## Summer School To Begin Monday, May 29

McPherson College's 1961 summer school sessions will start Monday, May 29, and will end Friday, August 18.

Classes will be held in Beeghly Library, Harnly Hall, Brown Auditorium basement, Frantz Industrial Arts Building, and Mohler Hall. Students will be allowed to carry a load of one credit hour of study per week.

Summer school tuition is \$20 per semester hour. Enrollment for classes will commence at the first hour of each course sequence. Arrangement for credits earned during summer school may be made with the Registrar at time of enrollment.

Classes will start at 8 a.m., five days a week. Organ and piano lessons will be available by consulting the instructors for an appointed time.

Enrollment for the fall semester will begin Monday, Sept. 11 and last until Wednesday, May 13. Classes will convene on Sept. 14 at 7:45 a.m.

## Mac Student Discusses Science-Religion Conflict

Dear Editor,

If this were a theme to which I had to assign a title, it would be "Where Science and Religion Meet." Some would call it "The Decline of Faith." Whether it is either or neither, each will decide for himself.

The basis for the idea which I now wish to uncover is that science and religion are two products of divergent evolution. Science, on one hand, has not changed very much in its basic structure, characterized by uninhibited investigation of evidence, the measuring of evidence with hypotheses, and readjusting hypotheses in light of new evidence.

Neither has religion, on the other hand, changed much from its fundamental character, chiefly the adherence to belief in a supernatural power residing in an anthropomorphic entity. How does divergent evolution enter the picture?

Science and religion both began at the same level, the level of seeking answers to questions about life and the universe, their origin, their significance, and their end. The divergent trends began when religion attributed "unexplainable" phenomena to the supernatural interventions and

science contended that what is, is to be understood.

Since the crude beginnings of trying to find answers to "What?" "Why?" "How?" and "When?" both science and religion have been expressed in ways hardly short of queer at times but the search continues and changes.

The search changes as a more comprehensive understanding of evidence is achieved. That helps to explain why both science and religion have participated in absurdities. Both lacked understanding of the relationships among their questions and evidence which could be used toward deriving explanations.

Now, at this end of the long evolutionary trends (which actually may still be in their infancy) where religion looks for its answers in an "after life" and science is no longer confined to seeking answers but in some cases exists for the mere pleasure of discovery, we find ourselves participating for some one or combination of purposes.

Without exception, we all want one or more of the following: comfort, pleasure, a sense of belonging, and a sense of value. The field of science and religion have

greatly overlapped in contributing to those human needs but both have not necessarily had identical effects in the same individuals.

Where science fails, it says, "I don't know enough yet." Religion does not fail. It says, "In the sweet by and by..." Nevertheless, hunger, hatred, and suicide continue in spite of all that religion and science in their individual ways try to accomplish.

It seems that a few thousand years should have been sufficient time during which the merits of science and of religion could be

tested. While being tested, they have progressed a long way but until there is greater understanding between the two fields of thought and each is examined in the light of the other, neither can serve its purpose in the fullest sense.

It seems reasonable to me that the giant brothers, science and religion, should be able to walk on common ground. Otherwise one may be tragically swallowed by the other. Revelation was not given once and for all-time during which the merits of prophets still live.
