## Arnold Receives Grant From Science Foundation

George Arnold, assistant professor of physics and mathematics at Maccollege, has received a fellowship grant from the National Science Foundation to study at the University of Colorado at Boulder, Colo. this summer.

Professor Arnold will spend the ten week summer session as a research participant in physics. He applied for a position in the area of solid state physics.

### Possible Class Work

"I may be taking some class work although I have not yet received the complete details about the summer session," Professor Arnold commented.

The University of Colorado Math-Physics Department cooperates in research projects with the Boulder, Colo. Division of the National Bureau of Standards.

### To Live In Boulder

The Arnold family will move to Boulder prior to the June 20 opening of the session. At the close of the ten week session, the Arnolds will return to the Macampus where they are presently head residents in Fahnstock Hall.

Professor Arnold has been teaching in Maccollege since he received the M.S. degree from the

University of Wisconsin in 1957.

### Received Similar Grant

Last year Professor Arnold received a similar National Science Foundation grant for an eight week study at the University of Kansas.

Dr. John Burkholder, professor of biology, and Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, professor of chemistry, also received National Science Foundation grants last year.

# Macollege Is Fortunate; Cheating Is At Minimum

Cheating is not a problem isolated to McPherson College. The Saturday Evening Post recently carried a story implying that cheating is rampant among American colleges.

Anyone who regularly reads college newspapers and reads statistics on the subject will note this problem frequently is mentioned on all campuses. Wherever it is mentioned, general apathy ensues.

Cheating on Mac campus is not as bad as it could be, or as it is in the larger universities and colleges. There they are faced with classes with more than 100 students enrolled in each, and cheating has a way of growing like a grapevine.

What could be done to ease the problem?

First of all, a little more self-discipline on the part of the student body would help. The idea that we should allow some to cheat unnoticed is immature and stupid.

Secondly, if some of the large classes could be broken into one or two more classes, it would relieve some of the tension.

Thirdly, teachers who insist on giving the same tests year after year encourage the problem. In fact, there are many students who do not feel that getting the tests is cheating. It is more a form of self-protection since they know others who they are competing against for a grade will have the tests.

Admittedly, these suggestions do not face the real problem as to what actually causes some to cheat and others to allow it. However, this would seem to be a problem to solve it. Perhaps the problem comes from a unrealistic guidance program, perhaps it signifies the decline of American morality, perhaps it is the fault of the American educational system.

Wherever the fault lies, it is the problem facing all of us. It is one which cannot be ignored by students, faculty or administration.

Although generally the students on Mac campus have not been faced with this problem as readily as have bigger universities, it still remains a problem to cope with.

We are fortunate not to have any more trouble with it than has been. At least no one has been expelled from classes lately on that charge.

Let us receive the honest grade we earn in class not the dishonest 'A'.

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## Confusing Abbreviations Used Everyday On Campus

SUR or SAR? Is it upstairs or down in Sharp Hall? Have you ever asked yourself these questions? Abbreviations may often be more confusing than they are helpful.

Some other abbreviations that are used on Macollege campus are SoCo, MENC, MCA, CBYF, WAA, SNEA, and others.

The SUR is located downstairs in Sharp Hall. SUR refers to the Student Union Room. It is used as a social center on the campus, for watching television, all-school dances, or for committee or class meetings.

**Student Assembly Room**  
The SAR is the Student Assembly Room, located upstairs in Sharp Hall. It is used as a practice theater and as a practice room for the instrumental music groups on campus.

The abbreviation SoCo was coined by a former Spec editor, because the full name, Social Committee, was too long to put in headlines.

The SoCo is responsible for several social functions on campus — picnics, movies, and dances.

MENC or the Music Educators National Conference is a national organization whose prime purpose is the promotion of music with the accent on better music.

It is the desire of MENC that every individual wanting to express himself through the medium of music be given the opportunity to learn.

**Center of Religious Activity**  
The McPherson Christian Association, commonly called the MCA, is the center of religious activity on Macollege campus. The MCA's purpose is to meet the various religious needs of all students and faculty.

CBYF is an abbreviation that is familiar to many Macollege students. It stands for the Church of the Brethren Youth Fellowship.

Through this organization Macollege students are given the opportunity to meet the local church people and become a part of the local church group.

M Club, although this is not an actual abbreviation, is the name of the lettermen's organization on campus. The purpose of the M Club is twofold.

**Two Purposes**  
First, its members strive to promote fellowship within their own group and through such fellowship to inspire strong school

spirit in both students and faculty.

Second, the M Club seeks to aid in building and maintaining an athletic program of which Macollege may be justly proud.

The Women's Athletic Association, WAA, is a democratic organization open to all girls interested in sports.

Its aim is to promote greater physical efficiency, fellowship, scholarship and sportsmanship.

**Future Teachers Group**  
SNEA is an abbreviation that is familiar to many future teachers on Macollege campus. It is the Student National Education Association.

The Maurice A. Hess chapter was organized on the campus in 1953. The purpose of this organization is to develop an acquaintance with the history, ethics, and program of the organized teaching profession among young people who are preparing to be teachers.

BVF and BVS, standing for Brethren Volunteer Fellowship and Brethren Volunteer Service, respectively, are both Macollege campus abbreviations.

**Rec Council**  
Another campus organization with a commonly abbreviated name is the Recreational or Rec Council. The Rec Council consists of a group of students who are interested in understanding the basic fundamentals of church recreation.

An abbreviation which is used every day on campus and many times in this story is Macollege, a combination of McPherson and College.

Being present at away games (10 pts.); helping with pep skits (8 pts.); being present at meetings (10 pts.); working on special committees (15 pts.); and chairman of such committees (20 pts.).

**Awards**  
Awards are given to those members earning 100 or more points. The award for 100 points is a megaphone and a jacket is given to those receiving 300 points.

A small sterling silver bulldog is given for 700 points. Awards given to those earning 1200 points are at the discretion of the club members. A cup is awarded for 1800 points earned.

Joyce, a Macollege senior, is a member of A Cappella Choir and SNEA. She has also been active in band and orchestra.

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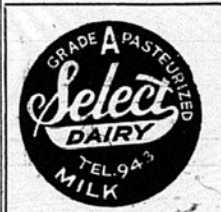
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## Quad Staff Finishing Up Pages For 1960 Annual

Last week-end the "Quadrangle" staff tied up the last loose ends for the 1960 Maccollege annual, the "Quadrangle".

Pages mailed to the printer before March 13 included progress pictures of Brown Auditorium and Mohler Administration Building, intramural shots, the "Spectator" staff page, the basketball section, pictures of "Othello," a photo of second semester students, the autographs page, the Homecoming Queens' pages and several pages of advertising and the student directory.

### Distribution Date

The 1960 "Quadrangle" should arrive on campus for distribution the week of May 13 according to the terms of the contract with Myers Yearbooks, Inc. of Topeka.

Each student regularly enrolled for both semesters will be eligible to receive a 1960 "Quadrangle".

Approximately five dollars per student is allocated to the "Quadrangle" from the Student Council grant each year. Half of this amount is received each semester and is stretched to cover publication costs and other charges.

Students who are new this semester or attended Maccollege only the first semester may secure a copy of the 1960 "Quad" by contracting either Don Hollenbeck, editor, or Pat Huber Hykes, business manager. A charge of \$2.50 is necessary to secure an annual in this manner.

### Plastic Cover Protectors

Two hundred sixty plastic yearbook cover protectors have been secured. These cover protectors will be available at a minimum cost to the students at the "Quad" signing party when the annual arrives.

A red brush drawing on a white background will cover the 104 pages of the 1960 "Quadrangle".

This year the "Quad" will have three main features and a closely knit but inclusive lay out editor Hollenbeck reports.

The end sheets in the new "Quad" will feature an eight by ten full color picture of the willow trees along the Lagoon on a summer afternoon.

Autograph space in the yearbook was increased by the inclusion of several blank pages at the back of the book.

### Division Pages

Another feature of the annual will be the division pages. These pages carry photographs of student art work. Completed in cooperation with Richard Slimon, assistant professor of art at Maccollege, the pages also include some of his paintings.
