McPherson College students may give blood while the Red Cross Bloodmobile is at the McPherson Church of the Brethren April 14.

McPherson County residents have used about 100 pints of blood since Jan. 1 which are 20 pints more than have been given in the same length of time, stated Mrs. Naomi Rafaelsen, executive secretary of the McPherson County chapter of the American Red Cross.

Mrs. Rafaelsen expressed the desire to see McPherson County residents meet the needs of a growing demand for blood in this area.

Dean Wayne F. Geisert reports that McPherson County used more blood last year than it contributed.

Red Cross blood is given free of charge to persons in need; however, a patient may be charged for administration and cross matching by hospital personnel.

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## Pondering With The President . . . I Was Scared!

Recently, I was in New York City and had a little time to walk through and around Times Square in the evening.

There were a lot of other people doing the same thing; it was necessary to push one's way through them. I wandered, also, into the side streets where there were not so many people.

Two or three times during my walk, I was scared.

I was more scared, I believe, than I had been when I was alone in some isolated part of Africa.

I was more scared than I had been in an isolated valley in the high Rockies where wild animals might be expected.

I was scared, not by adults, but by boys, or even by boys and girls.

For I saw here, in side streets and sometimes in the crowds, groups of youngsters — boys with an occasional girl or two mixed among them — who walked with a noticeable swagger.

They carried knives and clubs, but they looked about them furtively, as if they, too, were scared.

I think they were scared. They were not sure what they were afraid of; that is, likely, what made them dangerous.

They were afraid that they were not complete men or women yet. They were afraid that somebody did not regard them as "hot stuff." In order to manifest to themselves and others that they were real men, they were prepared to hurt people, even to kill people. Their clubs and their swagger were made necessary because of their insecurity.

I was afraid that I might be one of the people whom they would feel it necessary to beat up in order to manifest to themselves this "manliness" of theirs.

I got to thinking that we often sing, "God-bless America." We really want God to do that. But these young people are Ameri-

ca. If they are delinquent, then America will be delinquent.

As they grow up, they will find their way into industry — even into political control in cities like New York and elsewhere.

And America will be what they become.

God cannot bless America unless He blesses her through youth like these which I saw.

So I was scared in the side streets near Times Square. I was scared, first of all, for my own physical welfare. But much more, I was scared then and am scared now about the future of America.

We who are responsible or will presently be responsible for teaching youth need to be genuinely concerned about the future, for in our hands with God's help lies much of the responsibility for its molding.
