

Maccollege Enters Chemistry By TV

Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, head of the chemistry department, is co-ordinator for McPherson College students enrolling for the "Modern Chemistry" course, beginning Sept. 28 on KARD-TV. The telecast is 6:30-7:00 a.m. Monday-Friday.

This course will continue through Feb. 2, 1960 for the first semester, for which Oct. 7 is the last chance to enroll. Second semester will begin on Feb. 3 and continue through May 27, 1960.

During the semester a survey of fundamental principles of chemistry and a study of recent developments will be made. Also, structures of chemical species, particularly the relationships of them to chemical and physical properties, will be emphasized.

Five workshops will be held between 9:00 and 11:30 a.m. on campus: Oct. 10, 24; Nov. 21; Dec. 12; and Jan. 23. They will provide opportunity for testing, discussion, and problem solving.

Dr. John F. Baxter, head of the General Chemical Division at Florida University, will be the teacher on this program. He will be assisted by a nine member advisory committee appointed by the American Chemical Society.

Guest speakers, including Nobel Prize Winners, will make significant contributions to the course throughout the year.

The texts for the course are "Modern Chemistry" and "A Guide to Modern Chemistry", Vol. 1, by Baxter and Steiner. The cost for the texts is \$3.75, postage and tax included.

A student may enroll for either 3 hours credit at \$37.50, or enroll for no credit at \$10.00, but yet have workshop privileges.

This course is arranged by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and NBC, in cooperation with the American Chemical Society.

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Macollege Bulldogs Nail Bethel Graymaroons 28-6

Macollege Bulldogs roared back after a slow first quarter to nail Bethel College to a 28-6 defeat in the Bulldog's first Kansas Conference game of the season. The game was played before about 2,200 fans.

Bethel kicked off but the Bulldogs, having trouble getting started, had to punt on the fourth play. Bethel took over on its own 49-yard line and 15 plays later went over for the only Bethel score.

The first quarter ended with the Bulldogs scoreless. Early in the second quarter Daryl Elmore returned a Bethel punt to the Bethel 45-yard line. In six plays the Bulldogs got within striking distance and on the seventh play Bryce Heinz twisted through the Bethel defense 15 yards to score.

Gordie Lewis kicked the extra point for each of McPherson's four touchdowns.

The Bulldogs scored again late in the second period when Max Grossnickle recovered a Bethel fumble on the Bethel 32-yard line. McPherson took to the air with Heinz on the receiving end of a Heidebrecht pass for eight.

Leroy Hayes ran another eight yards and in another two plays had the ball on about the one-yard line. Heidebrecht plunged over from there to score.

After a scoreless third quarter, the Bulldogs started a drive early

in the fourth quarter from their own 19. Four plays put the Bulldogs on the Bethel 49-yard line.

From the Bethel 49 the Bulldogs failed to make a first down in three plays. Marvin Keck went back to kick but instead resorted to an aerial attack with Heinz again the receiver for a gain of 11 yards.

From there the Bulldogs made two good gains and Darry Melton scored from the one yard line.

Later in the fourth the Bulldogs took over on the Bethel 40. In a few plays the Bulldogs gained to the Bethel 16. A 15-yard penalty was called against McPherson putting them back on the 31.

The Bulldogs made the yardage back to the 17 and Tom Richards ran the remaining yards around the left end to score.

Heinz was the top ground gainer for McPherson, averaging 7.5 yards per carry on 17 attempts. Melton averaged 6.6 yards on five carries, Richards 5.4 on 12. Keck 4.0 on seven, and Leroy Hayes 3.1 on nine.
