Pondering With The President

Students Are Awakening

Some of our major magazines, including Life magazine are noting a new trend among our students in America.

Throughout the centuries students have frequently led their nations in courageous and new thinking. Some times the student thinking has broken the customs or mores of the community or country in which they lived. Their judgments have not always proved to be wise and their enthusiasms have sometimes been misdirected, but in general students have led out in directions which eventually became helpful and progressive movements.

In contrast to this historical record in old-world countries, students in America have frequently been introverted; their major expressions have often focused upon the foolish rather than the thoughtful. Party-raids, water-throwings, intercollege paintings of buildings or statues has occupied their time. Some of these activities have sometimes led to forthright Destructiveness; they more properly belonged to the preparatory school or academy than at the college level.

Recently students in America have also begun to think and to take positions on major matters confronting their nation and which are important in the world situation.

Two foci of attention which have gained some prominence in America as far as students are concerned are: racial injustice and ineptness in government.

A recent air-force manual was brought to national attention because it sought to tell air-force personnel in what they should believe religiously. Hidden away in this manual was another frightening admonition to air-force personnel. In essence it was, "Do not think, let those who direct you think for you." When asked questions your answers could be, "I do not know."

The general creeping dominance of the military upon all international officers is illustrated in the bringing down of an American plane over Russia. This was not at the edges of Russia, but near the center of it. The young man in the plane explained, "I had to go," and "I had to do." He was not asked to do any thinking for himself.

The days of juvenile delinquency on the part of youth of college age is beginning to pass. Instead of being delinquents, students in America are beginning to think and to believe in something. We, who are their parents and their teachers, can rejoice, even though their thinking may be different from ours. We who are older should be counselors; we should avoid being suppressors.

'Music Is All I've Known' Replies Mac Music Teacher

"It's all I've ever known," says Mrs. Audrey San Romani when asked about the role music has played in her life.

Mrs. San Romani started taking piano lessons when she was only 8 years old. She started accompanying for the school when still in the lower grades. As a youngster of 12, she was leading the singing at her church.

"I never got to sing in high school," says Mrs. San Romani. "I was always the one who did the accompanying."

At Bethany College she continued her work as an accompanist.

After two years of college, Mrs. San Romani began teaching at Pawnee Rock, Kansas. She served as music supervisor for both the grade school and high school.

She also taught junior high English. Mrs. San Romani held this position for two years before returning to Bethany to finish college.

Following her junior year at Bethany she was married to Archie San Romani. Her husband was also a music major and she accompanied him on many trumpet solos.

Arkansas City, Kansas, became the home of the young couple after their graduation from Bethany, and they resided there for the next 16 years.

Mrs. San Romani was the only state accredited piano teacher in the city and taught class piano work for grades 2 through 6. She also had a private class. Her husband was band and orchestra director for 6th grade through junior college.

After Mr. San Romani's death, she returned to Bethany. She spent 2 years here, studying piano and organ.

Mrs. San Romani then accepted a position as music supervisor for the city schools of Ottawa, Kansas. She also taught music from kindergarten through senior high. At the same time she served as organist for the Presbyterian Church.

In 1945 Mrs. San Romani came to McPherson College. Here she taught music education and organ. It was not until 1952 that she added piano students to her schedule at the college. Now, eight years later, in 1960, she teaches 24 piano students and 12 organ students.

Mrs. San Romani also teaches

Elementary Music Education. She has served as organist for the Lutheran Church in McPherson for the past 15 years. She is a member of the American Guild of Organists.

When asked about interests other than music, Mrs. San Romani responded that she loves to do fancy work of any kind. She has spent countless hours embroidering, crocheting and making quilts.

Rothrock Uses Reading Tests For Doctorate

Dayton Rothrock, assistant professor of education, is conducting a controlled experiment in reading as research for his doctoral dissertation.

Research for the thesis, "Three Approaches to the Teaching of Reading," is being conducted in the McPherson Public Schools.

250 fourth and fifth grade pupils are taught reading by one of three methods: the heterogeneous grouping approach, homogeneous grouping approach or individualized reading.

The children were given reading tests in September. They will be given another test the first of May.

The purpose of the experimentation is to discover under which approach students made the greatest gains.

Upon the completion of this project, Rothrock, a Davenport, Neb. native, will receive a doctorate from the University of Nebraska.

Before coming to MacCollege in 1956, Rothrock was high school coach at Carleton, Neb. and superintendent of schools at Gresham, Neb.

She plans to fly to Berlin, Germany, from New York City on June 23. While in Berlin, she plans to visit with relatives.

On July 2 she is going to Paris, France, where she will join a textile and fashion study tour sponsored by Syracuse University in New York.

Paris Fashions

While in Paris they will visit fabric houses, a millinery showing, a perfumery plant, and several fashion shows. Sight-seeing will also be included during the tour. A silk mill will be visited in Lyon, France. A sweater mill and a shoe factory will be toured in Italy. The making of lace and glass will also be studied in Italy.

Compare Textiles

The making of lace in Belgium will be compared with that of Italy. While in London, England, the group will visit a textile testing laboratory and will attend several fashion shows.

A cashmere sweater factory will be visited in Scotland and a linen mill in Ireland.

Passion Play

On July 24, Miss Siek is planning to attend the Passion Play at Oberammergau, Germany. August 1 is the day she plans to start her trip home.
