Two Freshmen Spend Year As Students In Germany

Two Macollege freshmen, Ken Ullom and Gayle Wood, were exchange students to Germany as representatives of their high school.

Ken, a freshman from Wiley, Colo., lived in West Berlin last year with the Werner Bellardi family and attended the Droste Hülshoff school in Berlin. He left the United States on Sept. 19, 1960 and returned Sept. 6, 1961.

Ken's older brother, Don, was working in the Brethren Volunteer Service program in Germany and found the family with whom Ken lived.

Workcamp In Agadir
He attended a workcamp in Agadir, Morocco, from Aug. 1, 1961 to Sept. 5, 1961. He also traveled in nine countries while in Europe.

Ken stated that "every student qualified to go to college should spend a year abroad for the experience."

He is majoring in business at McPherson. His future plans are not definite.

Junior In High School
Gayle Wood, a freshman from Panora, Iowa, was an exchange student in her junior year of high school. She left July 29, 1959 and returned Aug. 6, 1960.

She lived with the Georg-Wil-

Hanel family in Lüneburg, Germany and attended the Elbs Marsch Ludersburg Mittelschule school.

While she was in Germany, Rainer Wolf from Kirchheim, Germany, stayed with her family as a German exchange student.

Chosen By ICYE
Gayle was chosen through the International Christian Youth Exchange program. This program was started eleven years ago by the Church of the Brethren but now includes eight different denominations.

To be able to join the ICYE the denomination to which one belongs must be a member of the National Council of Churches. Gayle's German father was in this program and was an exchange student to the United States.

Gayle toured in four countries and lived only five miles from the Iron Curtain. "I used to ride my bicycle to the Iron Curtain and watch the East German soldiers march," stated Gayle.

Gayle hopes to go into missionary or BVS work somewhere in Europe when she graduates.

DeCoursey Represents Mac At Topeka Meet

Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, professor of chemistry, attended a conference at Topeka Nov. 20, as the McPherson College representative for the Kansas Academy of Science.

The conference was a joint conference with the Kansas Academy of Science and several industries. A cooperative effort is being made by science and industry in Kansas to speed scientific research.

A ladies reading circle of 50 members met at the cafeteria Nov. 14. Dr. DeCoursey gave a talk on "Our Treasures," emphasizing the importance of the museum and articles of great value to natural scientists.

The McPherson College Bassoon Trio played two special numbers.

Dr. DeCoursey attended a conference for midwest liberal arts college chemistry teachers at Cornell College near Cedar Rapids, Iowa, last month.

Over 200 chemistry teachers attended the conference which consisted of meetings and discussion groups dealing with teaching methods. Dr. DeCoursey attended meetings concerning new approaches for teaching in laboratories.

The conference included teachers from as far east as Ohio and as far west as Kansas.

Library Adds New Dictionary

A major addition to the Macollege library is the third edition of "Webster's New International Dictionary," the first new unabridged edition in 27 years.

"The Third New International Dictionary" introduces a new concept in dictionaries. Instead of prescribing the correct usage of words, it records the language as it is being used today.

The new dictionary is based on the science of linguistics and describes a language in its present state without making any judgments of what is correct.

To accomplish this the writers have illustrated many of the words with quotations of current notables including D. D. Eisenhower's "made a goof" and "Somebody had goofed," a quotation from Ethel Merman.

In addition, what has always been considered as an error in grammar is accepted. For example, the word "ain't" is acknowledged to be "used orally in most parts of the U.S. by cultivated speakers."

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Balanced Teams Promise Close KCAC Competition

One of the best-balanced races in the history of the Kansas Conference is expected to begin early in December when all ten members of the conference swing into league competition.

Last year's co-champions, C. of E. and Southwestern, were hurt the most by personnel losses, while other members of the loop will return most of their starting lineups intact.

C. of E. lost two starters from its club, but Southwestern will be minus four from its starting five as both clubs finished 16-2 in conference play.

The only returning starter for the Bulldogs is guard Armand Hillier, who averaged 10.1 points per game last season.

Southwestern's Hopes
Southwestern will pin its hopes for another strong season on a number of junior college transfers: upon the return to school of Don Turner, 6-5 center, after a year's absence; and upon its five returning lettermen.

Some of the top juco transfers include Bob Rumlford, 6-4, and Joe Beverly, 6-2, from Independence; Gary West from El Dorado and Don Merz from Garden City.

C. of E. will return Pete Weng, who averaged 16.5 points a game last year, along with forward Ilerman Rathman, and a starting guard Neil Crane. Harold Smallwood, a 6-4 transfer from Kansas City Junior College, may replace Art Nichols, the leading rebounder in the conference last year.

Bethany, Bethel, and Baker each lost a high scorer by graduation, but have enough returning lettermen to fill the gaps.

Two Losses
Bethany's third-place Swedes only losses were Merlin Larson, their 6-5 center who averaged 17.7 points per game, and 6-5 Doug Aderman. The Swedes will be strengthened at the semester break by Tom Train, a transfer from Kansas State.

Ottawa, fourth in 1960-61 with a 9-9 mark, has seven returning lettermen, including all of last

Four McPherson College football players ranked in the final Kansas Conference statistical report of the season. First Place Ottawa Braves dominated the defensive department and College of Emporia monopolized a major share of the offensive departments.

David Priddy followed Jerry Smith of Kansas Wesleyan, for a second place in individual punting with 42 punts for 1587 yards and an average of 37.5 yards, and Smith had an average of 39.1 yards.

Don Kuhlman ranked seventh in individual passing with 65 attempts and 28 completed for 387 yards and an average of 43 yards.

Larry Crumrine filled tenth place with 72 attempts and 20 completed for 217 yards and an average of 24.1.

Tim Wesselowski held eighth place in individual rushing with 592 total yards and an average of 65.8.

The Bulldogs followed Ottawa University and C. of E. for third place in team passing defense by allowing an average of only 58.7 yards passing per game.

Mac was listed seventh in total team offense, team total defense, and total team passing.

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Testing Service Will Give Teacher Examinations

The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given at more than 200 testing centers throughout the United States on Saturday, Feb. 10, 1962.

At the one-day testing session a candidate may take the common examinations, which include tests in professional information, general culture, English expression, and non-verbal reasoning; and one or two of thirteen optional examinations designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught.

The college which a candidate is attending, or the school system in which he is seeking employ-

ment, will advise him whether he should take the National Teacher Examinations and which of the optional examinations to select.

A bulletin of information in which an application is inserted describing registration procedures may be obtained from college officials, school superintendents, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey.

Completed applications, accompanied by proper examination fees, will be accepted by the ETS office during November and December, and early in January so that they are received before January 12, 1962.
