David L. Eiler was appointed assistant professor of philosophy and religion at Macollege by the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting last week.

Eiler will replace Dale Brown who has resigned to accept a pos-tion at Bethany Biblical Semi-nary in Chicago, III. Eiler is now working on his with the theological significance of Zion in the Old Testament

Originally from Nampa, Ida., Eiler attended McPherson College from 1944-45 and received his B. A. degree with distinction from Manchester College, North Manchester, Ind., in 1950.
