Mrs. Dorothy Sollenberger has been his piano instructor at McPherson College. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred O. Kruschwitz of Grundy Center.

Forrest has been in A Cappella Choir four years. During his freshman year he was on the Freshman Quartet. This year and his sophomore year he was a member of the College Male Quartet.

He has also played the baritone horn and bassoon in band and the bassoon in the orchestra. He is a member of the local M.E.N.C. and is vice-president of that organization this year.

Dramatics has also interested Forrest. He was in the three-act plays his sophomore and junior years as well as some one-act plays. He is vice-president of Alpha Psi Omega.

Forrest is an amateur ventriloquist.

He and his friend, Jerry, present their own variety of program.

Forrest said that his mother always had to remind him to practice the piano when he first started taking lessons at the age of nine.

The first group of numbers on the program are "Prelude in F Minor" by Bach, "Gavotte in G Major" also by Bach, and "Sonata, Op. 13, 1st Movement" by Beethoven.

Irvin Wagner, accompanied by C. Dwight Oltman, will play "Concert Piece No. 2" by Reiche on his trombone.

"Warum?" and "Traumerei" by Schumann and "Gopak" by M. Moussorgsky will then be played by Forrest.

Irvin's second number will be "Ballade" by Bozza.

The program will be concluded by "Danseuse de Delphes" by Debussy, "Romance, Op. 24, No. 9" by Sibelius, and "Polichinelle, Op. 3, No. 4" by S. Rachmaninoff.

Bittinger Is President-Elect Of Foundation For Colleges

Dr. D. W. Bittinger was elected president of the Kansas Foundation for Private Colleges in Kansas at a recent meeting in Hutchinson.

He served in this position three years ago. Dr. Robert Mortvedt of Bethany was the president for the last two years.

Dr. Arthur Zook of Kansas Wesleyan University is vice-president. Mr. Milton Moody, Topeka, Kas., is executive secretary.

Nineteen colleges in Kansas comprise the membership of the foundation.

This foundation was established in Kansas five years ago. Dr. Bittinger was among its original organizers. Thirty-eight other states have similar foundations.

Its purpose is to bring together in one foundation all of the private and church-related colleges in their respective states that a unified approach can be made to business and industry for support and assistance. Gifts from industry are then shared by the colleges.

The total amount received in the five years to be distributed among the church colleges of Kansas was \$360,754.

The gifts range in amounts from less than \$100 to as much as \$30,000. The largest gift, \$30,000, comes each year from Santa Fe Railroad. Other large gifts are given by United States Steel, Standard Oil, and similar corporations.

Headquarters for the Kansas Foundation are in Topeka. Each of the Kansas presidents gives

at least twelve days a year to this type of solicitation.

Miss Jessie Brown Donates \$50,000 For New Auditorium

Miss Jessie Brown of McPherson has made available to McPherson College the amount of \$50,000 for the auditorium wing of the new administration building.

This generosity comes as a continuation of numerous gifts which Miss Brown has made to Macollege, either in gifts of equipment, in cash, or in securities, an additional \$30,000.

More significant, however, than these financial considerations is the contribution which Miss Brown has made to the college through her life and through her long period of faithful service as a teacher and as head of the Department of Music.

Because of this long record of dedicated service to McPherson, the trustees have voted to call the auditorium, "The Jessie Brown Memorial Auditorium."

She has earned for herself an enviable record as a producer of skilled pianists during her period of 37 years of continuous service at McPherson College.

She was awarded an honorary Doctor of Music degree by McPherson College in 1952.

Miss Brown took her early mu-

sic work at Bethany College, Lindsborg. She received her bachelor of Music in 1910. She came to McPherson in 1915 after three years at Bethany.

She was in Germany in 1913-14 studying in the Royal Conservatory in Leipzig. She studied with Teichmuller and Fraulein Von Eggers. She also studied in Chicago with Mannheimer.

Ronald Harden, sophomore, will assume editorial duties of the annual next year.

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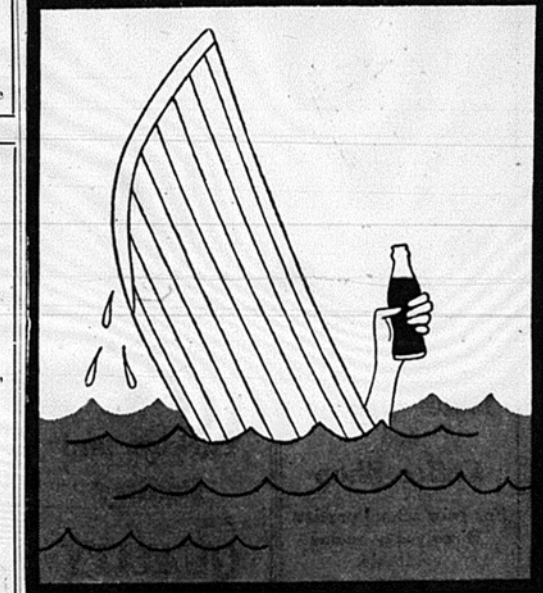
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Advertising For Peace

Since the days of George Fox and William Penn, the Friends, or Quakers, have worked consistently for the freedom of the human mind and the improvement of man's physical condition on earth.

In more recent years, representatives of the American Friends Service Committee have traveled into all parts of the world, rendering helpful service.

They have established such a reputation for unselfish no-strings-attached service that they have an easy entree into many parts of the world where other American citizens or the citizens of other countries would not be allowed to go.

Because they have done such helpful work for so long, they are now being urged to speak. They are doing this. It is their hope that their quiet voices can be heard in the midst of the clamor that fills our ears and twists our minds in days like this.

In a recent widely-circulated newspaper statement, they make a plea for peace. In this statement for which they paid advertising rates, they make several sugges-

tions. Each of the suggestions is backed by a dual reason concerning why it is made.

Briefly summarized, the suggestions are:

1. We should stop all nuclear weapon tests, because they are hurting men now and because our souls also are hurt when we hurt other people.

2. We should start disarmament, increasing it, step by step, because there can be no real peace without disarmament and because it is wrong to prepare to kill other men.

3. We should share our resources fully because helping people to help themselves is a good thing and because it is wrong to keep more than we need when two-thirds of the world is sick and hungry.

4. We should consider the problems of men more important than the promotion of alliances, because solving problems is more important than sending arms and because men should love one another.

5. We should strengthen the United Nations as an agency for peace because nations in conflict need a common meeting ground and because mankind is indivisible.
