

Stump Announces Plans To Work On Doctorate

"Go back in history as far as you can and I've been going to school."

This was the comment of Professor Harley Stump, assistant professor of English at Mac.

Stump was in Norman, Okla., last weekend meeting with his doctoral committee. Next year he will be doing work toward his doctorate at the University of Oklahoma.

His dissertation will be on the topic, "A Philosophy of Education for the Church Related College."

On Saturdays, Stump will commute to Macollege where he will teach Contemporary Literature and American Literature.

Attended Mac

"I can't remember when I wasn't going to school," continued Stump, who began his college education at McPherson.

After three semesters here, Stump transferred to Southwestern State College, Weatherford, Okla.

Stump, who began his teaching career in 1941 in a one-room elementary school west of Corn, Okla., has also been a minister in the Church of the Brethren.

Teacher-Preacher

He first began preaching in his home church at Waka, Texas in 1933. From Waka, Stump went to Cordell, Okla., and was pastor there from 1940 until 1952.

Oklahoma City became the Stump's home in 1945.

He was pastor here until 1952. Stump also finished his Master's Degree in 1952, at Oklahoma University.

From Oklahoma City, Stump took his family to Chicago, and he graduated from Bethany Biblical Seminary in 1954.

Teaches At Macollege

After his graduation, Stump accepted a pastorate at Empire, Calif., and was there until 1957. In 1957, Stump accepted a Teaching position at Macollege.

"I enjoy teaching at McPherson College and I'm hoping that in the future McPherson will continue to turn out students of high quality as it has done in the past," commented Stump.

In addition to his teaching duties at Macollege, Stump serves

as pastor of the Pleasant View Church of the Brethren near Hutchinson.

The Stump's two sons, Hari and Nelson are both students at Macollege.

Began In 1882

The "Messiah" was given for the first time in Lindsborg in 1882 under the direction of Mrs. Alma Swenson. Mrs. Swenson and her husband, Carl, came to Lindsborg to found Bethany College.

Thousands Attend

By 1900 this production had almost become a national institution. Today thousands come from all parts of the nation to hear the Messiah.

Some of the townspeople have been singing the "Messiah" for thirty years or more. Three generations may be found singing in the same performance.

Longest Day In The World

Recently I was snow-bound in Kansas City. For a while a major American city seemed to be almost completely paralyzed: public transportation stopped; the streets were crowded with stalled cars; the snow covered the cars until they looked like little Eskimo igloos. Everything seemed, suddenly, to come to an end. Death, a white, quiet, still death seemed to have gripped the city.

And then the storm passed; and suddenly the city was bursting with life. We were pushing each other out of the snow, we were getting under way again; busses and taxis started to move; factories and schools began to operate; life had come where things previously stood still. Easter is something like that. On Good Friday God's Son was taken from a cross and laid in a tomb. The next day was Saturday. This was the longest day in the world. Since then we have tried again and again to put Him in a tomb; to stop His work of love in the world. Sometimes we have succeeded, but only for a little while.

There is darkness in our world today, and suffering. Many are afraid. This Savior of hope stands always ready to help if we will let Him help. Our long night of fear can end. The day of good hope can come. He is willing.

We, too, must be willing. Are we?

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Mac's Beeghly Library Adds Ten New Books

Four new books concerning Jewish customs, New Testament thoughts, Kentucky folklore, and African Bushmen along with several other books have been added to McPherson College Beeghly Library.

The Jewish Festivals by Hayyim Schauss. The origin, background and present observance of each Jewish holiday, custom and ceremony is carefully explained.

Opening the New Testament by Floyd V. Wilson. As the title indicates, Dr. Wilson opens up for the common reader the message and significance of the books of the New Testament.

Up Cutsin and Down Greasy by Leonard W. Roberts. A Kentucky-born folklorist, Mr. Roberts, has recorded an account of the folkways of a Kentucky mountain family. This family has preserved the traditional ways of their forebears.

The Harmless People by Elizabeth Marshall Thomas. The African Bushmen of the Kalahari are still a mysterious people. Members of an expedition, to which Mrs. Thomas belonged, came to know the Bushmen well and learned many strange and intimate things.

The Enjoyment of Mathematics by Hans Rademach and Otto Caepilly. Requiring no more mathematical background than most people acquire in high school, this book introduces the reader to some of the fundamental ideas of mathematics, the ideas that make mathematics exciting and interesting.

The Letter to the Romans by Emil Brunner. This commentary is interwoven with the text of the Revised Version of the Bible of Paul's letter to the Romans. Mr. Brunner, one of today's greatest theologians, has written a masterpiece of carefully organized thought.

Stoneware and Porcelain by Daniel Rhodes. Traditions, techniques, and materials used in high fired pottery are explained by the author. A brief history of Oriental and European history is included with the practical information.

Decoupage by Dorothy Harrower. People have been decorating with paper cut-outs for years. This book gives the history of decoupage plus complete directions for making many projects.

How Children Learn To Speak by M. M. Lewis. The puzzling questions of a child developing its speech are discussed by Mr. Lewis. A guide to understanding how the language, the mind and the spirit of a child unfold are the purposes of the book.

Individualizing Your Reading Program by Jeannette Veatch. Part I of the book describes, explains, and supports an individualized reading program. Part II is a collection of selected articles by many educators with experience in such an approach to reading instruction.

"Wake Up and Read!" This is the theme for National Library Week, April 3-9, 1960. For three years National Library Week has been observed.

The purpose of this week is to encourage the people of the United States to do more reading. Emphasis will be placed on school college, and home libraries.

Libraries will be working in cooperation with other great sources of enlightenment and entertainment: magazines, newspapers and national and local networks of radio and television.

Habit Is Vital
A reading habit is a source of enrichment to the individual, besides being vital to a democratic society. Without the written word the United States could not exist. Yet, as a nation we have not formed a reading habit.

People have plenty of time. The work week has been cut from 60 to 40 hours. Time-saving electrical appliances have been invented that replace much of manual labor. Our life span has been lengthened.

Survey Shows
A Gallup poll was taken in 1955.

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This poll discovered that 61 per cent had read only the Bible the previous year. Another survey revealed that one-half of the nation's adults live within one mile of a public library, but only one-fifth get to it.

Reading Increased
Reading, as a part of our daily lives, has increased. This can be seen in sales of newspapers, magazines, and books, and in use of public libraries, but the increase has not been as great as it has been in many other uses of leisure time.
