Classes Realize Goal—Improve Reading Skills

Eleven college students and fifteen adults of this community set out to improve their reading this winter, and for most of them their goal was realized.

After only eight sessions of practice the college students had increased their speed 77 per cent, from an average of 332 to 584 words per minute. As instructor, I believe that the college students that took the class were a good cross section of the general college student body for our campus.

The adult class found increases in speed more difficult to achieve although they generally did better in comprehension. The college class dropped only several points in comprehension while scoring their gain in speed.

Some students and adults were able to score over 1000 words per minute on some tests.

College Section

In the college section special emphasis was placed on reading and studying efficiently. Numerous good study techniques were practiced. Comments by the students generally reflected their

belief, however, that the greatest benefit from the work had come in the area of recreational reading.

These gains may seem meager compared to the gains that some reading courses have advertised. However, it should be remembered that anyone can "read" 10,000 words a minute if the material is easy enough, if enough time is spent previewing the material, and if only general comprehension is required.

Fighting Habits

Improvement of reading habits by adults is not easy work, for they are fighting habits that have been established and practiced for many years. They are also usually fighting fatigue after a day's hard work.

Some materials that were used included "Reader's Digest," "Atlantic," "Business Week," and newspapers. The class met on Tuesday evenings for 12 weeks.

Aransas Refuge and surrounding area between Corpus Christi and Rock Port, Tex., draws many bird enthusiasts and ornithologists from many of the states at this time each year. Hundreds of species can be seen in what is called the Mississippi Flyway as they begin migrating to the north.

Among the species classified by the local ladies were: Hudsonian Godwits, Long-bill Curlews, black necked stilts, and king rails.

They attempted to find and observe one of the few remaining pairs of whooping cranes which had spent the winter in the refuge. However, the pair had left shortly before the ladies arrived.

While observing in the refuge, the McPherson trio also observed refuge officials capture wild deer to be sent to other areas.

Another highlight of their trip was their chance meeting and conversation with the American ornithologist, Connie Hager.

Before returning to McPherson April 21 the ladies toured the Arbuckle mountains in Oklahoma.

Harnly Hall Accommodates New Biological Laboratory

A new biological science laboratory, costing 4,500 dollars, is being installed on third floor of Harnly Hall. Construction includes a new sink and accommodations for 33 students.

The room will be a combination classroom, laboratory for Botany, General Biology, and Microbiology classes under Dr. John Burkholder, professor of biology, and Dr. Gilford Ikenberry, associate professor of biology.

Also meeting in the room will be agriculture classes under Dr. John Ward, assistant professor of rural life.

The old laboratory will still be used, and should be remodeled in the future. The addition of the new laboratory will make arranging of laboratory sessions and classes easier.

Instead of desks, there are tables to facilitate writing and microscope study. Each student will have a drawer and outlets for gas and electricity at his disposal.

A small room adjacent to the


laboratory will be used for storage. For many years there was an old classroom where the new laboratory is being constructed.

The laboratory should be completed in two or three weeks, according to Dr. Ikenberry.
