## Widrig, Macollege Grad Hired To Succeed Keim

Donald Widrig, a '59 graduate of McPherson College, has been hired as assistant coach and instructor in physical education, Dean Wayne Geisert announced.

Widrig replaces George Keim who will become head coach at Bridgewater College in Virginia. Bridgewater is another of the six colleges of the Church of the Brethren.

Widrig will be the assistant coach in football, basketball, and track. He will teach such courses as first aid, recreational leadership, general physical education, and others.

He will be doing graduate work at Emporia State Teachers College this summer and continue work on his masters degree during the school term.

### High School Teacher

This past year Widrig was head track coach and assistant coach in football and basketball for his home high school in Beloit. He also taught classes in American history and government there.

Widrig began college on a football scholarship to Washburn University in Topeka, and continued with a track scholarship to Kansas University.

After his time in the service in Japan, Widrig came to McPherson College to complete his work on a history major.

### Javelin Record

While in school here, Widrig

threw the javelin 191 feet 3 inches for a college record which still stands. He was outstanding as a halfback, as a basketball guard,

and in the broad jump. During his senior year he worked as a trainer for Coach Sid Smith.

Donald Widrig and his wife, June, will move to McPherson as he assumes his duties for the coming school term.

### Frantz Promoted To Ranks Of Full Prof.

Dr. Merlin Frantz, associate professor of education and psychology, has been promoted to the rank of full professor, Dean Wayne Geisert announced.

This promotion to full professor advances Dr. Frantz to the highest ranking in the McPherson College faculty.

Dr. Frantz came to McPherson College in 1954, and receiving his doctorate in education from the University of Nebraska in January of 1959.

Dr. Frantz will become head of the Education Department and will continue his work as head of the secondary school program.

A course in Driver Training for teachers will be offered at Macollege during the summer session. Phil Lane, McPherson high school driver training instructor, will teach the class.

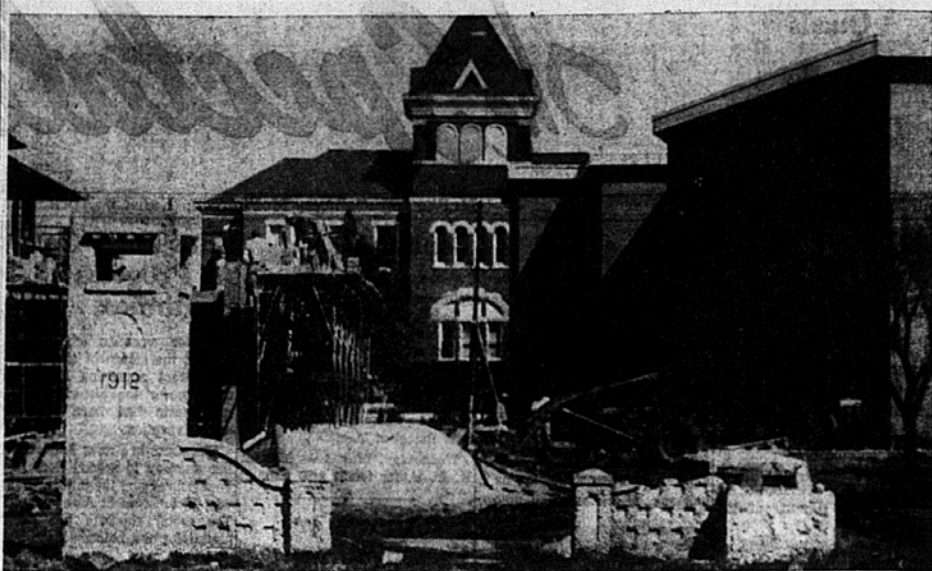
The five-hour course will begin May 30 and end July 8.

## Mae Wins 3rd In Triangular; Cops 6th In Ottawa Relays

Bethel College of Newton nosed the McPherson and Tabor track teams by scores of 57 5/6, 53 1/2, and 50 1/3, in a triangular meet held on the college track Tuesday.

The Bulldogs placed sixth in the Ottawa Relays which were held last weekend. Ottawa won its own relays with 86 1/2 points, and McPherson had a total of 26 1/5.

McPherson's Galeri Huffman was the only Bulldog to place first for the Bulldogs. Huffman won the pole vault event by clearing the bar at 12 feet.

A total of eleven Kansas Colleges participated in the Ottawa event.

Mac won a triangular track meet held at McPherson last week with Kansas Wesleyan and Sterling participating.

McPherson copped five first places and had a total of 59 points, Kansas Wesleyan finished second with 56 1-3 and Sterling third with 45 1/2 points.
