Rhodes Scholars Mac CBYF Organizes To Be Chosen

The deadline for applications for the Rhodes Scholarships awarded annually to outstanding American students is November 6. 1957.

Anyone wishing to apply should ee Dean Wayne F. Geisert. This year's Rhodes Scholars will be chosen in December of this year, and they will enter Oxford Uni-versity in England in October,

The value of a Rhodes Scholarship is 600 pounds per year, and it is awarded for a two year per-iod. No restriction is placed on

To be eligible for a Rhodes Scholarship the student must be a male citizen of the United States between the ages of 19 and 25. He must have at least a Junior Standing in some recognized college or university in the United Des Moines Meeting States, and he must receive the official endorsement of his college or university.

The qualities on which the scholars are chosen are: (1) lit-erary and scholastic ability and attainments; (2) qualities of manhood, truthfulness, courage, de-votion to duty, sympathy, kindliness, unselfishness, and fellow-ship; (3) exhibition of moral force of character, and of instincts to lead and to take an interest in his fellows: (4) physical vigor, as shown by fondness for and success in sports.
