



The absence of oil, lemon, onion, garlic, which the Greeks use in their cocking, makes American food unpleasant for Anna.

She was shocked when offered a serving of corn at a School of Basic Belief meal at the college church recently. She explains, "In Greece we eat corn as a memorial to someone who has died."

"Forty days after their death we mix corn, sugar, vanilla, caramels, and rice, and it is eaten by friends and relatives of the deceased who say, 'I am eating this. Let God forgive him.'"
