In their second meeting at Lindsborg, Bethany came out on top at the end of one overtime 65-63. However, the Bulldogs were leading in this contest 56-54 before a foul in the last second of regulation play gave the Swedes two free throws to knot up the game at 56-56.

The Braves were not as lucky with their foul shots, as they hit two for five for 40 per cent. The Bulldogs played a very smooth brand of ball and collected only four fouls during the game.
