Musical Groups To Give Annual Christmas Concert

McPherson College Music Department will present its annual Christmas Choral Concert in Brown Auditorium Saturday, Dec. 9, at 8 p.m.

Marvin Blickenstaff, assistant professor of piano, will provide prelude music. Five different groups will be performing: the Choral Club, Men's Glee Club, Women's Glee Club, The Select Vocal Ensemble, and the A Cappella Choir.

Choral Club Opens
To open the program, the Choral Club, composed of all the men and women interested in the choral program of the college, will sing five compositions under the direction of Donald R. Frederick, professor of voice and director of choral organizations. "Let All the Nations Praise the Lord," "Morning Hymn," "Praise the Lord Eternal," "Thanks Be To God" (from "Elijah"), with

Jolene Johnston at the piano and Marvin Blickenstaff at the organ, and "All Night, All Day," will be the compositions for the first group. "Psalms One Hundred" and "Behold That Star" will be sung by the Men's Glee Club.

Women's Glee Club will sing, under the direction of Miss Doris Coppock, instructor in music, "Jehovah, I Would Sing Thy Praise," and two numbers from the Alfred Burt Carols—"Some Children See Him," and "Bright, Bright the Holly Berries."

Professor Frederick will then direct "The Twelve Days of Christmas" which will be sung by 28 students who were chosen from the A Cappella Choir. Thelma Stump and Jolene Johnston will accompany at the organ and piano respectively.

A Cappella Choir will sing two movements from Schreck's "Advent Motet". These will be "Entrance Scene" and "Consolation." They will also sing "The Three Kings" by William, and "Benedictus and Hosanna" by Bright.

Brass Ensemble Accompanies
To close the concert, the Choral Club will return to sing "The Legend of Befana," "A Child is Born," which will be accompanied by the Brass Ensemble - and "Gloria in Excelsis," accompanied by Professor Blickenstaff at the organ and the Brass Ensemble.

Students and professors participating in this performance have spent approximately thirty hours rehearsing. Nearly all of the numbers will be performed from memory and only five of the eighteen compositions will be accompanied.

The team of Kenneth Ullom and Weyland Beeghly won four of their five debates to place fourth place in a field of 34 teams competing in the B Division. Their only loss was to South Dakota School of Mines which won first place in the division.

Bosserman, Snyder Win Two
Jim Bosserman and Lowell Snyder won two of their five debates. They defeated Omaha University and N. W. Missouri State, while dropping decisions to Chadron, Buena Vista, and the School of Mines.

Both McPherson teams competed in the B division which is comprised of college freshmen and sophomores.

Emotional Disturbances

Face Each Morning's Alarm Instead Of Turning It Off

After an alarm clock's insistent jangle, a hand creeps out from under the blanket and flicks off the bell. This is easy.

It is also easy to drift back into forgetfulness; to allow class assignments, tests, unwritten letters, committee meetings, and dirty laundry to be forgotten for a while longer.

For a small percentage of us, this may be a common occurrence. According to psychologists these students are emotionally disturbed.

What are common symptoms of emotional disturbances in college students? Some say that frequent class cuts are a sign. Students with emotional disturbances may have difficulty meeting deadlines of any kind and may waste countless hours doing nothing.

Authorities say that the two major causes of emotional disturbances are excessive parental concern and involvement in too many activities.

The turmoil within a student's mind is far from easy to understand, but the main responsibility for correcting these emotional disturbances lies with the student himself. Half of the battle is won if he realizes his difficulties.

How long the rest of the battle toward better emotional health will depend on the student's own qualities and on his determination to face the alarm in the morning instead of turning it off.

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Brethren Colleges Propose Program Of Study Abroad

The six Churches of the Brethren colleges have made a proposal for undergraduate study abroad. This program has not yet been voted on but information is available for students interested.

The program of study will include the opportunity for course work at Phillips Universität, Marburg Lahn—the institution which is known to most Americans as Marburg University—and for enrollment in special classes offered in Marburg under the direction and control of the six co-operating colleges.

Program Courses

Courses in this latter phase of the program will be selected from such subject areas as German literature, history, religion, philosophy, international relations, political science, economics, cultural anthropology, and art history.

Each year a professor from one of the six co-operating colleges will be selected to serve as the director of the program in Europe. The director will also serve as one of the teachers in the program, along with several German professors.

Study In German Language

Students interested in this program should have had at least two years of college level study in the German language.

In addition to an adequate knowledge of the language, the qualifications include high intellectual capacity, seriousness of purpose, good character, demonstrated potential for social adjustment, a basic understanding of the United States and the host country, good health, and initiative.

The program will accommodate approximately 25 students each year.

Student quotas for each of the co-operating colleges will be derived by assigning to each college the same proportion of the 25 openings as the total full-time student enrollment in the college bears to the combined enrollments of the six colleges.

Ottawa Rejects Offer To Play Game At Tampa

Ottawa University rejected an invitation for a post season football game with the University of Tampa, Jan. 6, 1962, in Tampa, Fla.

This decision was announced because seven gridmen basketball players failed to agree because of the pressure imposed on the team and athletic program.

A guaranteed \$6,000 was promised for the appearance, but transportation and lodging costs would be estimated at \$9,000.

In The Philippines

Peace Corps volunteers in the Philippines will assist in improving the quality of English spoken and in raising the teaching standards in English and general science.

In the Philippines, English is the language of technology, trade, commerce and culture, but it has become so altered and distorted that it is rapidly becoming incomprehensible to outsiders.

Volunteers for work in the Philippines will need to be college graduates with either a B.S. or A.B. degree

Training

Training will consist of the study of Filipino culture, history, economics, education and government; teaching methods; American civilization and international affairs; physical conditioning and health education at Pennsylvania State University and University of the Philippines.

Volunteers will be assigned to one of three projects: teaching English, teaching general science, or helping with extra-curricular activities.
