Youth To Meet Here March 8-11

"Use Me Lord, But How?" is the theme of this year's annual Regional Youth Conference, to be held on Macampus, March 8-11.

Rev. Paul Hoffman, pastor of Trinity Church of the Brethren in Detroit, Mich., is the speaker for the conference. Rev. Hoffman graduated from Manchester College, North Manchester, Ind., in 1951 and from Bethany Biblical Seminary, Chicago, Ill., in 1957.

He participated in Indiana all-state college basketball and visited the Orient in 1953. Last year, he was moderator of the Michigan District Conference.

Youth From Western Region
The conference will draw youth from all over the western region, from the Mississippi River to the Rocky Mountains.

Major events of the conference are "Brigadoon," on Friday night in Brown Auditorium, and the Youth Banquet on Saturday night at the Student Union. The regional elimination for the annual speech contest will also be held.

Speech Contest

The theme of this year's speech contest is "Today's triangle: Youth, Parents, Culture." The winner of the regional elimination will go to the annual conference in Ocean Grove, N. J., for the National contest.

Registration is \$3.50, which includes the banquet, "Brigadoon," and lodging. Meals are extra. High school sophomores, juniors and seniors, college students and adults will attend.

Mac Shows Increase Of Interest In Paperbacks

Interest in paperback books and in the variety of selections available in them has increased among Maccollege students and faculty. Throughout the nation, people, especially students, are buying more and more paperback books.

The New York Herald Tribune recently had a special section on paperback books. It stated that a 200 million increase in annual paperback sales is expected in the next five years.

Some communities have set up their own paperback bookstores in schools. In college towns paperback bookstores are common and numerous.

Great Novels

These books that students are buying are great novels, collected works of poets, scientific writings, and original writing of history.

Since the works of great writers are now available in paperback form, students can inexpensively

increase their personal library and enrich their reading experiences.

The special section in the Herald Tribune listed a home library of 35 paperback books which could be purchased for \$35.

Reference Books

Some of the books listed in the area of reference were "Webster's New World Dictionary," "Rogel's New Pocket Thesaurus in Dictionary Form," and "Familiar Quotations" by John Bartlett.

In the area of literature "Good Reading," "The Reader's Companion to World Literature," and "Eight Great Tragedies" were among those listed.

Germans Are Militarists Because Of Experiences

Pacifism is one of the basic beliefs of the Church of the Brethren and consequently of this campus. Few Germans believe in pacifism because of their past experiences.

Since the end of World War II, Communism has been immensely successful in gaining prestige, land, and people. This happened mostly on account of its military strength. (Putting up the wall in Berlin is the last example. When tumults on both sides of the wall started, tanks drove up and everybody was too scared to do anything.)

East Germany is a highly militarized country; 15 year-old boys and girls learn how to use guns; and laborers have weekly military maneuvers.

People from West Germany and West Berlin who read about it in the newspaper or hear about it from their friends and relatives in East Germany, are frightened. We, the German people, believe that Communism in its quest to win the world, can be deterred only by strong military power.

We have faith in America that it will support us in the struggle against Communism, and when

we think of America, we think of it in terms of a military power.

We Germans are militaristic in some ways — at least we are not pacifistic. Perhaps we are prejudiced against pacifism and narrow minded in our opinion because we are too emotionally involved.

Is it possible that pacifism is applicable only in certain times in particular circumstances?

Fundamental Differences?

The author further states that the church college must justify itself by making clear the relationship between the Christian faith and all emphases of life.

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Bulldogs To Face Tabor In Final Game Of Season

Final week of the basketball campaign finds the McPherson College Bulldogs meeting the Tabor Bluejays Tuesday, Feb. 27, on the Tabor court. The Bulldogs will face LeRoy Dick who is currently leading District 10 in individual scoring.

In their previous encounter the Bulldogs led most of the way but faltered in the last three minutes of play as Tabor College pulled ahead to hand the Bulldogs a 68-63 defeat.

The Bulldogs hit 45 per cent of their shots during the first half, but only 31 per cent the last half for a game average of 37 per cent.

Tabor Averaged 38 Per Cent
Tabor hit only 26 per cent during the first half but dropped in 61 per cent during the last half for a game average of 38 per cent.

McPherson maintained a lead throughout the first half and led at half time 38-33. The lead changed several times in the last half until Flemings dropped a field goal to put Tabor ahead 58-57 with three minutes remaining.

The score was tied five times during the game and the lead changed nine times.

Intensity of beauty is the result, and Hudson combined his thorough understanding of the music, tonal control, and a sensitivity of feeling into an uplifting musical experience.

Bach's D Major Partita opened the program. The listener assured that Hudson possesses a fine technique, clear and precise in every way, but which is subservient to the greater task of musical expression.

In the closing Three Rondos by Bartok, Hudson effectively revealed the wit of the Hungarian composer.
