# College Drive Goes Over Top

## Pledges Amount To \$173,972 And More To Come In

McPherson College staged a "victory dinner" Tuesday night at the college cafeteria in celebration of going over the top in its development campaign by exceeding the goal.

With numerous gifts still to be received, General Chairman Clare Miller announced Tuesday that to date \$173,972 has been pledged in the McPherson community campaign. This is \$23,972 in excess of the goal of \$150,000 set for the local drive.

Breaking down the grand total, advanced gifts amounted to \$109,415 and special gifts \$64,557. The \$173,972 was pledged by 412 friends of the college, or an average pledge of \$442.

Helping the drive to go over the top was \$9,396 pledged by students and \$19,200 by faculty members on the McPherson College campus.

The McPherson community drive is only a part of the college's overall campaign to raise \$725,000 in the next five years. The major part of the drive is now being waged among the Brethren Churches in the 21 states

## Burkholder Spends Summer Studying Marine Life

John Burkholder, science professor at Maccollege, spent the summer this year at Coosebay near Charleston, Ore., studying the many forms of ocean life.

He was granted an award of \$1,025 plus travel expense last spring for the study of marine life on the Pacific coast by the National Science Foundation. He was one of the 20 other professors to receive such an award.

This institute included field trips, free study, a research project, lectures, and a group project all under the direction of outstanding specialists of marine life. Most of the observing was done on the seashore during low-

tide although there were a few deep sea animals.

The National Science Foundation started the institute for the progress of the study of marine organisms. The institute is sponsored by the University of Oregon and was held this year from June 17 to August 11.

Dr. Burkholder's comment on the summer was, "It was very interesting as it was my first chance to see the ocean."

The McPherson Bulldogs returned home from Baldwin to recover from the 19-0 defeat inflicted on them by Baker University Wildcats.

The Baker victory left them with a conference record of one win and one loss.

The game was dominated nearly all the way by the Wildcats and the 15-yard line was the nearest the Bulldogs ever got to the Baker goal. This occurred early in the third quarter.

The Bulldogs racked up five of their six first-downs in a row during their third period scoring threat. Fourteen first-downs were earned by the Baker eleven.

## Rhodes Scholars To Be Chosen

The deadline for applications for the Rhodes Scholarships awarded annually to outstanding American students is November 6, 1957.

Anyone wishing to apply should see Dean Wayne F. Geisert. This year's Rhodes Scholars will be chosen in December of this year, and they will enter Oxford University in England in October, 1958.

The value of a Rhodes Scholarship is 600 pounds per year, and it is awarded for a two year period. No restriction is placed on studies.

To be eligible for a Rhodes Scholarship the student must be a male citizen of the United States between the ages of 19 and 25. He must have at least a Junior Standing in some recognized college or university in the United States, and he must receive the official endorsement of his college or university.

The qualities on which the scholars are chosen are: (1) literary and scholastic ability and attainments; (2) qualities of manhood, truthfulness, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy, kindness, unselfishness, and fellowship; (3) exhibition of moral force of character, and of instincts to lead and to take an interest in his fellows; (4) physical vigor, as shown by fondness for and success in sports.

Magazines in the United States by James Playsted Wood relates the development of the magazine and examines its influence as a social force.

Modern Real Estate Practice: A Managerial Approach by Frederick E. Case tells about the problems of a real estate business and the manner in which they are dealt with.

Public Control of Economic Enterprise by Harold Koontz and Richard W. Gable evaluates government economic controls and examines the problems which have given rise to them.

The Rise of the National Trade Union by Lloyd Ulman is a study of the development of the national trade union during the latter part of the nineteenth and the

early part of the twentieth centuries.

Japanese Politics: An Introductory Survey by Nobutaka Ike analyzes the structure of the Japanese government and the many social factors which bear on its operation.

Revolution in China by Charles Patrick Fitzgerald shows how the traditions and the social structure of China have influenced the country's different types of government.

A History of Soviet Russia by Georg von Rauch tells the story of the U. S. S. R. form the Bolshevik conspiracy to 1956 and discusses the problems of this nation that arose during that time.

Innocent III by Charles Edward Smith describes the efforts of Pope Innocent III to reform the Catholic Church during the thirteenth century.
