## Cossack Choir To Initiate Brown Auditorium Today

Singers and dancers of the Don Cossack Chorus will be making two appearances today in the first program to be held in the new Jessie Brown Auditorium.

Nicholar Kostrukoff, director of approximately thirty singers and dancers, who are pioneers in anti-communism, will be performing this afternoon for around a thousand high school students from McPherson County who will be guests of the college.

A second performance will follow at 8:15 this evening. This is the program planned for holders of season tickets and the general public.

Formed in Prague by the late Thomas Masaryk with the assistance of Edouard Benes, and given Kostrukoff as conductor, at that time, they have remained the only entertainment group alive in the world today who represent Russian rebellion against Marxian materialism.

Because of this they were driven from the land of their birth and became citizens of the United States.

Along with the singing, there is dancing. The Cossacks do the low kicks of the Tartars, the Caucasian knife dance the "Lezgenka," and the Don Cossacks' own dance, "Kozatchok."

One of the most amazing qualities of the choral work of the Cossacks is the skill in providing appropriate backgrounds for songs in a variety of moods. They can suggest the sound of church bells, passing soldiers or strumming guitars, as the theme of the song suggests.

## Schwalm Speaks Sunday In Dedication Services

Dr. Vernon F. Schwalm, who was the president of McPherson College from 1927-1941, will give the dedication address for Brown Auditorium and Mohler Hall Sunday, Oct. 23 at 7:15 p.m.

Dr. Schwalm, born at Mishawaka, Ind., attended Manchester Academy and College, receiving his A.B. degree in 1913; an M.A. degree from the University of Chicago in 1916, and a Ph.D. degree in history from the same institution in 1926.

The former president also had additional training at Bethany Biblical Seminary and Columbia University. Florence Studebaker became his wife in 1914. To them a daughter, Edith, was born.

After teaching in public schools and Manchester Academy and College, becoming a professor of history in 1913 and dean of the college in 1917, Dr. Schwalm came to McPherson.

## President Of Macollege

Dr. Schwalm was president of McPherson from 1927-1941, and president of Manchester College from 1941-1956. The Schwalm's visited in Nigeria, Africa, and Europe in 1957.

## Sharp Hall Soon To Leave; Reveals 72-Year History

A little over seventy years ago Sharp Hall was taking shape on the MacCollege campus, just as today the New Mohler Hall and Brown Auditorium are being finished.

Construction on Sharp Hall began in the spring of 1888 when the foundation was laid. Students at the college made bricks for Sharp at a nearby brickworks.

Until then the only building on campus had been the old Fahnestock Hall, which housed administrative offices, classrooms, kitchen, dining hall and served as both a boys' and a girls' dormitory.

**Construction Impaired**  
Original plans called for a four-story structure, but the Panic of 1893 somewhat impaired the work. Since funds could not be obtained for completion, construction was halted until plans could materialize.

Dr. S. B. Fahnestock, who did much to push the erection of the new building, wrote to many individuals asking for "a penny for a brick." Enough money was finally received in this way to

finish two floors and to prepare a tar roof.

### Gym In Basement

Classes were first held in the basement of Sharp Hall, which also served as a science hall and a gymnasium. The north side of the floor, now used as offices, was the site of many basketball games. Science classes met where the present Dog House is located.

The campaign was renewed a few years later for the completion of the building. The tar roof had proved to be inadequate; students at the college during those years will remember carrying buckets and tubs to class to catch rain

## Bulldogs Tangle Wildcats In Homecoming Contest

Aiming for their second win of the 1960 gridiron season will be the McPherson College Bulldogs as they tangle with Baker tomorrow night in Mac's annual homecoming contest at 7:30.

The Baker Wildcats of Baldwin City will bring an undefeated team to meet the Bulldogs whose season record stands 1 win, 3 losses and 1 tie.

**Lead KCAC**  
Baker's highly regarded team is tied with Ottawa University for the KCAC lead, both possessing 5-0 records.

In games so far Baker downed Bethel 20-6, Kansas Wesleyan 27-14, and defeated last year's conference champs, College of Emporia, 18-7.

In its other two games Baker romped 46-6 over Sterling and just last week crushed Southwestern 32-0.

Mac's only win of the season was over Friends 19-6 while they tied Kansas Wesleyan 13-13 and were downed by College of Emporia 13-0, Southwestern 27-0 and last week met defeat at Bethel 22-13.

Providing headaches for the Bulldogs tomorrow night will be Baker's potent passer Norman Cobb and their speedy half back Jim Knight who is leading his team in scoring.

## Administration Building Is Namesake Of R. E. Mohler

Mohler Hall, McPherson's new administrative building, is named after Dr. R. E. Mohler, former science teacher at Macollege.

Dr. R. E. Mohler came to McPherson in 1913 to teach agriculture and later switched to biology. He continued to teach at the college for 39 years before retiring in 1952.

Since his retirement Dr. Mohler has served as curator of the McPherson College Museum making a total of 47 years of service to the college.

### Born In Nebraska

He was born at Red Cloud, Neb., went to college at Mt. Morris, Ill., and took graduate work at Michigan State, Kansas State, Kansas University, Wisconsin University, and the National University of Mexico City.

Before coming here he taught in rural schools of Jewel County, Kans., and Mason County, Mich., and at Mt. Morris, Ill. He has done some summer teaching at Emporia State Teachers College.

Over the years Dr. Mohler's community work has been wide and varied. He served as local school board president and of the Kansas Association of School Boards. He also served as past governor of the Kansas Association of Schools Boards, along with

Because of the 37 years of dedicated service and generous financial gifts Miss Jessie Brown has given to McPherson College, the trustees voted to call the new auditorium, "The Jessie Brown Memorial Auditorium."

Professor Brown came to McPherson College in 1915 and retired in 1952. "I suppose I averaged fifty students a year during my teaching at the college," she reports.

Miss Brown received her diploma from the Bethany Conservatory and her Bachelor of Music degree from Bethany College in 1910.

### Traveled In Germany

After traveling in Germany for two years and studying at the Royal Conservatory in Leipsig, she taught at Bethany College before coming to McPherson.

Since her retirement Miss Brown has traveled widely in almost every state in the union. She has also traveled in Canada and Mexico. Her most recent hobby is her farm in Texas.

Miss Brown has been a member of the National Piano Teacher's Association. She was awarded an honorary Doctor of Music Degree by McPherson College in 1952.

### Resides In McPherson

Professor Brown now resides in McPherson at 123 Charles Street. She has upstairs and basement apartments which are rented usually to college students and faculty members.

When asked if she visits the campus she said, "I haven't in the past years because I don't know many of the students, and they are all so busy that it is hard to come in contact with very many of them."

## Buildings Near Completion After Twenty Months

After twenty months of planning and construction the new \$900,000 Mohler Hall and Jessie Brown Auditorium are nearing completion. Sunday night, Oct. 23, the two buildings will be dedicated even though there are many finishing touches yet to be completed.

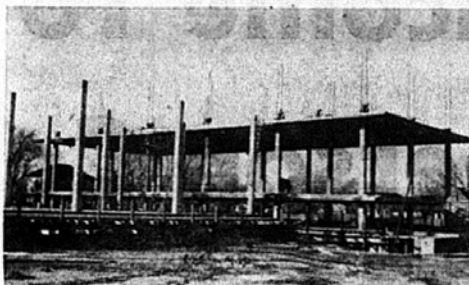
Plans for the new buildings were begun over five years ago as the trustees decided that Sharp Hall was no longer adequate for the college's needs.

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the two buildings were held on March 6, 1959, as 400 people gathered during Regional Youth

Conference.

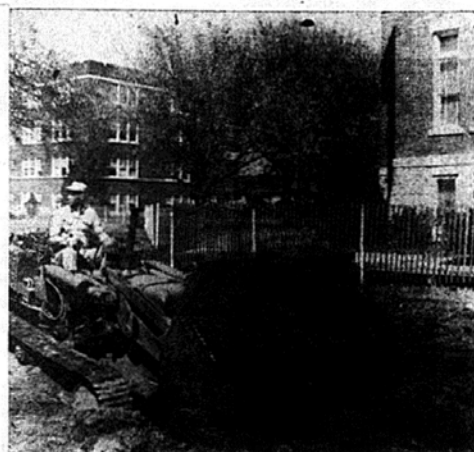
The two buildings now stand where the once historic old circle drive filled with trees once stood.

Many areas throughout the buildings are gifts of certain families that donated money for a specific purpose in furnishing offices and classrooms.



Two of the large concrete slabs, forming the roof and the second floor of the new Mohler Administration building are shown as they were in the process of being raised in January of this year. Hoists, located at the top of each pillar, pulled up the slabs.

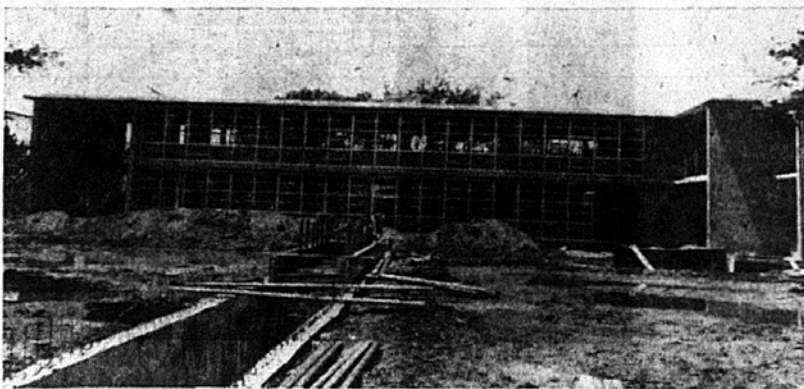
Work on the two buildings was just starting in April, 1959, as the bulldozer started excavating the basement of Brown Auditorium that houses the college music department.



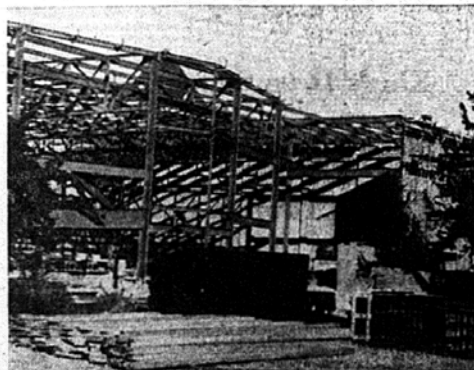
This aerial view of Brown Auditorium and Mohler Hall was taken in January just as masons had completed the brick laying of Brown Auditorium and were starting on Mohler.

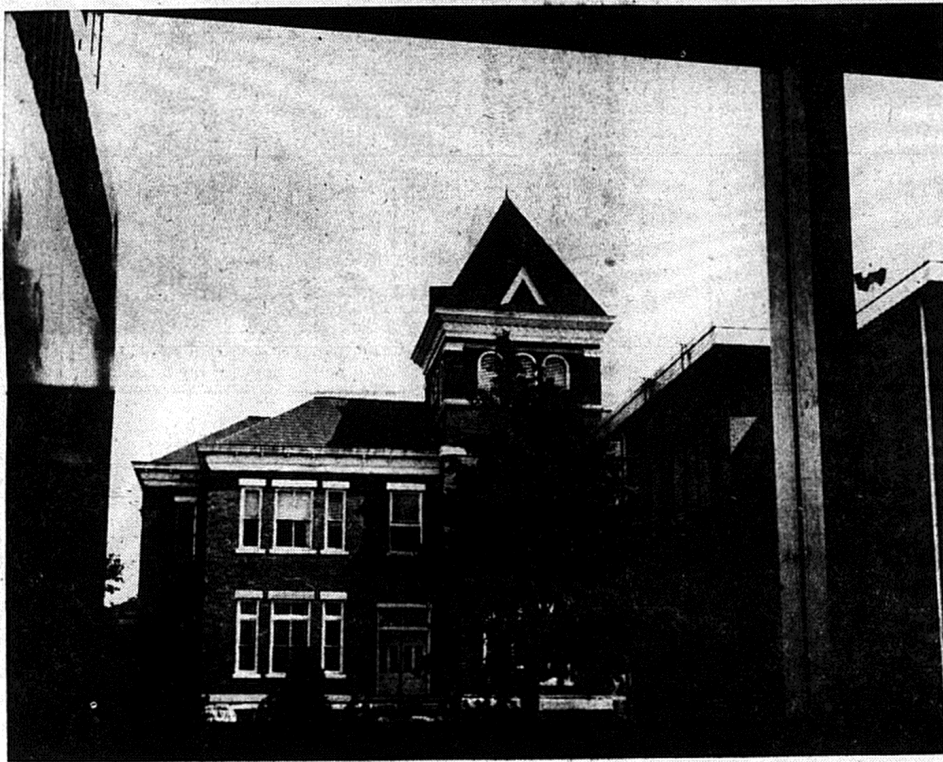


The wall around the stage end of the auditorium had been laid and the walls around the seating area were just going up as the picture was taken in early December.
