

## Four To Leave Mac Staff; Two Resign; Two To Retire

Four Maccollege faculty and staff members will not be back next year, Dr. D. W. Bittinger announced to the faculty Thursday morning, Feb. 7. They are Dean James M. Berkebile, Lee Kendall, Dr. Mary Fee, and Dr. Maurice A. Hess.

Dean Berkebile has resigned effective after summer school to go to Elizabethtown College.

Lee Kendall, chief engineer and associate superintendent of grounds, will return to the active ministry of the Church of the Brethren.

### Fee Retires

Dr. Fee plans to retire at the end of the summer session. Dr. Fee has served as head of the Education Department and as dean of women.

Dr. Fee and her sister, Miss Hazel Fee, who has announced plans to retire from her position as superintendent of nurses at the McPherson County Hospital, are building a new home in Stafford, Kas.

### Hess Retires

Dr. Hess, who celebrated his 69th birthday the day Dr. Bittinger made the formal announcement of retirement, will be moving to Knobnoster, Mo., where he and Mrs. Hess will be living in a house trailer on their daughter's farm.

### Kendall Resigns

Lee Kendall, who was featured in the Spectator for Jan. 18, came to McPherson in 1952 from Fernald, Iowa, where he had been a pastor.

Both former directors, Alvin Voran and Nevin Fisher, are planning to be here.

Alvin Voran was the first director and he started the choir in 1932. He left Maccollege in 1936 and is presently at Centenary College in Shreveport, La.

Nevin Fisher was choir director until 1946, and he is now at Elizabethtown College, Elizabethtown, Penn.

As of now, 80 former choir members are planning to attend.



Maccollege trustees will be meeting next week to discuss college activities and hire next year's faculty. The trustees come from the entire Western Region representing the Church of the Brethren constituency.

### Taught Here 1943-1948

Dr. Berkebile first came to McPherson in 1943 as head of the Department of Chemistry. He graduated from Manchester College in 1934 and earned his master's degree at Ohio State University in 1935.

While teaching high school in Ohio for several years, he moved up to principal and then to acting superintendent by 1940. From 1940-43 he was employed as an industrial chemist in Tulsa, Okla.

### Became Dean In 1950

He taught chemistry here from 1943 until 1948, when he returned to Ohio State to get his doctor's degree in chemistry. When he became Maccollege dean in 1950, he had not yet completed his work on his doctor's degree, but he completed it during his first year as dean and was granted his PhD. in chemistry in 1951.

In addition to his administrative duties, Dean Berkebile has taught classes in chemistry, mathematics, and education, and has had charge of the freshman orientation program.

### Serves As Pastor

Since 1954 Dr. Berkebile has been pastor of the Monitor Church of the Brethren.

Although his hobby is gardening, he remarks that he has very little time for it.

During his administration as dean, Dr. Berkebile has become an advisor to students concerning their Selective Service Problems. He states that he has felt it a necessary part of his ministry to be informed about Selective Service problems and to counsel with students concerning them.

Dr. Berkebile and his family will go to Elizabethtown during Easter Vacation to find housing. He plans to sell his present home at 541 Lehmer.

He plans to rent a trailer and move his things to Elizabethtown by himself, taking one load at Easter, another in June when he goes to Annual Conference in Richmond, Va., and the final load Aug. 1, after the completion of the summer school term.

# Mac Plays At Bethel Tomorrow

The Bulldog cagers go into the game with 4 losses. However they tripped Bethel in a previous engagement 66-58, on the McPherson home court.

The conference is an extremely rough one with all teams being able to beat any other one and no five are undefeated in conference play.

The old basketball adage of "he wins who gets the most breaks" seems to hold true in most instances. Only a week ago the Bulldogs were in first place, but have now dropped to third.

McPherson College lost to College of Emporia Saturday night as a result of a cold eleven-minute scoreless spree in which the Bulldogs failed to hit a single field goal.

This ruined McPherson's chance for top honors in the KCAC league. After the Saturday night's games, Bethel was in first place with McPherson and Bethany tied for second place.

M Club will sponsor a Penny Carnival on March 1 beginning at 7 p.m. in the gym. A king and queen, elected by penny votes, will be crowned.

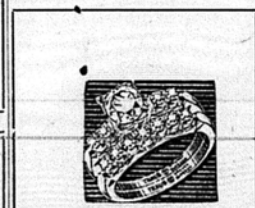
A cake-walk, baseball throw, basketball free throw contest, a penny toss, and a chance to guess the number of beans in a jar are some of the attractions planned for the carnival.

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## They're Glad They Went . . . Students Report Observing Politics, UN, City Sights

"I'll never regret that I went!"  
was the general comment among the thirteen McPhersonites who returned from the Brethren Youth Political Seminar on Sunday evening, February 8.

From bunk beds in the hotel to getting sick over the elevator ride to the top of the Empire State Building, incidents are being told. Since 284 people registered, this year's seminar was the largest in its eight-year history.

Among the more interesting sessions were the talk and discussion on "How Can Christians Influence Political Decisions?" and visits with senators, of whom Senator Carlson of Kansas was one.

Visits to the various embassies was another highlight. In a scramble to catch a taxi to the Czechoslovakian Embassy, Ken Holderead decided to try the bus and spent a lost half hour in New York City.

In Washington interesting places visited in Washington, D. C., included the House of Representatives, Smithsonian Institute, headquarters of the FBI, the Supreme Court, Lincoln Memorial, and the Washington Monument.

One comment was, "We didn't get to see President Eisenhower, but we saw his car once, toured the White House, and drove past the Presbyterian Church which he attends."

In New York Besides the United Nations Headquarters, other interesting things in New York included the Empire State Building, Radio City, Rockefeller Plaza, and a ride on the Staten Island Ferry past the Statue of Liberty.

Comments on New York were, "The buildings kept changing directions," and "The lights all turn red at once and people cross streets everywhere," and "I never saw so many people in all my life!"

Points of Interest Events of interest along the road were touring the Brethren Publishing house in Elgin, Ill., viewing the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, Penn., and touring Manchester College campus.

I surely miss Maccollege and all the wonderful friends I have there. enjoy hearing what you are doing.

In the two weeks spent in Russia, Miller saw 2,000 people attend a public worship service which was held five times a week. To this, he added that the church could do more creative work in Russia.

## Library Books Explain Useful Arts, Fine Arts

In the library, books on useful arts are numbered beginning with 600 and those on fine arts are numbered beginning with 700.

**Education Through Art** by Herbert Read revives Plato's thesis that art should be the basis of any natural form of education.

**A New World History of Art** by Sheldon Cheney is a revised version of the book, **A World History of Art**, first published in 1937, which has become a standard text. The revision includes many more illustrations.

**Italian Painting from Caravaggio to Modigliani** by Lionello Venturi, including 84 full-color reproductions of famous paintings, is the third of a set covering Italian painting historically.

**Marvels of Ancient Rome** by Margaret R. Scherer takes each ancient structure and shows the importance it has held for men over the centuries. Enriched by 225 illustrations, this book provides a graphic record of the continuing impact of this city on the world.

**The New Architecture and the Bauhaus** by Walter Gropius is a new edition of an important book on modern architecture.

**Latin American Architecture** Since 1945 by Henry - Russell Hitchcock is the result of a trip to Latin America and presents 46 new buildings in different countries.

At an early meeting, the MCA voted to support with \$300 a Maccollege student who wants to further his education abroad for a year. The cost to the student will be no more than that of one year of college in the states, being approximately \$750-\$1000.

Anyone is eligible to go and to almost any country he wishes. Besides having a willingness and desire to go, an applicant must fill out an application blank and write his reasons for wanting to
