Framework for the room layout is being installed in Mohler Hall on both floors, as are the window frames.

The inside plastering began this past week by Crawford & Son and is hoped to be completed by about June 10. Also the electrical wiring and plumbing are being installed.

Meanwhile work progresses more slowly on Brown Auditorium with the balcony railing being built and more of the wiring being installed in the auditorium proper.

Outside the men dig work on the tunnel which will carry heat and water to Brown Auditorium, Mohler Hall, and the new student union building.

Construction on the latter will begin sometime this fall and about the same time the wing to Dotzour Hall will be started.

Construction on the new college courts unit is expected to begin this summer.
