

Recently a 17-year old Oklahoma girl was critically injured in an automobile accident. Newscasters stated that she was a student at McPherson College. Instead, she was to be a student at Central College here in McPherson.

### **Fall Enrollment Increases** To Over 500 Students

Enrollment for the fall semester at McPherson College has increased over 6 per cent from last year's figures, according to the latest statistics released by the Registrar's Office.

Latest figures show that 505 taking 11 or less credit hours of students have enrolled this year at college work, have also enrolled. compared with 473 last year at This compares with 13 special this' time
