# Dorm "Raids"

The Student Court met this week as an investigating body oncerning dorm "raids." The intent was not to punish, but to merely discover facts concerning "raids." Some things which the court would like to make known

1. The court discovered that dorm "raids" are considered traditional among students, and that tradition is not easy to change. 2. Entering the dormitory af ter the doors are locked is more

than a violation of college rules; it is a breech of civil law. 3. Shooting firecrackers in the city limits, especially inside a building is breaking a city or dinance

4. Upon checking with our insurance officials it was found that the storage or use of firecrackers in the buildings endangers our insurance policies.

There is a good possibility that our insurance rates would be-come much higher if msurance inspectors knew that firecrackers Welve McPherson Coll were being stored and used in the buildings.

As I leave this corner to the next editor, Faye Fields, I leave with her the joys and hardships of being an editor.





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
