the new requirements adopted by the State Board of Education in May.

In the 24 hours of English required for a teacher in a Class A school, 15 hours are to be in basic English courses of composition and literature.

In addition to the 15 hours a course in speech is also required. A minimum of six semester hours is required in any particular subject taught including debate, dramatics, speech, literature, composition, and journalism.

The Board did not change the requirements for Class B and C schools.

The Kansas College Teachers of English had sponsored the change in requirements, but the group had also suggested changes in the Class B and C requirements.

Two years of her undergraduate work were taken at Emporia State Teachers College in Kansas.

Dr. Fee has had teaching experience in all of the elementary grades, except first grade. For a period of time she was principal of the Stafford, Kas., grade school.

After completing her graduate study, Dr. Fee taught two years in the Martha Berry Schools near Rome, Ga.

During her first tenure at McPherson College, Miss Fee inaugurated the student teaching program for college students in the McPherson schools.

She has been very active in the development of the new block system of student teaching which was initiated this fall.

As a lover of birds, Miss Fee has developed a real interest in ornithology. Reading is another interest to which she devotes her leisure time.

Dr. Fee plans to retire at Stafford, Kas., where she is anticipating living in a new residence.

He became ill as he and his wife were on vacation after their retirement this fall.

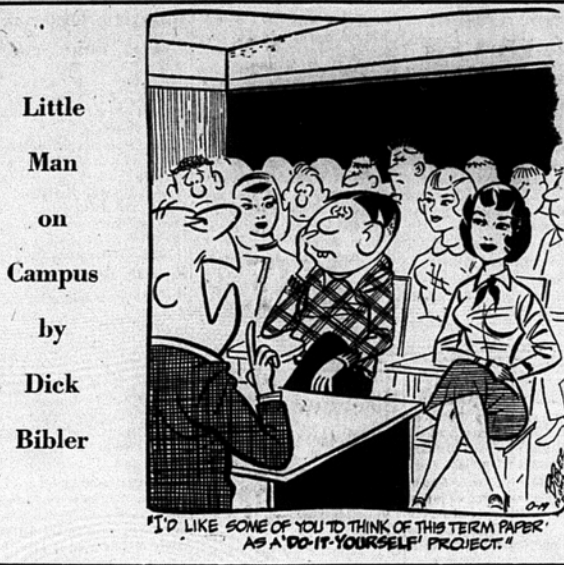
