Pondering With The President

Shooting The Moon Costs Many McPherson Colleges

They tell us that those who were watching with adequate telescopes at the proper vantage points and at the right time were able to see a dust cloud on the moon when the recent Russian space vehicle landed there.

We are glad that this vehicle did not split or destroy the moon. Its quiet, peaceful light is useful both to youth and to age. Moreover, many things that happen on the earth, such as the tides which wash and clean our sea shores, are dependent upon the moon, at least in some measure.

We are only at the beginning of what is to be attempted by way of space travel. Could it be that because of competition with a neighboring nation (and are not all nations now neighbors), we may become off balance with reference to space probes?

We presently will try to put a man into orbit. We do not know how many shots into space this will require, but one shot, we are told, may cost as much as the money valuation of 125 McPherson Colleges.

Recently we made about a dozen tries to reach outer space; several were successful. Each try costs as much as two McPherson Colleges.

We are now preparing eight new outer space vehicles at a cost of 46 McPherson Colleges. We are readying another vehicle to try to reach the moon. This will not carry a man. This will cost us 48 McPherson Colleges.

We hope presently to put a man on the moon. This effort is estimated to cost us totally 500 million McPherson Colleges before it concludes. Each individual effort to put a man on the moon is expected to cost 20 million McPherson Colleges.

Perhaps it is necessary that we spend all of this in order to get useful information. We should make sure, however, that it is better to spend this much money in this way, rather than to place it into a wider based improvement of the educational offerings of our nation and world.

Exchange Student Nettleton Writes About Deutschland

Greetings to all the college family came recently from Jim Nettleton, MacCollege's exchange student to Germany and to the school in Gottingen.

Trip
Jim left New York on August 27 and made several stopovers in various cities on the way to Germany. He arrived in Frankfurt on September 4. Since then Jim has been in Kassel and in Gottingen.

Recently Jim has been with two practice teachers from Gottingen in the small village of Meimbren. In his words he says, "This has been a wonderful opportunity for meeting the German people, and it has been a lot of fun. The atmosphere is friendly, and the children seem very studious."

'New Experiences'
Jim relates one of his many new experiences to us. This occurred shortly after he arrived in Germany on the train ride from Frankfurt to Kassel.

"I arrived at the station with ten minutes to spare. Using gestures and a few words in German, I bought my ticket, then picked up my suitcases and dashed for track No. 18. The cars were crowded and many of us stood until some got off at different stations.

"It was certainly an experience to ride—being virtually unable to

communicate and people all around speaking in a foreign tongue. At every station I would get a puzzled look on my face and ask, 'Kassel!'"

Through the efforts of Rev. X. L. Coppock the McPherson College Museum has received the gift of a first edition of the Christopher Saur Bible. This book was printed in Germantown, Penn. in 1743, and is the first Bible printed in America in a foreign language.

The Christopher Saur Press was owned and operated by Christopher Saur, one of the first members of the Church of the Brethren to immigrate from Germany to the United States.

Press Destroyed
The Christopher Saur Press and entire establishment was destroyed

by the armies of George Washington during the Revolutionary War. The buildings were used by General Washington's men for the stabling of their horses.

The Bible is now on display in the museum case located in the halls of the third floor of Harnly Hall, on the McPherson College Campus.

Asphalt Tracks For Mac; One Of Four In U. S.

A demand for an all-weather running surface has resulted in McPherson College owning a track like which there are only three others in the United States.

Controversial
One of the most controversial subjects concerning athletic facilities is the proper construction of running tracks and runways for field events. Apparently there is no definite pattern of such construction excepting the cinder track.

For several years the University of Florida had been working on a track which would be accepted universally but would still be domestic to every section of the country.

All-Weather
The track would serve as an all-weather, non-maintenance installation and would afford a constant surface no matter where track meets were held.

The type of surface on the Mac track, was tested on tennis courts and other similar surfaces. The actual construction of this track necessitated an accurate sub-grade which was checked for elevation and slope with a

straightedge and then thoroughly compacted.

An emulsified binder was milled with a sand base and then leveled and compacted.

The track on Macampus has not been finished at this time. Upon completion, a surface of Grasstex and weather coating will be applied to the asphalt. On this type of track spikes are not necessary.
