**Looking At The World
In Horizontal Perspective**

Looking at the world from a hospital bed gives one a different perspective. Other men walk upright; you are prone. Other men eat normally; you eat through mechanical devices. But people are kind. They send you cards; they write you letters; they send you flowers; they assure you of their interest in you and of their prayers in your behalf.

Mrs. Bittinger and I each wish to thank the students and the faculty of McPherson College for having done all of these things for us while we were horizontally confined. May God bless you for your thoughtfulness.

While resting horizontally, waiting for healing and strength, some thoughts gather in the top of one's head. Here are a few gleaned from that part of my anatomy.

1. Eventually there comes a time when the elementary things of life become very important to all men. No food for a week—food becomes more important at that moment than the Algerian crisis! A vital organ deactivated—then undertakings are set up to get it activated. The first indication of its normality is more important than the launching of a new satellite around the sun or the moon!
Two thirds of the world's population are always at this level: hunger, sickness, the raw edge of death. We can see what things are really important to them.
2. A kindness shown to one in pain is a kindness to be remembered. Withholding wheat from starving people to make them "think right," doesn't make them "think right." Love and kindness are much more vocal at the hunger and pain level.
3. Sorrow and happiness speak a common language, understood by all. Your roommate puts up a gallant struggle, but his life slips away. The sorrow of his family engulfs you. The next roommate makes it; he beats you home. That joy also engulfs you. Our sorrows become less when shared and our joys can enhance other's joys if they are told.
4. It is good to have a doctor. When one knows that he is ill and the limits of his knowledge and ability will not spare him, it is good to turn to a doctor who knows answers beyond his.

Our world has some present sickness. The limits of our knowledge, more war heads, more taxes, more hatred, more fear only add to the sickness.

There is a Doctor. It is time to call upon His services.

Mac Meets KWU Tomorrow In Last Home Game

The McPherson College Bulldogs under Coach Sid Smith will play their last two conference games of the season tomorrow night and Tuesday night.

Tomorrow night the Kansas Wesleyan Coyotes will tangle with the Bulldogs on the local court. In the only previous game Kansas Wesleyan dumped Mac by an 82-64 score.

In the Kansas Conference the Bulldogs have won 9 and lost 6 while the Coyotes have won only 4 and lost 11. McPherson has an overall season record of 14-8 and Kansas Wesleyan's season record is 4-15.

Bethel Tuesday Night
On Tuesday night, Feb. 23, the MacCollege Bulldogs travel to Newton for a game with the Bethel Gray Maroons.

The game will officially close the 1959-60 basketball season for Coach Smith and the Bulldogs.

Bethel will be out for revenge in the game because of a 67-65 defeat Mac handed them earlier in the season.

Bethel has a seasonal record of 15-9 and stands in fifth place in the conference with an 8-7 record.

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Ten New Books Added To Mac's Beeghly Library

Ten new books have recently been added to McPherson College's Beeghly Library. The ten books with a brief description of each are:

The Fossil Book by Carroll Lane Fenton and Mildred Adams Fenton. The book tells what fossils are, where they are found, what they mean, and how they are related to plants, animals and other creatures living on the earth today.

Around A Rusty God by Augusta Walker. This is a novel of a Chinese boy and how, through two black goats, he discovers the world around him.

Biblical Theology and Christian Education by Randolph Crumps Miller. The concern of Dr. Miller is that the Bible itself illuminates the relationships of daily living in terms of the resources of the Gospel. He sees the Bible as a record of the drama of God's mighty acts.

Continuity and Change in African Cultures, edited by William R. Bascom and Melville J. Herkovits. In their essays, the sixteen writers have given us the picture of Africa today, one highly interesting and realistic.

The Worker Views His Union by Joel Seidman, Jack London, Bernard Karsh, and Daisy L. Tagliacozzo. This book is the first comparative study of the attitudes of rank-and-file local members.

Gardano, The Gambling Scholar by Oystein Ore. In this biography of Gardano, his gambling skills are studied. They represent the first organized study in the theory of games of chance.

Are You Listening? by Ralph G. Nichols and Leonard A. Stevens. This is the first book devoted to a dynamic, new science — the science of listening. Many new techniques of listening are discussed.

Village Japan by Richard K. Bardsley, John W. Hall and Rob-

ert E. Ward. After living four years in Niike, Japan, the authors were able to study completely every aspect of the village's activity and organization. Through this book we have a starting point for understanding the people of rural Japan.

Economic Development of Communist China by Choh-Ming Li. This book is an appraisal of the first five years of industrialization of China. Mr. Li's points are very pertinent to the future of China's continued economic development.

World History of the Dance by Curt Sachs. Forms and symbols of the Stone Age through the 20th century dances have been associated with every phase of human life. The author deals with historical setting and modern viewpoints.
