## Growing Pains Hit Campus As Enrollment Increases

An increase in enrollment at McPherson College for the fall semester has made necessary the expansion of housing facilities for students.

### Housing

Vaniman Hall has been converted into a dormitory for women, and houses 15 girls. Houseparents are Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Holderread. The Art Department which previously occupied the building has been moved to the Frantz Industrial Arts Building. Ceramics classes will continue to be held in the basement area of Vaniman Hall.

The parsonage has also been converted into women's housing facilities and 14 girls live there. Mrs. Alma Goodfellow Nigh is housemother.

The third floor of Kline Hall, formerly used for women students, is now being used for men. The first two floors continue to be used for married students. A considerable number of men students will be housed in private rooms and apartments near the campus.

### Construction

The athletic track at the college stadium has been blacktopped and surfaced with asphalt seal. This improvement will make possible increased use of the track for more meets.

Construction of the new Mohler Administration Building and the Brown Auditorium is progressing. Large concrete pillars to support the roof and second floor of the Mohler building have been placed in position, and construction of footing and foundation is nearly completed.

Plans are being prepared for the construction of a new dormitory for women, a student union-cafeteria building, and additional apartments for married students. Architectural drawings are being studied at the present for these new buildings.

### Enrollment

Enrollment for the fall semester started on Monday, Sept. 7 for Mac College students. Enrollment for all classes continued through Sept. 9. Classes convened at 7:45 a.m., Sept. 10.

### Arrival

Jim flew from New York City on Aug. 27 and arrived in Germany Sept. 4. He visited London, Paris, Brussels, Amsterdam and Frankfurt. From Frankfurt Jim traveled to Kassel, Germany where he will stay a while before going on to Goettingen.

Jim's parents met Christiane Brandt, the German exchange student from Goettingen at New Windsor, Maryland, and brought her home with them.

In Germany, Jim will spend some time in Christiane's home.

**Civil Service Seeks Applicants**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that applications are being accepted for examinations for filling the following positions:

Patent Adviser, \$5,430 to \$8,810 a year, Patent Examiner, \$4,490 to \$12,770 a year, and Design Patent Examiner, \$4,040 and \$4,980 a year, all for employment in various Federal agencies in the Washington, D. C., area.

Most of the Patent Adviser positions are for duty with the Department of Navy in its research and development programs. Most Patent Examiner and Design Patent Examiner positions are for duty with the U. S. Patent Office of the Department of Commerce.

No written test is required. To qualify, applicants must have had

appropriate college study or have had professional experience pertinent to the position for which they may apply.

For Patent Adviser and Patent Examiner, the college study must have been in engineering or in an applied physical science. For design Patent Examiner, in industrial design, architecture or product design, is required.

Full information concerning the requirements to be met for these positions and instructions for applying are given in the examination announcement for each.

Announcements and application forms may be obtained from post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications for these positions will be accepted until further notice.

**Mac Receives Share Of Grant**

McPherson College has received a share of a \$9,300 grant for education received by the private Church-Related Colleges of Kansas from the Standard Oil Foundation, Inc.

The grant was distributed to 16 independent four-year liberal arts colleges that belong to the Kansas Foundation of Private Colleges.

This is part of a total grant of \$175,000 the Foundation set aside this year for the benefit of more than 150 private colleges in 14 Midwest states. This new grant makes a total of \$1,150,000 given for this purpose since 1952.

The gift was delivered in person to Dr. D. W. Bittinger, president of the Kansas Foundation, by Standard Oil area representatives.

In accepting the grant for the association, Dr. Bittinger said, "We are thankful, not only for your gift this year, but for your courageous and far-seeing pioneering in this field of corporate assistance to private colleges. You have inspired many other industries to follow in the direction you have chartered."

McPherson College received \$590 as its share of the grant.

## Mac Farm Policy Same Under New Operator

"We're not too colorful people. We're just people," are the words Don Pauley, McPherson College farm operator, used to describe himself and his family.

Mr. Pauley was hired to replace Lyle Neher, former MacCollege farm operator, and said, "No specific change in the college farm policy has been indicated."

"I grew up on the farm and have been acquainted with dairying all my life," related Mr. Pauley.

Mr. Pauley and his wife, Lila Jean, came to McPherson with their 4 children, Mike, Mark, Joyce and Nancy, from Gypsum where he had worked the 2 years previously for a prominent Kansas construction firm.

Mrs. Pauley indicated a desire for the college students to use the farm facilities when she said, "The barn loft could be used for folk games and we would be glad to have the college people use the farm more."

Old books and coins are among Mr. Pauley's favorite pastimes. His collection of coins include an 1875 Indianhead penny and an 1897 nickel.

The rare books include an 1875 edition Johnson's New Illustrated Universal Cyclopaedia (A Scientific and Popular Treasury of Useful Knowledge) and an 1893 edition of the Portrait Biographical Record which contains biographies of Presidents and records of prominent citizens from McPherson, Saline, Dickinson, and Marion Counties.

"John Ward is still the farm

manager," mentioned Mr. Pauley, "and we are still building the dairy herd."

The present dairy herd includes twenty-five milk cows and twenty-four calves and heifers.

Principal crops include alfalfa, Sargo, and wheat with a Sudan-Rye pasture as a part of a continual crop rotation program.

Aside from home training, Mr. Pauley attended the GI Farm Training School in Solomon for 2½ years and Osborne High School where he graduated in 1946.

Pauleys attend The First Methodist Church and have transferred their membership from Gypsum to McPherson.

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# Parking Regulations Stated For All Macollege Students

Because of the overcrowded conditions on Macampus, officials have issued a set of rules to be followed for parking privileges on the campus.

### To Have Privileges

1. All cars must be registered with the college at time of enrollment and must receive a sticker for the windshield.
2. All cars must show the sticker on the lower LEFT CORNER OF THE REAR GLASS before they are permitted to park on the college parking areas.
3. All cars must have stickers on car by Sept. 15. Failure to do so will constitute a violation.
4. Drivers must have a valid driver's license, state automobile registration, and liability insurance.
5. The college assures no responsibility for the care and protection of the vehicle or its contents while it is on the parking areas.
6. Driving or parking of any car in such a manner that it impedes the movement of other vehicles or pedestrians is prohibited.
7. All cars must park in the areas on campus which are regular parking areas.
8. Cars which are not in condition for use will be removed from the parking area and the owner shall be responsible for the charges involved.
9. Cars should not be backed into parking stalls.

### Violation Penalties

Violations of any of the above regulations will be reported to the office of the Dean of Men, Frantz Hall, Room 10, where penalties in accord with the following will be assessed. The Dean of Men shall keep all records and penalties involving cash shall be payable only at the college Business Office.

2. Second violation ..... \$1.00
3. Third violation ..... \$2.00
4. Fourth violation ..... \$3.00
5. Fifth violation ..... \$5.00

7. East of the Industrial Arts Building.
8. East of Arnold Hall — Reserved for the residents of Arnold Hall, Fahnestock Hall, and Kline Hall.
9. West of the College Courts— Reserved for residents of the Courts.

### Procedure

The Dean of Men assigns whatever fine applies to each ticket.

If money is involved in the penalty, the offender takes his ticket to the Business Office and pays the fine.

The Business Office gives the offender a receipt marked paid and records the number of the receipt on the ticket. The ticket is then returned to the Dean of Men's office and the record is placed on the student's cumulative traffic record; the original ticket is then filed.

Any student who does not report to the Dean of Men's Office and pay penalty within 48 hours after the time the ticket was issued will have "class denial" notices sent to his instructors.

This prohibits the faculty member admitting him to further classes until the Dean of the College issues a release. The student has the right to go to the Board of Appeals if he feels he has a case.

## Dream Comes True For Macollege Family

A three-year-old dream came true for Mr. and Mrs. Paul Wagoner when little Ann Christine, a half American-Indian and half Korean baby girl, became their fifth child.

After reading of the difficulties in placing children of mixed backgrounds, Mr. Wagoner, who is alumni director for Mac, and his wife began writing to different denominational homes hoping for an adoption.

In May a call through the local welfare agency from Topeka indicated that a baby girl was waiting for their approval. On June 9 Ann became a Wagoner.

Six former McPherson students have completed a nine-week training program for the BVS at New Windsor, Md., and have been assigned to service projects.

Glenda Wine, Enders, Neb., who attended McPherson two years, is assigned to work with the Children's Aid Society, Neffsville, Pa. Lynda and Harold Connell, Brooklyn, Iowa, who both attended McPherson two years, are assigned to the Brethren Service Farm, Falfurrias, Texas.

Edwin Switzer and wife, June, of Huston, Colo., have been assigned to the Brethren Service Project, Castaner, Puerto Rico.

Edward Emmert, Redfield, Iowa, a 1958 graduate of McPherson College, has been assigned to the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

BVS workers in Neffsville may be a part of the Brethren Home for the aged, or the Children's Aid Society, an orphanage. In both cases the important function is being a "Moral booster" for those living there.

This could mean writing letters, reading and talking to the residents and planning religious programs and activities.

The 280-acre Brethren Service Farm, has its purpose in helping the Latin-American people of the area to improve their living conditions and providing them with a ministry of education, service and worship.

Young men on the farm assist with the farming, dairying, con-

struction and maintenance work. The girls help with homemaking, cooking and teaching.

The Brethren Service Project in Castaner, Puerto Rico, began in 1942, to provide needy people with the benefits of health, education, recreation, agricultural instruction and spiritual uplift.

In 1953, the project was expanded to start work at Cerrote, an isolated mountain community. Both projects have a center established, public schools and weekly clinics are conducted.

Workers assigned to the University of Michigan Hospital, are members of the Metabolic Research Unit. The main purpose of the program is to find how the glands of the body work while under stress and strain.

Volunteers are the subjects of various experiments simulating different types of stress or strain. The marching band under the direction of Forrest Kruschwitz will meet Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 3:30 in the Student Assembly Room in Sharp.

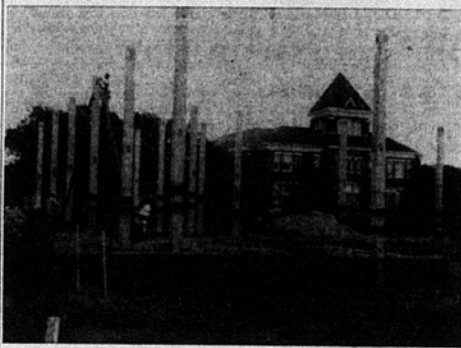
The string ensemble, directed by Paul Sollenberger will meet Tuesday and Thursday at 3:30 in the SAR.
