Delk played his usual fine floor game by setting up plays and controlling the ball both offensively and defensively.

The half ended with a 42-23 advantage for the Bulldogs. At the start of the second half the local team hit a cold spot and Kansas Wesleyan cut the lead down to 9 points before the Bulldogs found the range.

The entire squad was used in this game and most of them scored.

Greek Student Adjusts To American Food, Weather

"I'm just a year late in enrolling," states 20-year-old Anna Vassiloff, dark-haired student from Thessalonica, Greece, as she starts her courses here this week.

Anna first made arrangements to enroll at Macollege last January. Her next scheduled enrollment, for this past September, also fell through. Now, one year later, her dreams are being achieved.

The 20-year-old junior arrived here Wednesday, Jan. 23. She wants to study medical psychology in the States four years, then return to Greece "to help my country."

The friendly help she received throughout her traveling to McPherson impressed this Grecian girl. "Our people are friendly, but are not organized to help as you are with such agencies as travelers' aid."

A background of six years of English and six months of work as an interpreter for American films shown in Greek theaters, helped Anna avoid a language difficulty. Her major adjustment is to American food.

"I could not eat at all on the train coming here," she explains. "Your bread is sweet, not like the white and black bread that we have. And the meat which was in the sandwiches I bought, we do not have either."

The absence of oil, lemon, onion, garlic, which the Greeks use in their cooking, makes American food unpleasant for Anna.

She was shocked when offered a serving of corn at a School of Basic Belief meal at the college church recently. She explains, "In Greece we eat corn as a memorial to someone who has died."

"Forty days after their death we mix corn, sugar, vanilla, caramels, and rice, and it is eaten by friends and relatives of the deceased who say, 'I am eating this. Let God forgive him.'"

Homogenized milk is preferred by Anna to the raw milk of her

native country. She also expresses a liking for the American hot dog and Cokes. Cokes are nearly non-existent in Greece. The few sold in that country are priced at three dollars a bottle.

Nearly as strange to Anna as American food, is the cold weather. Kansas winds have been providing. Wind is not unusual for her as she explains that it blows continually in Thessalonica, but it is not as cold as Kansas.

McPherson became less of a strange place for Anna soon after her arrival when she met Bill Klatsounis, 20-year-old Greek student and Andy Pavlos, local business.

But neither the unfamiliar snow nor strange food are daunting Anna in her determination to like her new home. "I will dress extra warmly and the food I must eat so I will get used to it," she states.

The Living of These Days is the autobiography of Harry Emerson Fosdick, one of America's most famous preachers.

Reinhold Niebuhr: His Religious, Social, and Political Thought edited by Charles W. Kegley and Robert W. Bretall is divided into two parts. The first part is an autobiography and the second contains criticisms and interpretations of Niebuhr's work by twenty outstanding scholars.

The State in the New Testament by Oscar Cullmann attempts to answer the problem of the relationship between the church and the state in the light of the New Testament.

tian beliefs in simple terms so that they can easily be understood.

Christian Love in Everyday Living by Owen Hutchison, based on the "love chapter" of First Corinthians, emphasizes the demands and the positive values of Christian love.

The Negro in American Culture by Margaret Just Butcher tells of what America has done for Negroes and what they in turn have done for this country.

The Hopi Indians by Harry C. James describes the life of these desert people in the past and in the present. The Hopis adopted the author because of his help in abuses on the reservation in the 1920's.

How to Become a Better Reader by Paul Witty shows how to read faster and with more understanding.

Overeating Cuts Life Expectancy

Have you ever been told that you "ate like a bird"? If so, you would eat, proportionately, eight tons of food instead of the 1,300 pounds estimated as the average consumption per person per year.

At present, being overweight is one of the most damaging kinds of malnutrition in the United States. Life insurance companies' statistical figures show that at the age period of 40-44 years an excess of 20 per cent in weight means a 30-40 per cent increase in mortality above the normal for those ages.

Not only is life expectancy lessened, but overweight people are more susceptible to functional diseases of the heart and circulatory system, the kidneys, and to diabetes.

Causes of Overweight

Overeating is partly the cause of overweight, but lack of exercise is sometimes a greater cause. By considering the bird and the amount it eats, its amount of exercise should speak well for weight-controlling value.

Not more than one or two pounds should be lost in one week. By taking fifteen times what your normal weight should be, you can discover how many calories you need each day for body processes.

How to Reduce

To reduce weight, the number of calories should be 500 to 1,000 less each day. By lowering caloric intake by 500 calories per day from the number needed to carry on body processes, three-fourths

of a pound can be lost in a week.

No one should exclude any of the basic seven foods to lose weight. Fat foods may be limited slightly and fewer starchy or sweet foods should be included in the diet. That candy bar you sometimes eat for a snack will add about 220 more calories to your list.

Plenty of exercise, the proper amount of sleep, and enough of the right kinds of food should help
