Cultural Series Includes Six Varied Performances

Six varied programs will be presented this year in the College-Community Cultural Series in Brown Auditorium for the benefit of Macollege students and residents of McPherson.

The first program, a performance by the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra, will take place on Saturday, Nov. 4. The San Antonio Symphony Orchestra, one of the leading symphonic organizations in the nation, is directed by Victor Alessandro, an experienced conductor of international renown.

In addition to performing a full program of concerts in San Antonio, the orchestra has made several tours including one to Monterrey, Mexico.

New York Opera Quartette will present the next program in the Cultural Series on Wednesday, Dec. 6. The young but versatile and polished singers have appeared in many colleges throughout the United States.

An unusual solo instrument, the harp, will be featured in the next program. Miss Susann McDonald, first American to win a first prize at France's National Music Conservatory, will present a versatile repertoire on Tuesday, Jan. 9, 1962.

Piano Concert

A piano concert by Theodore

Ullman, who has appeared in colleges all over the United States and in Columbia, South America, will be given Saturday, Feb. 10, 1962, as a bonus number. Mr. Ullman is now serving as an artist-ex-residence in leading American educational institutions.

An entirely different area of the arts will be presented on Saturday, Feb. 24, 1962, in the Cultural Series by the performance of Cilli Wang, a pantomimist. Miss Wang combines striking costumes with her mimic and dancing abilities in a distinctive type of pantomime.

Her acts vary from the satirical and humorous to the poignant. Her many guest appearances include ones on the Ed Sullivan and George Gobel television shows "Caledonia!"

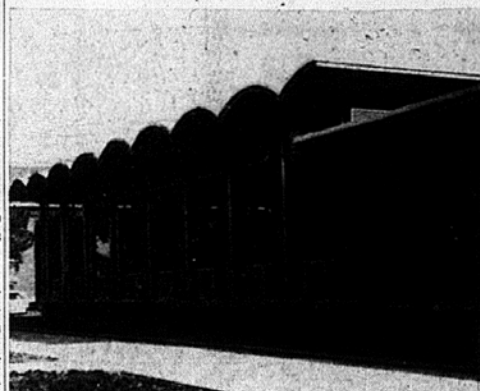

World famous soloists and dancers are featured in their native tartans and kilts. The sixteen members of the company are directed by Andrew McPherson. All performances begin at 8 p.m.

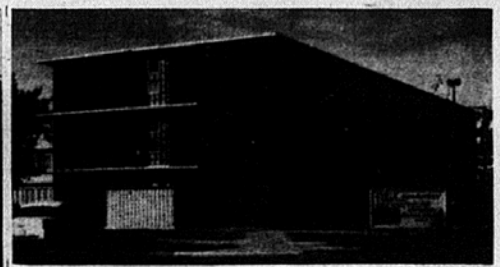
Tickets

Civil Service Announces Time Of Exam

Ninth Civil Service Region announces that the Federal Service Entrance Examination (FSEE) will be given on Oct. 14 to all juniors and seniors who apply by Sept. 28. Again on Nov. 18 the examination will be given to those who apply by Nov. 2.

This civil service exam is used for filling trainee administrative, technical, and professional positions with Federal agencies throughout the United States.

Starting salaries for this year's graduates placed through the FSEE are \$4,345 and \$5,355 a year. Management Interns may start as high as \$6,435 a year.

Positions to be filled include management analyst, personnel specialist, social security representative, bank examiner, and various types of investigative work.

Seniors and graduates who take the test early increase their opportunities for early placement.

Music Facilities Change; Fall Practice Schedules Set

Facilities for the Macollege Music Department have undergone changes and improvements during the summer, and fall practice schedules have been arranged for all music students.

Fourth floor of Harnly Hall has been changed and is now known as Harnly Music Area, according to Donald Frederick professor of music. Brown basement will be designated as Brown Music Area.

Harnly Organ

In May, the Sharp organ, which will now be called Harnly organ, was moved to the fourth floor of Harnly. The pipes were placed in an adjoining studio until proper facilities were acquired to permanently install them in July.

Four practice rooms in the northeast corner of the fourth floor were eliminated to make

room for the organ and organ chamber. The walls of the organ room were completely rebuilt and soundproofing was installed.

Practice on the Harnly organ is scheduled. However, students may practice any time there is not a designated practice period except at 1:15 p.m. Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.

Two pianos in the organ room may be used when organ practice is not scheduled. All other practice pianos, which are scheduled, are available until women's dorm

Fall Enrollment Increases To Over 500 Students

Enrollment for the fall semester at McPherson College has increased over 6 per cent from last year's figures, according to the latest statistics released by the Registrar's Office.

Latest figures show that 565 students have enrolled this year compared with 473 last year at this time.

Several students were delayed in registering because of storms and floods which hampered transportation facilities in several states.

181 Freshmen

This year's freshman class has 181 students which is an increase of one student over last year's class.

The sophomore class of this year increased from 101 to 124 students, a gain of 23 members.

Juniors Increase

Juniors number 101 this year as compared with 79 last year. Seventy-seven students have enrolled in the senior class which is a decrease of 23 from last year's total.

Twenty special students, those

taking 11 or less credit hours of college work, have also enrolled. This compares with 13 special students last year.

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C Of E Overrides Bulldogs In 32-7 Gridiron Victory

Overpowered by the offensive attack of the College of Emporia Presbys, the Maccollege Bulldogs were defeated in their first gridiron clash of the season by a score of 32-7.

C. of E. started the scoring early in the first quarter when Herman Rathman set up the first tally with a 65-yard punt return. Rathman also ran 33-yards for the second touchdown.

A 79-yard march ended at the goal line in a two-yard plunge by Emporia's Switzer. He also carried the ball across the goal line after another long march.

C. of E. added an extra point after the touchdown to make the halftime score 19-0.

A 24-yard dive resulted in another Presby touchdown when Phillips scored on a one-yard play. The final C. of E. touchdown came when Goodson, a middle guard, blocked a punt at the Bulldog 22-yard line, and Jim Graziano, freshman guard, recovered the ball in the end zone.

Richards Scores

McPherson's scoring came in the fourth quarter when Tom Richards, senior from Niles, crossed the goal line on a 39-yard run.

On the ground, C. of E. had little edge over the Bulldogs as each team had 16 first downs.

Against the Presbys, McPherson attempted 28 passes and completed 8 for 89-yards gained and had two passes intercepted. Emporia also did its share of passing, completing 8 out of 23 attempts for a total of 118-yards.

McPherson led in the number of offensive plays while C. of E. had more defensive plays. Emporia held the net rushing margin, 228-yards over 200-yards by the Bulldogs.

Coach Sid Smith stated, "The Bulldogs learned a lot in defense and tackling in the game last week, and they are now a lot tougher. However, our players did put on a good show and do intend to win the game tonight."
