"Hamlet," by William Shakespeare, will be presented by the McPherson College Players in Brown Auditorium at 8 tonight and tomorrow night, March 17-18.

James Peter Coulson, assistant professor of drama and literature, is directing this production, which is considered the most famous play in the English language.

Hamlet, the most complex of Shakespeare's tragic heroes, is paradoxically the most probable to the modern mind. A Renaissance prince with the education, intelligence, and moral sensitivity of the ideal ruler, Hamlet returns to a Denmark out of joint; to a world of murder and incest masked in fine appearances.

Sworn to revenge and ready to act, he delays, fearful of mistaking the appearance for the reality. His decision, once reached, has terrifying implications for all.

Unit Setting

Maurice Evans edition of "Hamlet" is being used as a basis for this production, cutting the playing time to a little over two hours. A unit setting provides for swift changes of scene and almost continuous action.

Vernard Foley, a senior from Morrill, will portray Hamlet.

McPherson College Trustees were on Macampus March 2-4 for their annual business meeting.

Harold Mohler, Warrensburg, Mo., was elected chairman of the Board of Trustees of McPherson College. Mr. Mohler has a son, Steve who is a freshman at Mac.

Mohler succeeds Paul Sargent, McPherson, who has been chairman the past five years. Sargent was elected vice chairman of the board.

Another McPherson man, Paul Sherfy, was re-elected secretary of the board. His daughter, Sonja, is a freshman.

Positions Filled

Trustees approved the hiring of Miss Mary Ann Robinson, McPherson, to fill the position of Dean of Women for next year. She will also serve as assistant professor of psychology.

Wilbur H. Lauer was also hired as a building and ground employee. Lauer is from Pomona. His son Wendell is a sophomore at Mac.

Completion of the building program which includes the new student union and the addition to Dotzour Hall, was discussed.

Construction Progresses On Additions

Construction is progressing satisfactorily on the two new additions to Maccollege campus — the wing to the girl's dormitory and the Student Union and Cafeteria.

Second floor of the Dotzour wing has been poured in preparation for the slab lift method. The slab lift, used in the construction of Dotzour Hall and Mohler Hall, provides for the pouring of each floor and the roof on platforms. The floors and roof are then raised into position by jacks.

Eighteen column supports and electrical conduits are placed in the foundation before the floors are poured. First section of the floor of the Student Union and Cafeteria was poured last week after a slight delay in getting steel.

Both buildings are to be completed by September 11 for the 1961-62 school year. Vaniman Hall, being used as a temporary girls' dorm, will be converted into housing for men.

Edna and Royer Dotzour, who contributed the funds for building Dotzour Hall are furnishing the new wing, which will include a lounge on each floor.

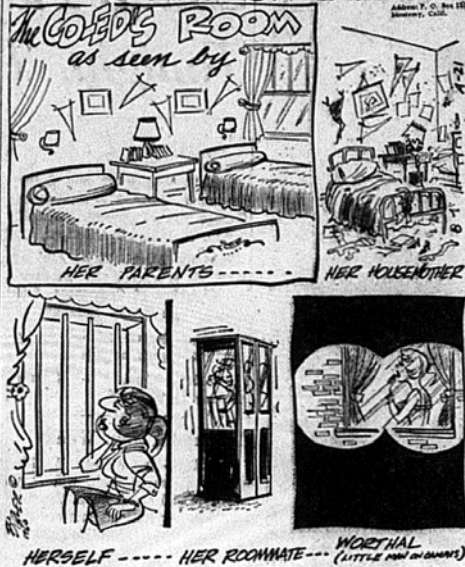
The neighbor has come to propose to the farmer's daughter, and a comical conflict of their temperaments arises which almost causes the marriage proposal to be lost in the shuffle.

Brethren Applauds Peace Corps

The head of a church youth volunteer movement today applauded the government's rapidly-developing plans for a peace corps, declaring that youth can be the most effective carriers of the best American image abroad.

Dr. W. Harold Row, executive secretary of the Brethren Service program of the Church of the Brethren, based his view on the experiences he has had since 1945 with 1,950 youth whom his agency has placed in this country and in 20 countries abroad. Many of them have worked in tasks similar to those proposed for youth corps' members.

Dr. Row supported the current proposals to place youth corpsmen both in domestic and foreign assignments and to seek participants on a voluntary, subsistence basis. He urged, however, that the chief end of the peace corps be not assistance, but mutual contact.

"Superiority and condescension must be avoided," he said. "The program should reflect the attitude that America has much to learn from other people."

Mutuality

A two-way or multilateral ex-

change, in which youth of other lands engage in social service in this country, would express true mutuality, Dr. Row suggested.

The churchman averred that the peace corps will work only if it is devoid of dogma, whether it be religious, economic, political, or technological.

He further stressed that the overseas projects must help people to achieve their own objectives rather than to impose goals or institutions upon them. He urged that the projects be related to existing institutions and programs, so that the cessation of activities by the corps does not bring an end to the work itself.

Special Concerns

The Church of the Brethren executive, who also holds key relationships with a score of other church, national, and international service agencies, added these concerns in a statement submitted to peace corps planners:

1. Some peace corps units should be comprised of mobile teams, ready to move with dispatch to areas of natural or man-made disasters.
2. Such traits as sensitivity and creativity are more important than technical skills in working in underdeveloped countries. Whatever expert knowledge is needed may be gained through specialists.
3. Training of corpsmen should include orientation not only in

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Psychologists To Visit Macampus On April 11-12

Dr. and Mrs. Roger G. Barker, psychologists, will be at McPherson College Tuesday and Wednesday, April 11 - 12. Dr. Barker is an American Psychological Association Visiting Lecturer which is supported by the National Science Foundation.

This program permits leading psychologists to visit colleges and universities to present lectures, to meet with student and faculty and to acquaint them with new developments in psychology and with opportunities for advanced study and careers.

Specific objectives of the program are to stimulate interest in the scientific aspects of psychology at the collegiate level and to present some of the frontiers of psychological research and application.

Other objectives are to provide an opportunity to administrative officers, college staff members and students to consult with leaders in psychological science and to stimulate students to consider scientific and professional careers in psychology, including the teaching of psychology.

Professor of Psychology

Dr. Barker has been Professor of Psychology at the University of Kansas since 1947. For three years he was chairman of the department, and since then he has been Director of the Midwest Psychological Field Station.

This station, which was primarily established for the purpose of studying child behavior under natural conditions as it occurs outside the laboratories and clinics, has been devoted largely to small town life in the United States and England.

Work of the Midwest Field Station has been reported in two books and in numerous articles.

Before coming to Kansas, Dr. Barker had taught at Stanford University, Harvard University, University of Illinois, and Clark University. He was educated at Stanford University where he received the Ph. D. degree in 1934.

Two years ago he spent the year as a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford, Calif.

Dr. Barker has served as president of the Child Psychology Division of the American Psychological Association and as president for the Society for Research in Child Development.

Mrs. Louise Barker, who had her graduate training in biology at Stanford, has taught extensively at all levels from pre-school to university. She has been a field worker in research in psychological ecology in Kansas since 1947 and is the co-author of a number of publications in this field.
