ENROLLMENT UP 10.3 % AT MACOLLEGE THIS YEAR

Enrollment at Macollege for the 1959 fall semester has increased 10.3 % over the total enrollment of last year. The total enrollment for the beginning fall semester at Macollege is 482. Twenty six of this number are special students.

Freshmen lead in the largest class enrollment with 163. The sophomores follow with 116. There are 101 juniors and 76 seniors.

WOMEN'S DORM RULES RESTATED FOR 1959-60

Rules and regulations of Dotzour Hall were discussed at a dorm meeting in Dotzour lounge Sept. 9. The meeting was conducted by Rossie Monk, president, Miss Edna Neher, Housemother, and Mrs. Kenneth Bechtel, Dean of Women.

Some of the Hall Orders are as follows:

A late leave or over-night stay must have the hours and destination approved and signed by the Housemother or the Dean of Women. In the absence of both, a girl designated by the Housemother may sign the permit.

A girl shall check out when leaving the Hall for any length of time other than classes and check in when returning.

Closing hours shall be 12 p.m. on Friday nights and 11 p.m. on Saturday night; on all other nights it will be 10 p.m.

Women shall return to the Hall within ten minutes after closing lectures and entertainments on the campus which hold later than the closing hours and one hour after football games on the college field and after concerts and school activities downtown.

The Bombergers have three children: Timothy Warren, 13; Harold Lane, 10; and Vernona, 8.

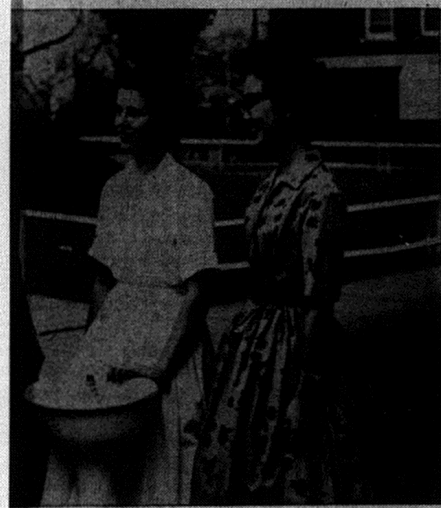
STUDENT PICTURES SCHEDULED TO BE TAKEN NEXT WEEK

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To Have Privileges

- All cars must be registered with the college at time of enrollment and must receive a sticker for the windshield.
- All cars must show the sticker on the lower LEFT CORNER OF THE REAR GLASS before they are permitted to park on the college parking areas.
- All cars must have stickers on car by Sept. 15. Failure to do so will constitute a violation.
- Drivers must have a valid driver's license, state automobile registration, and liability insurance.
- The college assures no responsibility for the care and protection of the vehicle or its contents while it is on the parking areas.
- Driving or parking of any car in such a manner that it impedes the movement of other vehicles or pedestrians is prohibited.
- All cars must park in the areas on campus which are regular parking areas.
- Cars which are not in condition for use will be removed from the parking area and the owner shall be responsible for the charges involved.

Violation Penalties

Procedure

The Dean of Men assigns whatever fine applies to each ticket.

If money is involved in the penalty, the offender takes his ticket to the Business Office and pays the fine.

The Business Office gives the offender a receipt marked paid and records the number of the receipt on the ticket. The ticket is then returned to the Dean of Men's office and the record is placed on the student's cumulative traffic record; the original ticket is then filed.

Any student who does not report to the Dean of Men's Office and pay penalty within 48 hours after the time the ticket was issued will have "class denial" notices sent to his instructors.

This prohibits the faculty member admitting him to further classes until the Dean of the College issues a release. The student has the right to go to the Board of Appeals if he feels he has a case.

After reading of the difficulties in placing children of mixed backgrounds, Mr. Wagoner, who is alumni director for Mac, and his wife began writing to different denominational homes hoping for an adoption.

In May a call through the local welfare agency from Topeka indicated that a baby girl was waiting for their approval. On June 9 Ann became a Wagoner.

Former Students Receive BVS Project Assignments

Six former McPherson students have completed a nine-week training program for the BVS at New Windsor, Md., and have been assigned to service projects.

Glenda Wine, Enders, Neb., who attended McPherson two years, is assigned to work with the Children's Aid Society, Neffsville, Pa. Lynda and Harold Connell, Brooklyn, Iowa, who both attended McPherson two years, are assigned to the Brethren Service Farm, Fallurrias, Texas.

Edwin Switzer and wife, June, of Haxton, Colo., have been assigned to the Brethren Service Project, Castaner, Puerto Rico. Edward Emmert, Redfield, Iowa, a 1958 graduate of McPherson College, has been assigned to the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

BVS workers in Neffsville may be a part of the Brethren Home for the aged, or the Children's Aid Society, an orphanage. In both cases the important function is being a "Moral booster" for those living there.

This could mean writing letters, reading and talking to the residents and planning religious programs and activities.

The 290-acre Brethren Service Farm, has its purpose in helping the Latin-American people of the area to improve their living conditions and providing them with a ministry of education, service and worship.

Young men on the farm assist with the farming, dairying, con-

struction and maintenance work. The girls help with homemaking, cooking and teaching.

The Brethren Service Project in Castaner, Puerto Rico, began in 1942, to provide needy people with the benefits of health, education, recreation, agricultural instruction and spiritual uplift.

In 1953, the project was expanded to start work at Cerrote, an isolated mountain community. Both projects have a center established, public schools and weekly clinics are conducted. Workers assigned to the University of Michigan Hospital, are members of the Metabolic Research Unit. The main purpose of the program is to find how the glands of the body work while under stress and strain.

Volunteers are the subjects of various experiments simulating different types of stress or strain.

The marching band under the direction of Forrest Kruschwitz will meet Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 3:30 in the Student Assembly Room in Sharp.

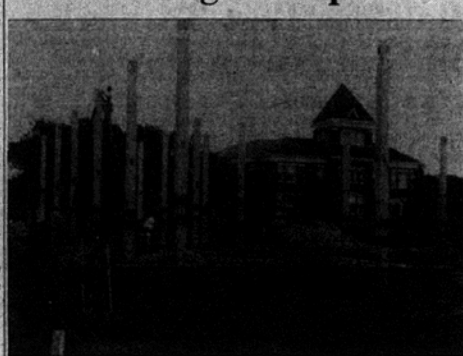
The string ensemble, directed by Paul Sollenberger will meet Tuesday and Thursday at 3:30 in the SAR.

THE COMMON COURTESIES

As this is being written it is not quite clear how the American people will respond to the visit of Mr. Khrushchev from Russia. It is interesting to note, however, that our federal security authorities are much exercised about his safety while he is among us. They are taking extreme precautions to guard against his being insulted or actually injured. There is evidence that we must set up more precautions for Mr. Khrushchev in America than we will set up, or expect the Russians to set up, for President Eisenhower when he goes to Russia.

This is a hard judgment on the American people, but probably a justified one. It would seem to indicate that we have more confidence in the good judgment of the Russian people than we have in our own people. It gives evidence that we, the American people, have not been able to become mature in the exercise of the common courtesies of life.

Tolerance, adaption to new ideas, and the common courtesies find opportunities to operate on our own McPherson campus. It is fortunate that we can have here people from many parts of the world, from many different religious backgrounds and beliefs, and from all races. Here we have opportunity to learn and to experience real Christianity and real Americanism.

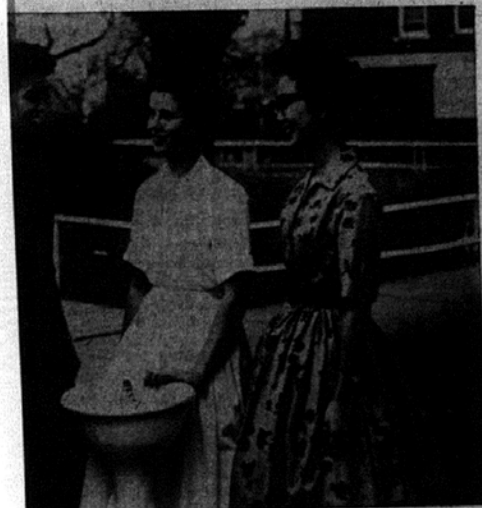

Parking Regulation For All Maccollege

Because of the overcrowded conditions on Macampus, officials have issued a set of rules to be followed for parking privileges on the campus.

To Have Privileges

1. All cars must be registered with the college at time of enrollment and must receive a sticker for the windshield.
2. All cars must show the sticker on the lower LEFT CORNER OF THE REAR GLASS before they are permitted to park on the college parking areas.
3. All cars must have stickers on car by Sept. 15. Failure to do so will constitute a violation.
4. Drivers must have a valid driver's license, state automobile registration, and liability insurance.
5. The college assures no responsibility for the care and protection of the vehicle or its contents while it is on the parking areas.
6. Driving or parking of any car in such a manner that it impedes the movement of other vehicles or pedestrians is prohibited.
7. All cars must park in the areas on campus which are regular parking areas.
8. Cars which are not in condition for use will be removed from the parking area and the owner shall be responsible for the charges involved.
9. Cars should not be backed into parking stalls.

Violation Penalties

Violations of any of the above regulations will be reported to the office of the Dean of Men, Frantz Hall, Room 10, where penalties in accord with the following will be assessed. These areas are designated as college parking areas:

1. West of College Gymnasium.
2. West of the Athletic Field.
3. In front of Dotzour Hall.
4. North of Dotzour Hall.
5. South of the Campus on the north side of Gordon St.
6. East of the Campus on the west side of Lehmer St.
7. East of the Industrial Arts Building.
8. East of Arnold Hall — Reserved for the residents of Arnold Hall, Fahnestock Hall, and Kline Hall.
9. West of the College Courts—Reserved for residents of the Courts.

Procedure

The Dean of Men assigns whatever fine applies to each ticket.

If money is involved in the fine, the offender takes to the Business Office the fine.

The Business Office offender a receipt and records the number and records the number receipt on the ticket. It is then returned to the Men's office and the placed on the student's traffic record; the original is then filed.

Any student who does not report to the Dean of Men and pay penalty within after the time the ticket is issued will have "class delinquencies" sent to his instructor. This prohibits the faculty from admitting him to classes until the Dean of Men issues a release. The Dean has the right to appeal to the Board of Appeals if he has a case.
