Pondering With The President

Shooting The Moon Costs Many McPherson Colleges

By Dr. D. W. Bittinger

They tell us that those who were watching with adequate telescopes at the proper vantage points and at the right time were able to see a dust cloud on the moon when the recent Russian space vehicle landed there.

We are glad that this vehicle did not split or destroy the moon. Its quiet, peaceful light is needful both to youth and to age. Moreover, many things that happen on the earth, such as the tides which wash and clean our sea shores, are dependent upon the moon, at least in some measure.

We are only at the beginning of what is to be attempted by way of space travel. Could it be that because of competition with a neighboring nation (and are not all nations now neighbors), we may become off balance with reference to space probes?

We presently will try to put a man into orbit. We do not know how many shots into space this will require, but one shot, we are told, may cost as much as the money valuation of 125 McPherson Colleges.

Recently we made about a dozen tries to reach outer space; several were successful. Each try costs as much as two McPherson Colleges.

We are now preparing eight new outer space vehicles at a cost of 46 McPherson Colleges. We are readying another vehicle to try to reach the moon. This will not carry a man. This will cost us 48 McPherson Colleges.

We hope presently to put a man on the moon. This effort is estimated to cost us totally 500 million McPherson Colleges before it concludes. Each individual effort to put a man on the moon is expected to cost 20 million McPherson Colleges.

Perhaps it is necessary that we spend all of this in order to get useful information. We should make sure, however, that is is better to spend this much money in this way, rather than to place it into a wider based improvement of the educational offerings of our nation and world.
