## Juniors Take Proficiency Test

An English Proficiency Test for juniors will be given tomorrow morning, Saturday, Sept. 16, beginning at 8 a.m. in the chemistry lecture room in Harnly Hall. Seniors who have not satisfied this graduation requirement must also take this test.

Tests will be given in two parts. The first 100 minutes consist of a standardized test of English usage. During the second allotted 100 minutes each student will compose a short essay on one of the suggested topics.

Only pen and ink are to be provided by the students. Use of a dictionary will be permissible in the second portion of the test.

Students who do not complete the requirements must enroll in an English review class which will be taught on Wednesday and Friday at 12:20 by Mrs. Homer Brunk, associate professor of English and journalism. This non-credit course is open to any other

### Student Union Hours

Hours for the building are coordinated with the hours of women's dormitory. The Student Union is opened 15 minutes before breakfast serving time.

Breakfast is served from 6:45 to 8 a.m. Monday through Friday and from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Hours for the noon meal are from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 12 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Evening meals are served from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

### Special Menus

Occasionally the cafeteria staff will present special menus such as charcoal broiled steaks, deer, and other game meat on Saturday evening. The Saturday evening meals will be more formal than others during the week. The Sunday noon meal will be a dress-up event.

Vending machines will be available later at the first floor and basement levels. Food from vending machines must be carried into the eating area on the first floor or to the basement.

A snack bar will be opened within a few weeks. Until then, cokes and coffee are being served in the mornings, afternoons, and evening to replace the former service provided by the Dog House.

**College Credit To Be Given For Fall Night, TV Courses**

Several night classes and television courses will be offered for credit this fall by McPherson College. Some classes will meet on Monday and Wednesday evenings, and another group of classes will meet on Wednesday evenings.

Monday and Wednesday classes begin Monday, Sept. 18; and Wednesday classes begin Wednesday, Sept. 20.

Lower level courses offered every Monday and Wednesday evening from 4:50 to 6:30 will be first year Russian, and second year Russian will be presented from 7:25 to 9:05. Both courses will be taught by Vladimir Czaplinski, instructor of foreign languages.

Upper Level Courses Offered every Wednesday evening from 4:50 to 7:15 will be contemporary literature, taught by Harley Stump, assistant professor of English. This is an upper level course.

Other upper level courses offered from 7:25 to 9:50 on Wednesday evenings will be astronomy, taught by Dr. Wesley DeCoursey, professor of chemistry; and historiography, taught by Dr. Raymond Flory, professor of history and political science. Consent of the instructor is required for historiography.

Tuition fees (inclusive of the general fee) are \$21 per semester hour. Each of these courses are three-hour courses.

Other classes may be offered if six or more persons petition for the course, and if a teacher can be obtained to teach. Inquiries should be directed to Dean Wayne F. Geisert.

Enrollment will be made in the registrar's office during the first 30 minutes of the first session of the class or during the regular office hours of the college on September 18 and 20. No enrollment will be approved after the second session of each of the classes.

Television Courses Two upper level television courses will be offered beginning September 25. A Continental Classroom Course, structure and function of American government, will be offered Monday through Friday from 6:30 to 6:55 a.m. on KARD. Dr. Flory is the local

A Learning Resources Institute Course, introduction to modern biology, will be offered Monday through Friday from 7:00 to 7:25 a.m. on KTVH. Dr. John Burkholder, professor of biology, is the local coordinator of this three credit hour program.

This course is planned to include the revolutionary research findings of the post-war years, which have contributed to a dramatic change in the conceptual framework of contemporary biological thought.

**Responsibilities of Students**

Students enrolling in the television courses have the responsibility of watching the telecast each morning during the semester. They must also attend three or four Saturday workshop sessions on campus for the purpose of testing and discussing some of the materials presented in the telecasts.

Enrollment in the television courses can take place either at the registrar's office or by mail. Forms for mail enrollment will be provided upon request.

Tuition fees for the television course are \$15 per semester hour.

**African Rings Presented To College Museum**

Four small iron rings called manilas from Nigeria West Africa have been presented to the McPherson College Museum by Elijah Odokara, a former student at McPherson College.

The rings were originally used in slave trade, and they were worn by the slaves around their ankles or wrists. After the abolition of slavery the rings were used in marriages.

Later the manila became a medium of exchange by the African people. From 1802 to 1851 the rings were manufactured in Birmingham, England which issued the rings to Africa.

To stay sitting is usually easiest, to move or change requires effort. Sometimes this effort is greater psychologically than it is physically.

A good many changes have occurred recently on our campus. Walks are not where they used to be; classes do not meet in their "proper" classrooms; new professors are busy at new tasks; some older buildings are gone or are serving new functions.

This is what we call progress. To achieve it there is always some pain. It is easier to stay as we were; to follow old walks; to fellowship only with old friends; to think only in traditional or prescribed ways.

Fall football practice began for 45 McPherson College Bulldogs Sept. 1 under the direction of head coach Sid Smith and assistant coach Don Widrig. However, five candidates have dropped out and two transfer students are not eligible for this season.

Sixteen lettermen are returning from last year's eighth place conference team which had a 1-7-1 overall record.

### Quarterbacks

Returning lettermen Larry Crumrine, junior, Hazelton; and Don Kuhlman, sophomore, Albiol, quarterbacks, will carry the bulk load at signal calling. Art Hoch, junior letterman from Dwight; and Nick Petricci, freshman from Trafford, Pa.; will also play the quarterback position.

Guard lettermen, John Fillmore, sophomore from Nampa, Ida.; Joe Looker, senior from Bradford, Ohio; LeRoy Weddle, junior from Bloom; and Larry McPherson, senior from McLeouth; will be assisted by freshmen Edwin Johnson, South English, Iowa; and Keith Miller, an extra point kicker from Elkhart, Iowa.

A plan for sending 150 young Americans to teach in the secondary schools of East Africa has been developed by the International Cooperation Administration.

Persons selected for the program will comprise three groups: 60 experienced secondary school teachers, 50 education graduates with no teaching experience, and 40 liberal arts graduates with no teaching experience.

Free medical services and transportation are provided plus a minimum income of \$4400 per year on a two-year contract basis.
