Frederick To Take Leave For Study At Wichita U.

Donald R. Frederick, professor of voice and director of choral arrangement, has been granted a half-time leave of absence for the academic year of 1962-63. He will use his sabbatical leave time for advanced study and research at the University of Wichita.

Professor Frederick's work at the University will be in the fields of voice pedagogy and materials, choral techniques and materials, and advanced theory and composition.

Own Files

In addition, he plans to pursue study and research using his own files and library of music materials, and he will do independent work in the field of church music.

Professor Frederick plans to work on compositions and arrangements, both choral and instrumental fields. He hopes to develop this work into publication which will perhaps include a book of Junior Choir materials for a New York publisher, choral pieces, and several works for bands and smaller instrumental ensembles.

Brooks To Read Speech Paper At Convention

William D. Brooks, associate professor of speech at McPherson College, will present his paper on experimental methods in speech at the Speech Association of America's Convention in Cleveland, Ohio, next December.

Brooks was notified last week by Dr. John W. Black, Ohio State University that his paper "Experimental Study of Offset Before After-Design as Compared to Traditional Pre-test Post-test with Control Group Design as Used in the Measurement of Attitudes," was selected as one of the ten papers to be presented at the convention.

Experimental methods in speech is the major area of Brook's thesis for his master's degree.

Professor Brooks was elected secretary and treasurer at the Kansas Speech Association's convention held at Kansas State University, Manhattan, May 4 and 5. Besides the normal duties of

Hubbard To Represent Mac In Year Abroad Program

Dennis Hubbard, senior from Hugoton, has been accepted for the Brethren Year Abroad Program and will be the McPherson College representative studying at Marburg, University, Marburg, West Germany.

The six colleges of the Church of the Brethren sponsor a year of undergraduate study abroad at Marburg, West Germany.

Marburg University has an enrollment of 7,000 students of whom less than 300 are foreign students.

A total of 25 students from the Brethren Colleges will be sent.

Of the 25 students half of them will live in a Brethren house with an equal number of foreign students for one semester. The remaining students will be placed in German homes giving them direct contact with the German people.

For the second semester the students will be shifted so that each group may benefit from both living conditions.

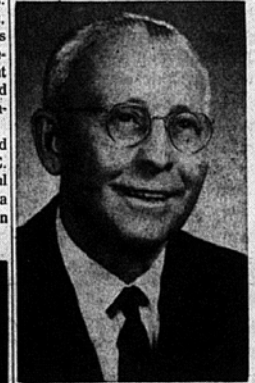

An Awards Assembly

It is possible to have mixed feelings about the granting of public awards.

On the one hand, it is good and right that those who have worked hard should have their work and their achievements recognized. Furthermore, such recognition may establish a goal for others.

On the other hand, it is regretful that some who worked even harder than those who received awards did not quite achieve the standard necessary to receive the award. The award is usually based on a certain achievement rather than upon the effort put forth by the individual to reach this achievement.

Some day we may reach a standard of testing which makes it possible to measure an individual against his own possibilities rather than against other individuals. This will be a fairer test of whether an award is deserved.

Really the best award possible is a sense of having done a creditable piece of work matched against what one knows his own ability to be. If one can say to himself, "I sincerely tried," this is an award greater than a public recognition.

In this frame of determination one can confront life unafraid, expecting to receive satisfaction from reasonable progress.

Harris Clarifies Library Policies

Dear Student Who Needs a Library Book:

I am puzzled by your letter in the May 11, 1962, issue of the SPECTATOR. Was your letter correctly stated? Evidently you do not understand the loan policies of the college library.

Non-reserve books from the stacks are checked from the library for four weeks. If the date due would fall during a holiday period, the loan period is as long as five or six weeks.

Reserve books, which must be available for many people, are used in the library during library hours, but may be checked out overnight or over a holiday about one-half hour before closing. They

are due by 9 a.m. of the next library day.

Reference Books

Reference books are checked out at closing time and are due by 9 a.m. of the next library day. Unbound periodicals are checked out for one week; bound periodicals are checked out overnight.

These are very liberal loan rules, much more liberal than those most college and university libraries have. Many libraries will not check from the building any reference books or periodicals. Our liberal loan service is one attempt to help students who must work or live off-campus.

Library service is many times hampered by students who misplace, misappropriate, or misuse library materials or privileges. In a college such as ours we should not need checkpoints, mon-

Larry Wachtman, Bill Kelly, and Henry Esquino all won first place in their respective divisions.

First semester, known as "winter semester," extends from November 1 to March 1. The second semester will be from March 1 to May 1.

During both semesters, Dennis will be studying primarily in the fields of history, economics, and German language.

Independent Studies

While taking class sessions, Dennis will also be doing some independent studies on economics and history. Research for these studies will be done outside of class. At the end of this research a paper or test will be required for the final.

Group excursions will be made to European centers of interest during holidays and weekends.

From May 1 to May 20 a spring sightseeing tour of Switzerland and Austria is planned. Lodging will be provided at Youth Hostels. Following the tour, the group plans to return home on May 20.
