

Administration Prepares For Chapel Attendance

Mac students have been recently subjected to new regulations concerning chapel attendance. Two one-hour sessions of chapel are held each week on Tuesdays and Fridays. The Chapel Committee and Administration has prepared the following explanation of the new rules to go into effect next semester.

The purposes of chapel at Mc-Pherson College are several fold. Among these are: a. To bring the Church Changes college family together in one body for fellowship and communi-Sunday School cation. b. Ever since the college was foundcd in 1887 chapel attendance, sim-ilar to attendance at classes, has been an expected and required will be everyday problems, though part of McPherson college life. Biblically centered. Various methods of checking altendance and various methods of "compensation for", or mak-ing up for absences have been tried.

Chapel Regulations

Beginning with the second se-mester, the following will be the chapel regulations. 1. All students are expected to attend all chapels and assemblies. Any exceptions assemblies. Any exceptions to this regulation, or any excused absences, must be applied for, in writing, to the chairman of the chapel committee.
