Church Plans Three Tours

The celebration of the 250th anniversary of the Church of the Brethren will be climaxed next August by a World Convocation of the Brethren at Kassel, Germany, Aug. 3-9, with a special celebration at Schwarzenau on Aug. 6.

The Brethren Service Commission has made arrangements for three tours which may be taken by Brethren traveling to Europe next summer.

The Schultz Tour will leave New York for Amsterdam on June 25 and will leave London for New York on August 20. It will be guided by L. W. S. Schultz.

His frequent trips to Europe have made him well acquainted with these countries, and his interest in history makes him well qualified to give valuable information to those participating in this tour.

Countries visited will be Belgium, France, Switzerland, Italy, Austria, Germany, Holland, and England. The group will visit historical places in Europe and attend the Anniversary celebration. Cost is \$1,190.

The historical tour will leave New York for Amsterdam on July 1 and leave London for New York on Aug. 20. It will be guided by Don Durnbaugh, a competent historian and former Brethren Service worker in Europe, and editor of the 250th Anniversary volume on Brethren origins.

The tour will include Germany, Holland, Switzerland, and France. Sites of Brethren historical interest, archives and libraries containing material about early Brethren, lectures by church historians, and present church activity will be included.

The group will also visit tourist highlights, picturesque medieval towns and castles, and international organizations. The estimated cost is \$1,070.

The Work Camp tour will visit Holland, Belgium, Switzerland, France, Italy, Austria, and Germany. They will participate in a work camp in Germany or Austria where they will work with people from six to ten different nations. They will participate in the celebration at Schwarzenau.

The tour will leave New York on June 16, and leave London on August 23. Cost is \$710.

Additional tours may be arranged at a later date if there is sufficient interest.

MCA Selects Lois Fager To Represent Mac In Europe

Lois Fager, Macollege sophomore, has been selected as an exchange student for the 1958-1959 school year. This is under the sponsorship of the MCA.

Lois is not definite as to where she will go yet.

An English major, Lois is from Clovis, N. M. She is on the MCA and CBYF cabinets. She is also the publicity chairman of WAA.

Selection was made by a committee of faculty and students. Criteria for the selection, among other things, were health, scholarship, personality, and the given reason for going. For personality, the ability to mix well with others and to adjust to new environments were especially considered.

The MCA has as one of its projects this year sending an exchange student to any country that is open for such a program.

MCA will pay \$300 of the total expenses of the year away, and the cost to Lois will not be more than that of one year of college in the States since the estimated cost is \$750-\$1000.

Lois looks at this opportunity as a good means of bringing not just countries together, but people too. She also would like to see the birthplace of the Church of the Brethren while abroad.

When asked how she felt about being selected as the exchange student, Lois was at a loss for words.

Juanita Fike, a Macollege student, is studying in Germany this year under a similar grant from the MCA.

Dean Announces Danforth Grants

The Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Mo., has announced the appointment of Dean Wayne F. Geisert as the foundation liaison officer for McPherson College. He is authorized to nominate for Danforth Fellowships two or three men of this year's graduating class who plan to prepare for college teaching.

Every year the Danforth Foundation grants fellowships to approximately 75 men preparing for college teaching who have not yet done any graduate study.

Selection for the fellowships is made on the basis of outstanding academic ability, personality congenial to the classroom, and integrity and character, including serious inquiry within the Christian tradition.

The applicant may be preparing to teach in any field, but men in the natural and biological sciences and in the social sciences are particularly encouraged to apply. There are no bars of race or color to these appointments.

The Danforth Foundation offers financial assistance to those chosen according to individual need. The annual maximum grant is \$1,400 plus tuition and fees.

Plans can change hurriedly; directions can shift completely from east to west.

On December 20 I was just ready to come to the college and was looking forward to our final before - Christmas chapel. Suddenly a "massive hemorrhage" occurred and I was rushed to the hospital instead in order not to bleed to death. Even as the chapel began I was being injected here and there for this and that.

Other plans changed, too. Our children home from Africa and Southern Texas with grandchildren, one of whom we had not seen previously, were to be home for Christmas. I planned to bask in the pleasant laughter of children.

During the holidays, also, I was planning several committee and other contacts. I was going to fly to Philadelphia; Eastern Maryland; Washington, D. C.; Miami Beach, Florida; New Orleans; and home.

But plans changed; instead I stayed in a hospital bed, stuck full of needles and tubes.

But rewards can always come.

I received some of the greatest spiritual uplifts of my entire lifetime as my family and I together rallied for this crisis.

We learned that the McPherson College family is a real family: letters, assurances of prayers, recitals of prayer vigils held; all of these came to me, greatly lifting me up.

We learned that across the world there are indeed many people who stand close to each other though miles intervene between their geographies. We received letters from almost every state in the union.

Thank you students and faculty for all your cards, prayers, and well wishes.

You are altogether a wonderful group to be associated with. May God bless you all.
