Library Adds New Dictionary

A major addition to the Macol lege library is the third edition of "Webster's New International Dictionary," the first new una-bridged edition in 27 years. "The Third New International

Dictionary" introduces a new concept in dictionaries. Instead o prescribing the correct usage of words, it records the language as it is being used today.

The new dictionary is based on the science of linguistics and describes a language in its pres ent state without making any judgments of what is correct.

To accomplish this the writer have illustrated many of the words with quotations of current notables including D. D. Eisenhower's "made a goof" and "Somebody had goofed," a quotation from Ethel Merman,

In addition, what has always in addition, what has always been considered as an error in grammar is accepted. For ex-ample, the word "aint" is ack-nowledged to be "used orally in most parts of the U.S. by cultivated speakers."
