The main discussions of the seminar were on pacifism, world problems, the government and its relationship to the people, Christianity and politics, and other topics in connection with the government.

On Thursday the seminary shifted to New York City where the group visited the United Nations and toured the international grounds, visited committee sessions, and visited various United Nations delegates.

While in New York the group met M. R. Ziegler who was just returning from Europe.

The seminar closed on Friday evening and the two students arrived back on Macollege campus on Sunday.

\$57,393 Received For Special Challenge Fund

A sum of \$57,393 in the Challenge Fund toward new buildings on McPherson College Campus has been reached as of Feb. 1, according to the development office.

The primary aim of the office is to raise \$150,000 necessary to receive a \$50,000 loan from the federal government. Pledges and cash are the main sources of finance for the Challenge Fund.

The buildings include an addition to Dotzour Hall for 72 girls, housing units for married students, and a student union building and cafeteria combined.

The student union fees, added to students' tuition this school year, will go for the furnishings in the student union building.

"Othello" will be presented on Thursday, March 10, primarily for townspeople and high school students.

March 11's performance is to be for Macollege students and the Regional Youth Conference guests.

"Othello" has long been regarded as one of Shakespeare's greatest tragedies. Basically, it is a dramatic study of the power and effect of evil in the world.

It is further distinguished by the intensity of its characterizations and by its superb concentration upon a single theme with no sub-plots. It is the most realistic of Shakespeare's tragedies.

English Test Given Thursday

Forty-nine juniors and seniors will be given an English Proficiency Test Thursday morning, Feb. 18.

Those taking the test will meet in the chemistry lecture room in Harnley Hall at 7:45 a.m. The time of testing will cover two periods, ending at 9:30.

Students are allowed to bring a dictionary for use during the test. Those having 8:40 classes will be excused from them.

Professor Harley Stump, chairman of the English department, will administer the test. It will be on prose composition.

Topics will be of a general nature and broad enough that any college graduate should be able to write a paper on any one of them.

This test is a requirement for graduation. Certain standards of proficiency in English usage must be established before a student can receive a college diploma.

Lois Keim Selected As Mac Exchange Student

Lois Keim, a sophomore, has been selected as McPherson College's exchange student to Germany for next year. She is the daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Howard H. Keim of Peoria, Ill.

She plans to leave for Germany in mid-July after a summer course in conversational German until Nov. 1, she will study German at the Munich Institute with a group of international students.

Lois has been active in Players' Club, SNEA, Chapel Choir, and Skate Club.

She will be the second Macollege student selected in this direct exchange program with a college in Goettingen, Germany.

The first student is Jim Nettleton, who is presently studying at Goettingen. Christiane Brandt, Germany's exchange, is a junior at Macollege this year.

Dr. D. W. Bittinger, president of Macollege, made the plans for this two-way exchange while he was in Europe for the World Council of Churches meeting and the 250th Anniversary of the Church of the Brethren during the 1958 summer.

This university is scattered throughout the city of Goettingen. It is an old and well-established school. Various other nationalities are represented at this school yearly.

Lois' name will be sent to the German government in order that all of the official papers can be prepared and sent to her. That government will be paying the tuition of her year's education and will give her a small allowance.

In past years Lois Fager from Fresno, Calif.; Elsie Lucore Holderread, secretary to the dean, from Arriba, Colo.; and Juanita Fike, Peace Valley, Mo., were Macollege exchanges.

Later the Christians changed

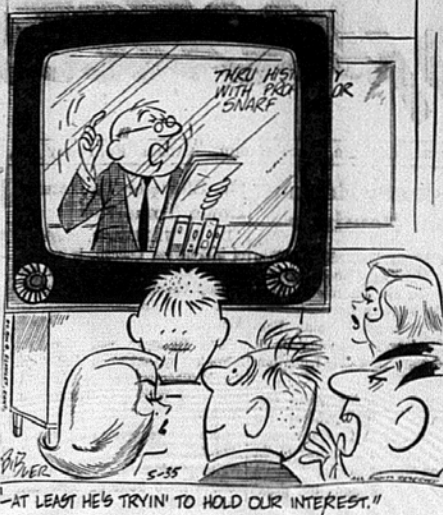

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Eight Presidents Serve Macollege Since 1888

McPherson College, in the past as well as the present, has benefitted from the leadership of capable, well educated, and dedicated Christian men. Eight men have served the college down through the years since it was first organized in 1888.

Dr. S. Z. Sharp became the first president and he served Macollege until 1896.

Before coming to McPherson, Dr. Sharp started Ashland College in Ohio in 1879, accepted a professorship at Mount Morris College in 1880, and was elected acting president of Mount Morris during the absence of its president.

McPherson College's organization was supervised by Dr. Sharp. After leaving McPherson, Dr. Sharp helped start another college, Plattsburg College, Plattsburg, Mo.

The second building erected on Macollege campus was named after Dr. Sharp. This building is the present Sharp Hall.

Dr. C. E. Arnold was the second president to guide Macollege's activities.

During Dr. Arnold's term the name McPherson College was formally adopted. Dr. Arnold came to Macollege in 1893 as head of the mathematics department. He served as president from 1896 until 1902.

Arnold Hall, named after Dr. Arnold, was the first girls' dormitory and dining hall.

The third McPherson president was Edward Frantz. In 1890 Dr. Frantz became a professor of mathematics on Macollege campus. He held this position until 1892.

From 1895 until 1902 Dr. Frantz was a professor of ancient languages and Bible. In 1902 he became president of the college. He served in this capacity until 1910 when he resigned because of ill health.

Dr. Frantz served as the president of LaVerne (then Lordsburg) College during the school year of 1914-15.

From 1914 until 1927 Dr. D. W. Kurtz guided Macollege.

Before coming to McPherson, Dr. Kurtz did much traveling in

Europe. During his presidency Macollege was accepted into the North Central Association. In 1918 Dr. Kurtz was elected president of the State Sunday School Association.

While Dr. Kurtz was at Macollege, the new science building, Harnly Hall, was erected.

Dr. V. F. Schwalm was president of Macollege from 1927 until 1941. He started teaching in Manchester College in 1911 while still taking work there. He received his bachelor's degree in 1913.

In 1918 Dr. Schwalm became dean of Manchester College, a position he held until he became president of Macollege.

During Dr. Schwalm's presidency the chapel was enlarged, a stadium built, the athletic field modernized, the physical education building erected, and the college re-admitted into accredited standing with North Central.

Dr. W. W. Peters became president in 1941. He had served as president of Mount Morris College. During the two years preceding his presidency of Macollege, he was head of the department of education at Manchester.

Dr. Peters was president of McPherson until 1950.

Dr. D. W. Bittinger became president of Macollege in 1950. Dr. Bittinger first became attached to the college in 1940 when he served as a professor of sociology and education until 1944.
