## Trustees Appoint Eiler To Mac Faculty Position

David L. Eiler was appointed assistant professor of philosophy and religion at Maccollege by the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting last week.

Eiler will replace Dale Brown who has resigned to accept a position at Bethany Biblical Seminary in Chicago, Ill.

Originally from Nampa, Ida., Eiler attended McPherson College from 1944-45 and received his B. A. degree with distinction from Manchester College, North Manchester, Ind., in 1950.

His major in college was chemistry with a minor in religion.

### BVS

During the year he spent in Brethren Volunteer Service, Eiler was a member of the first group of volunteers assigned to a project in Baltimore, Md., which worked with inner-city housing renewal and community rehabilitation.

He is a '55 graduate of Bethany Biblical Seminary where he received a B. D. degree magna cum laude. While at Bethany, Eiler was a part-time student assistant.

Eiler completed his residence requirements for a Th. M. degree in New Testament at Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, N. J., in 1957.

He passed the comprehensive examinations completing his residence requirements for Th. D. degree in Old Testament last year at Princeton.

Eiler is now working on his Th. D. dissertation which deals with the theological significance of Zion in the Old Testament.

Mrs. Eiler is the former Ruth Holsopple. A graduate of McPherson College, she has been secretary to the Director of Social Action of the Brethren Service Commission in Elgin, Ill., and secretary to the President Emeritus of Princeton University.

The Eilers have two children, Janis Elaine, six-years old, and Lois Elizabeth, three-years old.

## Training Project To Meet At Maccollege March 12-14

Associates from the North Central Leadership Training Project will meet on Macampus March 12-14 to discuss educational improvements of higher education.

The three associates to meet here are Charles R. Hicks, chairman of the team and Assistant Dean at the School of Science, Education; and Humanities, Purdue University; Harold S. Bailey, Jr., Dean of Academic Affairs at South Dakota State College, Brookings, S. D.; and Irwin J. Suloway, Assistant Dean in Charge of Publications, Chicago Teachers College, Chicago, Ill.

These men will be making a thorough study of Maccollege. They will interview faculty, tour and study the campus, and evaluate the educational procedures of McPherson College.

The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools was founded in 1865.

Membership, which is strictly voluntary, denotes recognition and improvement of a school's educational services. Colleges interested in membership may contact the Secretary of the Commission on Colleges and Universities.

### School Becomes Accredited

A school will be accredited when it meets the requirements defined by the Association. Membership may be continued as long as the requirements are met. However, a school may voluntarily drop at

any time. Administration of the NCA affairs is conducted through the Executive Committee, the three Commissions, and the General Association. Every officer of NCA must be officially connected with an NCA member institution or with a state department in the NCA territory.

### Commission

The Commission members are selected from the districts of NCA for a four-year term. The Commission's work is to establish criteria for NCA membership, assist interested institutions in attaining membership, and the overall task of talking with students, teachers, and the general public toward the improvement of higher education.

For the institution seeking membership, the entire facilities and activities are accredited. The Commission evaluates its purposes and encourages it to do the best possible work.

NCA has an annual meeting usually near the end of March or early in April. Each accredited institution may send one voting representative.

NCA emphasis has been on improved higher education in American institutions.

Kansas State University A Cappella Choir will appear at Maccollege during chapel Monday, March 12. Monday classes and Tuesday chapel will be exchanged that week because of the performance.

The 80-voice organization, directed by William R. Fischer, will make appearances before high schools and other groups during their four-day tour.

Accompanying the A Cappella Choir again this year will be the K-State Singers, a specialty group of 13 students who sing, play, and dance.

Several of the numbers included in this year's program will be original compositions by Fischer.

## Elections Will Be Held At Maccollege Next Friday

Student Body elections for 1962-63 school year will be held Friday, March 16. Booths will be set up in Friendship Hall for students to cast their ballots. Voting hours will be from 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Student Body president and treasurer, MCA cabinet, Student Court members, and cheerleaders will be elected.

Petitions were distributed to candidates Tuesday noon and must be returned before 5 p.m. today. Each candidate must secure 50 signatures to be eligible for election.

### Treasurer, President

Treasurer will be elected from next year's junior class, and president will be elected from next year's senior class. They must be full-time students.

In assembly next Friday, MCA cabinet candidates and Student Court candidates will be introduced. Cheerleaders will also try out.

### Campaign Speeches

Candidates for president will speak no longer than three minutes, and the representative's speeches will also be limited to three minutes.

Candidates or representatives for treasurer will be allowed to speak for three minutes for the campaign speeches.

Campaign posters will not be allowed in Friendship Hall or Brown Auditorium.

Students are asked to use discretion in placing campaign posters on campus property.

## CALEDONIA To Sing, Dance March 16

CALEDONIA!, the singers and dancers of Scotland, will appear Friday, March 16, at 8 p.m. in McPherson College's Brown Auditorium. This is one of the programs of the McPherson College-Community Cultural Series.

The production, CALEDONIA!, which made its American debut last season, presents a complete panorama of Scotland through the authentic music and dances of that country. All of the principal regions of the land are represented.

Andrew Macpherson, founder and director of CALEDONIA!, was born in Newmilns, Ayrshire, located in the heart of the Robert Burns country.

He received a scholarship to the Royal Scottish Academy of Music in Glasgow where he studied singing. After completing his studies, Macpherson went to London to sing operatic roles.

CALEDONIA! is now on its second American coast-to-coast tour.

## Value Of Education Centers On Three Basic Aspects

At this time of the year underclassmen often remark that college is different and easier than they had anticipated, or that they hope they will be well prepared for their profession. Upperclassmen find themselves wondering what they have accomplished.

Because we cannot avoid the reality of these feelings, we must meet them head-on.

Perhaps these sentiments are but manifestations of the basic question, "Why are we here, doing what we are doing?" To consider this basic unrestful feeling, it might be well to keep in mind at least three pertinent aspects.

### Effort Is Involved

As in anything else, effort is involved; to be engaged in education is to put forth an effort. This effort, in part gives education its value.

Given effort, learning becomes understanding and therefore, more complete and rewarding.

Another aspect involves our expectations; they must be realistic and at the logical culmination of our efforts. Some do not know what exactly they expect from college. Whining complaints of dissatisfaction might be forestalled by asking "What did you expect, anyway?" Goals should be clarified.

### Learning Values

Thirdly, learning values and how to place relative worth in proper degrees on new discoveries is of great importance.

The purpose of education is

not merely to accumulate knowledge of facts, for facts change. Anything that is alive changes, if only by the fact that it is alive.

Education tries to make various avenues of life come alive through understanding. (However, extra letters after a person's name do not necessarily change what the name stands for).

### Find Perspective

It remains with the student to find perspective and thereby assign importance to the component parts.

As the changes come in the subject field and as problems of decision arise or when the responsibility comes for making his own way in the world, the student can act on the basis of what might be the most important, significant, and beneficial in the long run.

Is not this a part of the inner growth we speak of when a student matures? As the student makes an effort based upon realistic expectations—or aspirations, then he, too, will come into his proper relationship to the world and be much more effective in his service to the world.

### Student Suggests Honor System For Macollege

Dear Editor,

Some students think they can make it through college on the back of some former student. They look for old lab papers, old tests, old term papers, and anything else they think might help them get through college without doing any, or very little, work.

Some students even go farther than this, and cheat on tests, either by copying from some other student's paper, or by using notes they have so carefully prepared.

### Personal Honor

These two examples show a breach of personal honor. Personal honor is important in our school life just as it is in our daily living.

McPherson College needs a system, which might be called the honor system, to bring out the best in the student.

The honor system is a code by which the students live. It is governed by the students, through the student government, for the good of the students.

### Council

The government may set up an Honor Council which may consist of a chairman, usually chosen by the president of the Student Body, and ten voting members.

These ten voting members are made up of the presidents and vice-presidents of the four college classes and the president of the Student Body.

This council would have the power to hold trials and act according to the information received in the hearing. The Honor Council works for the students and supports an honor code for the good of the students.

### Signs A Pledge

At the beginning of each school year each student signs a pledge saying that he is familiar with and will abide by the Honor Code. The Code of Honor applies to lying and cheating in academic work and to all cases of stealing of personal property.

All quizzes, written problems, written assignments and examinations are to be the individual's own work unless the professor prefers otherwise.

To assure this, the student is

asked to sign a pledge on such work saying: "Upon my honor,

I have neither given nor received help on this examination" (test paper, etc.). Failure or refusal to sign the Honor Pledge on such work is considered to be an admission of guilt.

The Honor System could be used at McPherson, for personal honor should be considered the keystone of successful work.

I have seen such a system in use and I can assure you that it works. I will be glad to answer questions or talk over any ideas this letter may bring to your mind.

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## Recap Of Season Shows Bulldogs With 6-12 Record

The McPherson College Bulldogs opened the 1961-62 season playing in the Moundridge tournament Nov. 30—Dec. 2, and ended the season with a 6-12 record.

The Bulldogs won their opening game against Bethel 63-58 on Dec. 5, on the home court.

The Bulldogs then lost seven games in succession. Southwestern beat the Bulldogs 64-50, Dec. 8 and Sterling slipped by 88-75, Dec. 11. Ottawa broke a tie with two minutes left to play and won 76-61, Dec. 15. This left the Bulldogs with a 1-3 record.

Sterling College won the Christmas holiday tournament.

### C of E Outsourced Mac

On Jan. 5, the College of Emporia Presbies outsourced the Bulldogs 47-27 the first half and 34-29 the second half to win 81-56.

The Bethany Swedes edged by the Bulldogs 54-49, Jan. 9 and Friends University won over the Bulldogs 72-61 Jan. 13; Jan. 13, Tabor beat McPherson 68-63, Jan.

15. The Bulldogs beat the Baker Wildcats 81-78, Jan. 20. After their victory against the Wildcats they lost four games in succession, Kansas Wesleyan 77-74, Sterling 70-68, Ottawa 81-75, and College of Emporia 69-67.

### Winning Streak

The Bulldogs trimmed the Bethany Swedes 70-65 Feb. 15, on the Swedes home court. The Bulldogs then won their next two games winning from Friends 76-71 Feb. 17, and beating Baker 76-64 Feb. 20.

They lost to Kansas Wesleyan 77-74 Feb. 22, and ended their season with a victory over Tabor 67-62 Feb. 27.

## Bullpups End 12-0 Season

McPherson High School Bullpups ended their Central Kansas League schedule Friday, March 2, with a 12-0 record and their third league championship in a row.

By coming from behind in the final three minutes of the game Friday to defeat Junction City 53 to 46, the Bull Pups ended a perfect regular basketball season.

Coach Jay Frazier's Bullpups have won 36 league games in three years without a loss. Their record of league and non-league play in three years is 58 wins and two losses.

George Czaplinsky, 6-3 senior, was high scorer for the Bullpups. George is the son of Vladimir Czaplinsky, instructor in foreign languages at McPherson College.

In 1951, the Czaplinsky's came to the United States from Russia under the sponsorship of Church World Service and on to McPherson under the sponsorship of the Church of the Brethren Friendly Forum Class.

Future plans for George include further academic work. Although he has received several offers, his choice of college is undecided.

Eugene Czaplinsky, George's younger brother, plays on McPherson's B team.

A tentative schedule for 1962 summer workshops and short courses at Macollege has been announced. Sessions will begin on Monday, June 4.

Students may take only one course at a time and will have one week of intensified study for each hour of credit.

## June Classes

From June 4 to June 8 two workshops — Workshop on the Physical Fitness of the Elementary School Child and Workshop and Reading Problem Diagnosis and Treatment — will be offered for one hour credit each.

Advanced Speech will be offered from June 4 to June 15 for two hours credit. Workshop in Air Age Education will be given from June 11 to June 22 for two hours.

General Biology will be given from June 18 to July 13 for four credit hours.

Three courses—Life and Teachings of Jesus, Audio Visual Education, and Arts and Crafts, will be offered for three hours each from June 25 to July 13.

## July 16 to August 3

Four three-hour courses will be given from July 16 to Aug. 3. They are: Elementary Economics, Guidance, Introduction to Philosophy, and Criminology.

Summer session will close with four courses to be given Aug. 6 to Aug. 24. These three-hour courses will be Geology, American Literature, Geography, and Trans-Mississippi West.
