Youth Elect New Cabinet To Serve Western Region

Bob Dell, Marlene Klotz, and Dick Landrum were elected to the Regional Executive Committee last weekend during Regional Youth Conference. Paul Wagner was re-elected as youth counselor. A new director will be announced later.

Irvin Wagner will continue as Regional Youth President. Valerie Miller and Carl Harris will remain on the cabinet for another year.

Daryl Standfer, Worthington, Minn., was the winner of the regional speech contest. His oration, "Brothers Under the Skin," will be given at Annual Conference in June at Des Moines.

Treva Brown, Wichita; Norma Becker, Froid, Mont.; and Gary Zuck, Merriam, Kas.; were the others in the contest.

The conference next year will be held from March 5-8. The topic of the speech contest will

be "Dare to be Different." Approximately 593 registered at the conference. A total of 101 were college students.

Divided into districts the registered delegates were as follows: Western Kansas - 61 (25 from Quinter), Northeast Kansas - 45, Southeast Kansas - 33, Oklahoma - 26.

Louisiana - Texas - 17, Southern Missouri - 11, Middle Missouri - 42 (24 from Kansas City), Northern Missouri - 27 (11 from Plattsburg), Colorado - 44, Nebraska - 26 (11 from Holmesville).

North Dakota - 13 (9 from Grandview), Northern Iowa - 52 (10 from Worthington), Southern Iowa - 18, Middle Iowa - 76 (10 from Prairie City, 15 from Panora, 13 from Panther Creek, 12 from Des Moines Valley, 9 from Stover).

Leon Neher Resigns Post To Enter Bethany Seminary

Leon Neher, the first full time Regional Youth Director for the Western Region, will resign on June 1, 1958. Leon has served in this position for one year.

Leon's plans for the immediate future are to farm near Quinter, Kas., this summer and to enter Bethany Biblical Seminary this September.

Besides working as youth director Leon has been working on the Outreach Commission of the National UCYM Cabinet. He is serving on the Committee on International Affairs.

His present project is preparing a statement on alternative service which will be presented to the General Council Meeting in August for approval.

"This has been a great region in which to work and a real thrill to see the progressive steps which have been taken by the youth of this region.

"I solicit your support for the new youth director as you have given it to me. And with the new director I feel certain many more steps will be taken," stated Leon.

The rededication and commitment of life of many young people in the 1958 Regional Youth Conference will remain as Leon's greatest inspiration while serving as youth director.

"Backing this up," he further stated, "was the better organized district cabinets who have concrete plans to further the development of the church and their district."

No successor to the youth director position has been announced yet.

Trustees Raise Room Rent Of College's Dormitories

To meet dormitory expenses Macollege trustees have raised the room rent for college dormitories, beginning next year. However, tuition fees will remain the same.

Fees for Kline Hall and Arnold Hall will be \$75 per semester. Fees for Dotzour Hall and Fahnestock Hall will be \$90 per semester.

During the recent trustee meeting, committees were organized to investigate the financial possibilities of beginning construction of new Sharp Hall.

Although pledging has been made for Sharp Hall the pledging

period extends over five years; consequently, only a small amount of the money has been paid.

The full amount necessary to build Sharp Hall has not yet been pledged throughout the region. A committee was appointed to investigate regional pledging.

All Macollege faculty were rehired for next year. The Rev. Dale W. Brown will join the faculty in September 1958 and will be working in the Philosophy and Religion Dept. under Dr. Burton Metzler, head of the department.

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Mac Summer School Offers Driver Education, Seminar

McPherson College 1958 summer school is scheduled for June 3 to July 31. The Driver Education Instructor's Course, a special five hour course, will also be given at this time.

The August course and seminar in American Politics with Dr. Raymond Flory as the director will be Aug. 18-22.

A maximum of nine hours can be taken during the regular nine week session. A maximum of three hours may be taken during the August session.

The Driver Education Instructor's course is designed to train teachers in the organization and administration of driver training in the high schools. Actual instruction experience in an automobile is provided.

Mr. Phil Lane will be the instructor. This type of course is now a requirement for teachers of driver education in the high schools in Kansas.

American Politics is a concentrated course for three hours of credit.

The seminar in American Politics will be conducted primarily for the benefit of persons who want to engage in a thorough study and discussion of the relationship of American Politics to International Relations.

Interested persons may enroll in this seminar for one hour credit even though they do not enroll in the American Politics

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course above. Students enrolled in this course will be expected to participate in the seminar in order to earn the one hour credit.

Kline Hall will be open for women during the summer session and the August course and seminar. Either rooms or apartments are available.

Arnold Hall will be open to men wanting rooms. For reservations or information on housing, Gordon Yoder, business manager, may be contacted.

Summer school expenses are listed in the schedule which is available in the dean's office.

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St. Benedict's Defeats Ottawa In NAlA

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Meet The Faculty . . .

Study Plays Important Role In Life Of Burton Metzler

When asked what his hobby was, Dr. Burton Metzler, Macollege's professor of philosophy and religion, chuckled and replied, "study." Indeed, "study" has played an important role in the life of Dr. Metzler.

It was while teaching in a small country school to earn his way through Manchester College that Dr. Metzler decided that he enjoyed the process of teaching.

"It was then," says Dr. Metzler, "that I came to the idea that I would like to teach the Bible."

Many years of studying and teaching have followed this decision.

After leaving Manchester College, Dr. Metzler taught still another year before entering Bethany Biblical Seminary. While there, he did assistant teaching in New Testament Greek.

During his seminary career, Dr. Metzler stayed out a year and did part time pastoral work in a country church. In 1920 he was able to receive his B.D. degree.

Further studying took him to Princeton Theological Seminary where he received his Th. B. and to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary where he received his Ph. D.

Following the completion of his education, Dr. Metzler taught for eight years at Bethany Biblical Seminary. In the next four following years, pastoral work in northern Indiana consumed most of his time.

In 1937, Dr. Metzler came to Macollege to teach in the Philosophy and Religion Department. He is completing his twentieth year of teaching here this spring.

As for his plans for the future, Dr. Metzler says, "I'm in the hands of the trustees of the college."

When he does eventually retire, the Metzlers plan to stay in McPherson. Dr. Metzler says he might do some more writing then.

For a number of years, Dr. Metzler has been writing for the "Bible Study Monthly." For this publication, he writes an article on each week's international Sunday School lesson.

Dr. Metzler takes this view of the present student generation: "As I think over the personnel of my classes, I believe students are more mature and better informed than my generation of students was."

Besides considering "study" as a hobby, Dr. Metzler also finds pleasure and relaxation in doing carpentry work around the house.

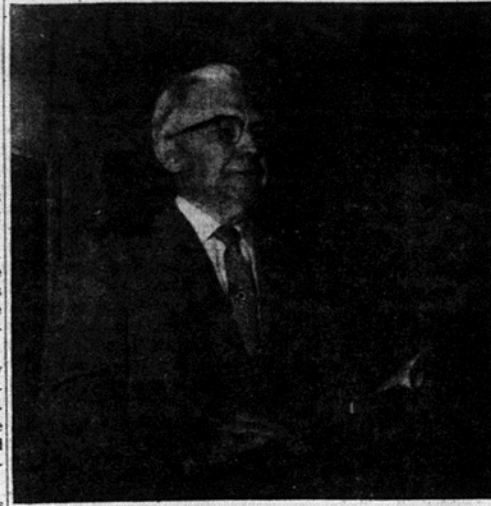

Flory Attends Chicago Meeting

Dr. Raymond Flory attended a three-day meeting in Chicago, with the Commission of Higher Education, March 2-5.

The meeting was primarily a study group, whose purpose was to discuss major problems of higher education.

According to Dr. Flory, two main problems were discussed, first, who should go to college—who should determine it, and on what basis, and second, ways of handling large groups of students without having to use more teachers.

Another interesting part of the meeting was a T.V. demonstration on instruction.

There were two main parts of the demonstration. One of them was a one and one-half hour public service demonstration. The other was a one and one-half hour demonstration also, but this was on close service with telephones which the public could use to direct questions to the F.V. M.C.

The meeting was held in the Congress Hotel, Chicago, mainly for college professors and college administrators.

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Pondering With The President . . . Trustees Work Very Hard

I think I have never seen the trustees work harder than they did in their meeting last week. They put in long hours; they did not adjourn at the usual adjourning times. But the back and forth conversations were always friendly. Their ideas did not always coincide, but the conclusion, when it was arrived at, was one in which all believed.

Sharp Hall
One of the hardest considerations centered around Sharp Hall. The trustees, along with all those of us who are here at the college, are eager to see Sharp Hall begun.

The question debated long by the trustees was, "Where can we find sufficient funds so that, without endangering the present financial standing of the college or its good future, we can move forward for the construction of this much needed hall?"

Although considerable pledging has been made, the pledge period extends over five years; consequently only a relatively small proportion of the money has yet been paid.

In addition to this, the pledging is not yet completed throughout the region in the amount necessary to build Sharp Hall and to continue good operation of the college.

Committees were set up to investigate all financial possibilities. Another committee was empowered to bring to conclusion the sketches of drawings for Sharp Hall.

The general faith and belief of the trustees was optimistic and hopeful. The anticipation is that within a reasonable time Sharp Hall will begin to come into being.

Rising Costs
Another item with which the trustees wrestled at considerable length was the general financing of the college. The costs of all materials are going up. The cost of maintaining our buildings rises.

Faculty salaries have been increased.

In spite of these rising costs, the trustees voted not to increase tuition but to try to find other sources of income to meet our rising costs.

At one point, however, an increase in student charges seemed unavoidable.

Careful accounting revealed that the rent paid by students for living in the dormitories fell considerably below what is required to maintain the dormitories.

Although it has never been anticipated that the student would pay all of his college expense, it is generally considered fair that students pay sufficient room rent to maintain the buildings in which they live.

After the trustees had carefully looked over these figures, they felt it necessary to raise the room rents next year in order to make the dormitories operate at least more nearly without a loss.

The rents for next year, accordingly, were set at \$75 per semester for Kline and Arnold halls, and \$90 per semester for Fahnestock and Dotzour halls.

Faculty
All present faculty were rehired with the exception of Miss Della Lehman, who is retiring. Dale Brown will be added to the faculty as director of religious life.

The trustees ended their work, well pleased with McPherson College. To them, McPherson College is not only the buildings and the plant; it is also the people who work and study here. It is with all of these that they are pleased.
