Six new faculty members have been added this year to the McPherson College teaching staff, with two of the members 1959 graduates of Macollege.

The new faculty members are Don Widrig, Irvin Wagner, Miss Eleanor A. Kravig, Donald E. Fullerton, Mrs. Elizabeth Jaderborg and Vladimir Czaplinski. Mrs. Opal Miller is a new house-mother.

Two other faces, new to the college students will be the Rev. Harold Z. Bomberger, pastor of the college church, and Charles Herman, food service manager of the Slater Food Service that is replacing the college cafeteria.

Music Department

Irvin Wagner, a 1959 graduate of McPherson College, has been hired to be an assistant professor in music.

Mr. Wagner was very active in college activities during his four years at Mac. He was a member of the A Cappella, band, men's council, men's quartet and Quintet, SNEA, Student Court, MENC, CBYF, McPherson College Players, and the symphonette. He was also selected to the collegiate Who's Who.

Mr. Wagner graduated from McPherson High School, and just recently he completed work on his Master's Degree at the Eastman School of Music, Rochester, N.Y.

Art Department

Miss Eleanor S. Kravig will become assistant professor of Art. She will fill the position left by Mr. Richard Slimon, retiring assistant professor of art at Macollege.

A Fulbright Scholar to Norway in 1949-1950, Miss Kravig received her B. S. from the University of Minnesota and her Master's Degree in art from Hunter College in New York City.

While a Fulbright Scholar she studied at the University of Oslo, Norway, and received a diploma for her work in Survey of Norwegian Art as well as in her work in history and psychology.

Miss Kravig comes to McPherson College with teaching experience in colleges in Pennsylvania, Virginia, Ohio, New York and Kentucky.

Math Department

Donald E. Fullerton has been hired to fill the vacant position of assistant professor of math at Mac, created by the retirement of Prof. Joseph Bowman in 1959.

Going through undergraduate work on a Nebraska State Teachers College scholarship, Mr. Full-

erton has also been a Nebraska Regents Scholarship winner.

Mr. Fullerton received his B.S. from Nebraska State Teachers College in Chadron, Neb., and his Master's Degree from the University of South Dakota.

He attended the Academic Year Institute at the University of South Dakota on a 1958-1959 National Science Foundation Fellowship.

English Department

Mrs. Elizabeth Jaderborg of Lindsay has been hired as a part-time instructor in Written Communications. Mrs. Jaderborg will help fill the vacancy created by Prof. Harley Stump, who is working on his Doctor's Degree at the University of Oklahoma and is teaching only on Saturday.

A 1940 graduate of Keene State Teachers College, Keene, New Hampshire, Mrs. Jaderborg has taken additional work at Bethany College, the University of Wichita, the University of Connecticut, and the University of New Hampshire.

For the past several years, Mrs. Jaderborg has taught English Composition in the Bethany Extension at Schilling Air Force Base in Salina.

Mrs. Jaderborg will reside in Lindsay where her husband is principal of the Lindsay high school.

Russian Language

Vladimir Czaplinski has been hired by McPherson College to teach Russian every Monday and Wednesday evening at 7:25.

Mr. Czaplinski was born and educated in Russia and lived there until he and his family were forced to flee the country.

After graduating from the Classical Gymnasium, he studied at the Agricultural Institute in Odesa, from which he graduated with the diploma of agronomist equivalent to a Master's in science.

Mr. Czaplinski took special work in methods of teaching Russian at Columbia University during last semester.

Mr. and Mrs. Czaplinski have two sons in high school and a daughter in kindergarten. They are now citizens of the United States.

New English Proficiency Test Given Tomorrow

A new English Proficiency Test for juniors will be given tomorrow morning, Saturday, September 10, beginning at 8:00 a.m. in the Chemistry Lecture Room in Harnly Hall.

The test will be given in two parts. The first part will be a standardized test of English usage. A break will follow this one hundred minute test.

The second part of the test will be the composition of a short essay. During the allotted 100 minutes each student will write on one of the topics suggested.

Only pen and ink are to be provided by the students. Use of a dictionary will be permissible in the second portion of the test.

Lois Keim, Mac Exchange Student Arrives In Germany

Lois Keim, German exchange student from Macollege for the 1960-61 school year, is presently studying the German language at the Goethe Institute in Lundberg, Germany.

The Goethe Institute is located in a town of 60,000.

At the close of her training at the Goethe Institute, where no English is spoken, Lois will travel with another exchangee from Pennsylvania.

Lois left for Germany from Montreal on July 23 and spent one and one-half days traveling up the St. Lawrence Seaway before reaching open sea. After six days on the ocean her boat arrived in Southampton, England.

Three McPherson College students visited with Lois in Paris, France shortly after she arrived there. Patsy Bolen, senior, Quin-

ter, Lucy Hess, sophomore, Waterloo, Iowa; LaVena Murrey, senior, Conway; and Lois saw the Eiffel Tower, open markets, the Arc of Triumph, the Pantheon, Notre Dame Cathedral, Sacre Coeur, and other sights of interest in France.

Following her Paris visit Lois boarded a plane for Germany. In describing her typical day Lois said, "I get up, wash in cold water, walk a mile to the institute, and there I eat breakfast consisting of two hard rolls, hot tea, and an apple or an orange."

In Crisis!

As I write this the newspaper headlines are affirming or predicting the following:

- *World War III has already begun!
- *The reason we have performed rather poorly in the Olympics at Rome is that our athletes have placed "wine, women, and song" above athletic achievement!
- *Russian pressures will really be the determining factor in the selection of our next president!
- *Now that the peoples of Africa have actually put to flight a considerable group of white people they will unite to drive all white men from their continent!
- *A major hurricane threatens off the Caribbean and Florida area!

These headlines and others similar to them which will follow from day to day indicate that we are perpetually in some kind of crisis or other. The tenor and tempo of our world-and of our own personal psychological make-ups seem to press us toward crisis living.

In the midst of all of this crisis, however, life goes on reasonably.

There are thousands who are enrolling quietly in high school, college, and university.

There are millions who are gathering the fall products from their gardens in order to make "chow chow".

At McPherson the halls of the new building which were constructed wide in order to accommodate moving groups of people, are already clogged with students who fill them from brim to brim greeting one another and planning their educational programs. While hurricanes approach, or the papers predict that a world war has begun, these students are planning for the long future.

This is good.

It helps to off set the "crisis psychology" and places in perspective the importance of planning step by step for a more understanding world, a happier future, a mature people.

When asked about other conference teams, Coach Smith rated Ottawa, College of Emporia Baker, and Southwestern as the conference teams with the brightest prospects.

Each of these college teams has over twenty returning letterwinners.

Smith chose Ottawa and Southwestern to battle it out for the conference championship.

"Bethel will be tough this year too," he said, "because they have almost their whole team back and have picked up a top-notch quarterback that will give them strength."
